New Parcel Post Rates And Rules In Effect Jan. 15

Use of Zip Code will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, Postmaster Floyd Hokit of Ozona said today. New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date as provided in legislation signed into law by President Johnson on Sept. 20, 1966.

The rate increases will average about 10 cents a parcel. 


