## FIREMAN PRAISED — \$5,000 Damage In Crockett Heights Apartment Blaze

A pre-dawn fire Friday morning at Crockett Heights caused an estimated \$5,000 worth of damage to an apartment building. The blaze caught from a broken gas line outside the building.

Troy Dutton of McGregor, one of the owners of the Heights, was in town early this week to survey the damage. He said the loss was fully insured and further stated that quick action on the part of Ozona firemen saved the building. Dutton presented the Ozona Fire Department with a check in the amount of \$200, "in appreciation," he said, "of the speed and efficiency with which the Ozona firemen extinguished the blaze." He said that the owners felt the building would have been a total loss within minutes, except for the prompt arrival of the fire department.

Crockett Heights is a little over five miles from Ozona and one of the firemen estimated that in a matter of eight or nine minutes from the time the alarm came in the first truck arrived at the scene of the fire.

## Lions Outscore Sonora In Final Tourny Warmup

Marlin Farris, 6'4" Lion pivotman, led the Lions to a 65-52 win over the Sonora Broncos Tuesday night as the Lions warmed up for their tournament this weekend.

Farris led the scoring with 21 points and grabbed 14 rebounds as the Lions jumped out to a 17-8 first quarter lead and were never ahead by less than 6 points. With Farris doing most of his scoring in close to the bucket, Beto Vargas (14 pts.) George Cox (13 pts.) and Rex Bland (11 pts.) hit from the outside as Ozona racked up 38 pts. in the final half, enjoying a 40-24 lead at one time.

Laney Cook found the range for 18 pts. in the final half after being held to 2 points in the first two quarters. It was the hot shooting of Cook that kept Sonora in the ball game.

In B-team action, Sonora whipped out a 58-51 win. The winners were led by Richard Perez with 15 points and John DeHoyos netted 12 for Ozona.

After this week-end's tourney play, Ozona will head into East Zone action, looking for a playoff spot against the West Zone champs for the district title.

## One Cent Cut In Ozona Insurance Key Rate Made

Another one-cent reduction in Ozona's fire insurance key rate will mean a savings to Ozona insurance buyers of about \$182 a year if they buy the same amount of coverage next year as they bought last, the San Angelo Standard Times' Austin bureau reported in its Wednesday edition.

The State Board of Insurance set the key rate for Ozona at 33 cents, down from the present 34 cents, effective Jan. 15. Last year the key rate was cut from 35 to 34 cents.

The state agency arrives at the key rate through a system of charges for fire hazards and credits for fire prevention practices in the

## Voter Register List Still Lags; Deadline Nears

A report from the tax office at mid-week indicated that voter registration is going slowly, with only 450 registered so far. Voters are reminded of the January 31 deadline and urged to register as soon as possible if they expect to vote in any election during 1967.

Any person who will become 21 years of age anytime during 1967 must also register before the January 31 deadline. In previous years, these persons were permitted to obtain exemptions after the deadline and still be qualified to vote. This year they must register before Jan. 31.

There is no charge for registering. Residence requirements are the same for voter registration as they were for the old poll tax. A voter must have lived in Texas for at least one year and the county and precinct for six months.

Under the present Texas law, in towns with a population under 10,000, persons 60 years of age or older on Jan. 1 are not required to register for voting but later decisions might change this ruling. So it would be advisable for all voters to register before the deadline.

Mrs. Gertrude Perry, deputy tax-assessor and collector, also announced that tax renditions are being mailed out this week. She asked that property owners fill out these renditions and return them to the tax office as soon as possible. The renditions must be returned by April 30.

The inauguration was handled as a mock trial. Mrs. Harvick was sentenced to "preserve harmony, and that isn't easy," Mrs. Jones was admonished to "write into the minutes that which is printable and keep the rest under your hat."

Mrs. Harvick for many years was in charge of the Make-It-Yourself-With-Wool program in Texas. The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, at its recent convention in Fort Worth, presented her a large plaque honoring her long service.

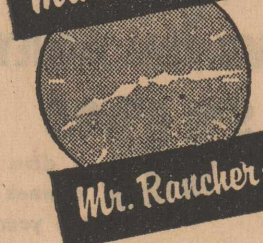
city.

Ozona had a total of 38 cents in charges, due to deficiencies in water pressure and storage basins; 11 per cent of water mains deficient in size; an 80 per cent deficiency in number of fully paid firemen; lack of a reserve pumper; no fire alarm system except a siren; marsh; and conflagration hazards including overhead wires and frame ranges in the business district, and more than 15 per cent of combustible roofs in the residential section.

Then it got a number of credits. They were 1 per cent for having at least one booster truck, 4 per cent for having two separate booster trucks with 250-gallon capacities; 1 per cent for having a chief's car; 3 per cent for the teaching of fire prevention in the Ozona schools, and 3 per cent for completion of the firemen's training courses. The total credit came to 5 cents and cut the key rate to 22 cents.

**Shell Completes Eighth Producer In Mitchell Field**

Shell Oil Co., Midland, No. 9 Mitchell, in 10-NNN-Z. T. Bullock, indicated eighth producer and one-mile northeast and 1 1/4-mile west extension to the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed gas at the rate of 12.5 million cubic feet when drilling reached 13,135 feet.

Earlier it flowed gas at the rate of 6 million cubic feet at 12,946 feet and a 7.5 million cubic feet at 13,028 feet.

Contract depth is 15,000 feet.

It indicated discovery pro-

duction earlier with the flowing of gas at the rate of 360,000 cubic feet daily when drilling reached 3,992 feet.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 2-35 University, in 35-7-University, indicated second producer and location southeast extension to the World, North (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 25 miles southwest of Big Lake, pumped 30 barrels load oil, 20 barrels of load water and 20 barrels of formation water, in 24 hours.

Testing continued through perforations at 8,002 - 110 feet.

American Petrofina Co. of Texas, Big Spring, extended the 3,200-foot sand pay 1 1/4-miles northwest in the Refoil multipay field of Crockett County with the recompletion of its No. 4 Suburban Propane Gas Corp., et al, former 3,056-foot Clearfork producer, nine miles southwest of Ozona.

It was finaled to pump three barrels of 30 gravity oil through perforations at 3-454-463 1/2 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 21,000 pounds and 20,000 gallons.

Original completion was June 20 for 1,39 barrels of 31 gravity oil through perforations at 3,069-3,562 feet.

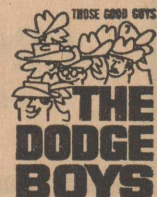
