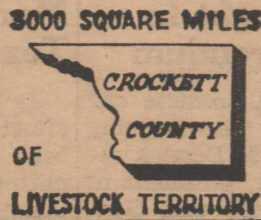

I notice the government has given the auto industry a list of 20 safety requirements for new cars. It will be interesting to see if this endeavor cuts down on automobile fatalities in the future.

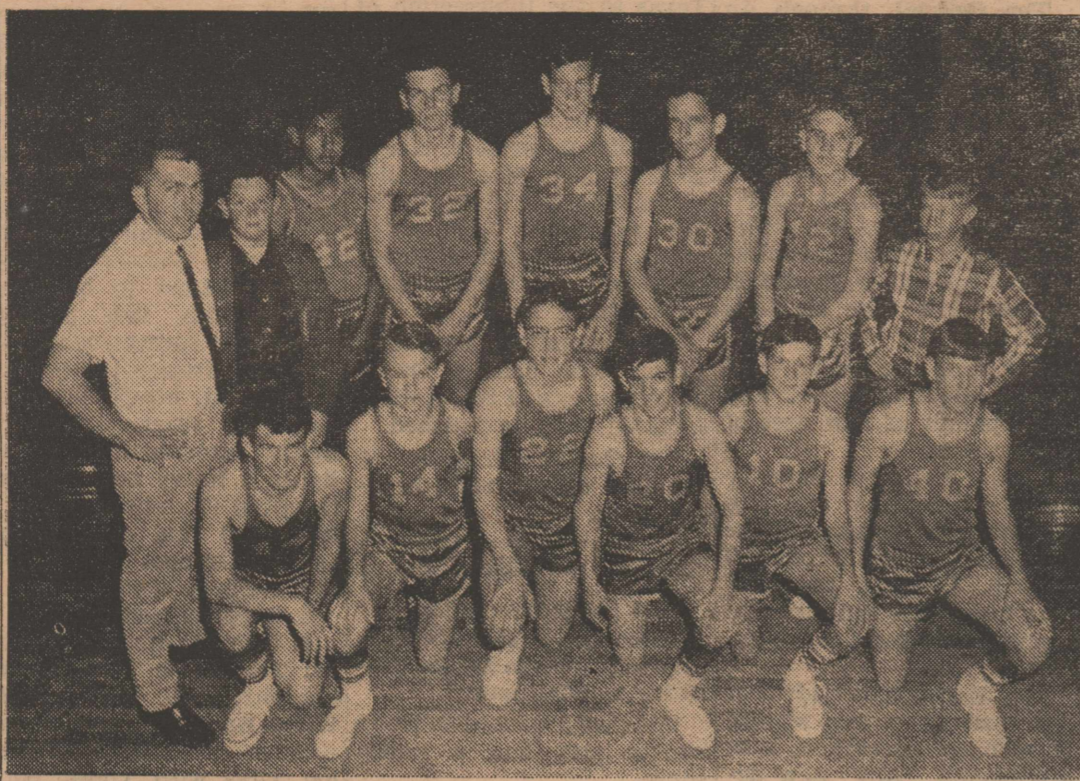

Directors Name Byron Williams To Head C of C

Byron Williams was elected president of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce for the 1967 term at a board of directors meeting Monday night at the C of C building.

New directors, elected by the membership and installed at the meeting, are Dean Rippetoe, Jim Marks, Carl Conklin and Williams. The new directors will replace outgoing directors Jack Baggett, John Childress, John Held and Bill Watson, who is also outgoing president. Baggett, Childress and Held were on the original board of directors, having drawn 1-year terms at the beginning of the organization and then re-elected to a full 3-year term under a special provision in the constitution.

Holdover directors include Bill Cooper, Sam Martinez, W. H. Whitaker and Ted Lewis, who have one year to serve, and Mrs. S. M. Harvick, George Glynn, George Bunker, Jr. and Dick Kirby, who have two years to serve on three-year terms.

The initiation of new directors and election of officers marks the beginning of the 5th year of operation for the Ozona C of C.

Outgoing president, Bill Watson, expressed his appreciation for the assistance given him during his year in office and said that although he had enjoyed serving the community in this capacity, he would enjoy the free time he would have after handing over the gavel. He said the job had its rewards, but at the same time was very time consuming.

Ground work was laid for the new year and it was decided that all existing committees and projects in work would remain the same for the present. A tentative date for the annual banquet was set for March 2, at the Civic Center.

Coach Ron Murdock's Junior High Cubs made a clean sweep in the annual Sonora Junior High Basketball Tournament last weekend by winning the Championship, placing Jim Montgomery on the all-tournament team and having David Pagan chosen outstanding player of the tournament. Lewis graduated from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas, and entered the Army in October 1959. He is attending the U. S. Army Adjutant General School Officer Career Course at Ft. Benjamin Harrison. He has recently returned from Vietnam where he served with the famed Green Berets.

Captain Lewis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted M. Lewis, Ozona, Texas. He and his wife, Jeanne, live at 4635 Englewood, Indianapolis, Ind.

Several Injured In Rash Of Auto Accidents Here

A rash of accidents Sunday afternoon and evening kept officers and hospital personnel busy, sending 3 to the hospital for admission and several others for emergency treatment and heavily damaging most of the vehicles involved.

The most serious of the mishaps occurred Sun. night at 8:45 a little over 7 miles east of town on Hwy 290. Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Murray were driving toward Ozona with Mrs. Murray at the wheel of their '61 Buick, when a 1964 Mercury, driven by Eldon Truxex of Midland, veered into their lane heading east. The almost head-on collision spun the Mercury around in the highway where it over-turned, coming to rest on its top. A '59 Ford driven by Luis Tijerina and following the Murray car into town hit the Mercury broadside.

Truxex, who is listed in serious condition at Crockett County Hospital, was accompanied by Gary Campbell and Worthen Bonner, both of Midland. The latter two were hospitalized overnight and released Tuesday morning. Mr. and Mrs. Murray and Tijerina received emergency treatment and were released.

The Buick and Mercury were estimated as total losses and the Ford was heavily damaged, according to investigating officer, Joe Brownlee, DPS patrolman.

At 11:30 Sunday night, Wilson Crane of Clute, Texas, attempted to dodge a deer in a 1963 Pontiac while town in a late model Ford. The Pontiac went out of control and hit a tree, breaking loose the tow car which hit the Pontiac and veered into a post. Both vehicles were extensively damaged but Crane escaped serious injury.

Earlier Sunday afternoon a '57 Ford pick-up driven by an Austin man, accompanied by his wife and 2 children, was struck in the rear by a '64 Ford driven by Stephen White of Ozona, while turning into a service station. The vehicles received minor damage, but none of the occupants were injured.

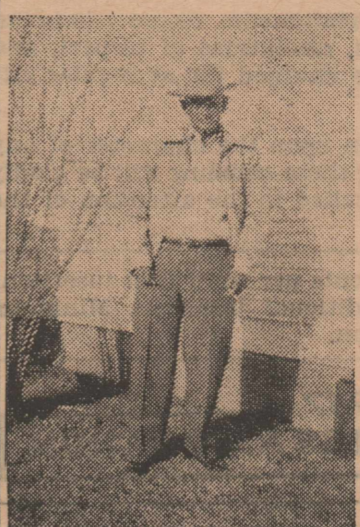
Dwight Childress Jimmy West Grab Major 4H Honors

Stolen Pick-up Truck Recovered In Saragosa, Mex

Sheriff's officers located a stolen pick-up in Saragosa, Mexico, Monday. The pick-up was stolen last week from John I. Smith here. Deputy Ralph Gonzales, accompanied by an immigration officer went to Saragosa Monday and returned with the pick-up Tuesday. Mexican officials refused to give the local officer custody of the suspect, Mario Cardona Suarez, 17. However, Sheriff Billy Mills said if the young Mexican uses his passport to return to the States, he will be arrested for the theft.

Officers picked up Tom Haley, who was indicted for theft by false pretense during the last term of the grand jury, in Hobbs, N. M., and returned him to jail here where he is under \$2,500 bond.

Several months ago Haley took payment for advertising from Crockett Motors and Glynn's Shell Service and left town without fulfilling his contract. He will be tried at the next term of district court.

Sheriff Mills also reported that his department is investigating the theft of 110 joints of 2 3/8 OD tubing and around twenty 55 gallon drums from Union Oil of California in Vaughn Field. The thefts occurred over a period of one month as the items came up missing a few at a time.

Funeral Services Here Sunday For Lindsey W. Hicks

Funeral services for Lindsey H. Hicks, 66, prominent Crockett county ranchman, were held Sunday at 3 p. m. at the Ozona Methodist Church with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, and Rev. Morris Bratton of San Antonio officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Johnson's Funeral Home of San Angelo, assisted by James Funeral Home.

Mr. Hicks died at 8:18 a. m. Friday at Shannon Hospital of San Angelo where he had been a patient two weeks.

Born in Coleman July 23, 1900, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Hicks, pioneer ranch couple in that area. He lived in San Angelo as a child and later moved to Sheffield.

He later moved to Ozona, but maintained a ranch between Sheffield and Dryden. In 1950, he and L. W. Puckitt bought Findlater Retail Store and renamed it Hicks & Puckett Hardware Store. They closed that business in 1956 and established Hicks & Puckett Water Service, Inc. Mr. Hicks was co-owner of this operation at the time of his death.

He was married to the former Lois Drake in San Angelo Jan. 27, 1950. He was a member of the Ozona Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Lin W. Hicks of Sonora; a daughter, Mrs. Fredrick Buss of Chicago; a stepson, Banky Stocks of Kent; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Joan Nobles of Van Horn; two sisters, Mrs. George E. Poulter of San Angelo and Mrs. Huron W. Mills of Austin; three grandchildren and five step-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Dr. T. Gabe Coleman and Dr. Gus Eckhardt, both of San Angelo; Boyd Clayton, George Bunker, W. E. Friend, Chas. Williams, Hugh Childress and Beal Barbee.

H. Baker Named C of C Manager

2 Crockett Fields Gain Extensions; Location Staked

Two Crockett County fields gained extenders and location was staked for a confirmer in still another field.

The DePaul multipay field of Crockett County gained its tenth lower Canyon gas-distillate producer with completion of Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc. No. 1-5 Davidson, 3/4-mile southwest of the nearest production, 10 miles southeast of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.05 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 249.377-1. Production was through perforations at 7,672-8,169 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 70,000 pounds and 100,000 gallons.

Location is 1,420 feet from the north and 1,520 feet from the east lines of 5-F-GC&SF. The Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field gained a 3/4-mile east and the same distance south-southwest extension with completion of Frio-Tex Oil and Gas Co. No. 7 W. C. Montgomery, 12 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.9 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 99,000-1. Gravity of the liquid was 65 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,405-52 feet and 6,605-14 feet, which had been fractured with 80,000 gallons and 93,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 540 feet from the south and 195 feet from the west lines of 1-AAA-TCRR.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. will drill the No. 3 C. W. Meadows, Jr., as a 3/4-mile southwest outpost to the four-well Spraberry oil area of the Ozona, Northwest multipay field of Crockett County, 3 1/2 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 933 feet from the most southerly north line and 3,673 feet from the most easterly east lines of 72-OP-GC&SF. Contract depth is 4,200 feet.

Atlantic Reichfield Co. will drill the No. 1-17 R. Helbing one mile southwest and 1 1/2 miles northeast of the nearest production in the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, five miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 17-QR-TTRR. Contract depth is 6,600 feet.

Frank Childress To Graduate From New Mexico State

Las Cruces, N. M. — John Frank Childress of Ozona completed work for his degree during the fall semester which ended January 20 and will be among the 750 members of the New Mexico State University's class of 1967.

New Mexico State's 74th Annual Commencement is scheduled for 8 p. m., Saturday, May 27, in Memorial Stadium.

Childress is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Childress of Ozona. He has received a Bachelor Degree in Agriculture with a major in agriculture economics. Childress is a 1962 graduate of Ozona High School.

Community Scout Service Planned

Vincent Hoff, Executive Director of Concho Valley Scouts, met Tuesday night with Ozona Boy Scout Leaders and plans were made for a Board of Review and Induction Service, to be open to the public.

The group discussed a community Scout Service, in which all Ozona Scouts from Cub to Explorer would participate. The service will be held late in March or early April. A definite date will be announced later.

Scoutmaster Bill Lewter expressed hope that more Scouts would be on hand for meetings after basketball season. He said officers for the year will be selected at the Tuesday, Feb. 2, meeting and urged that all Scouts and boys interested in becoming Scouts attend. The annual registration fee of 50c will be due at that time.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

CHINESE BEEF
2 lbs. round steak
2 tbs. Crisco oil
1 clove garlic
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/2 tsp. sugar
3 medium tomatoes (chopped)
2 sweet peppers (chopped)
1 tbs. corn starch
1/4 cup water
Cut steak in half-inch strips, across grain, 3 or 4 inches long. Heat oil, garlic, salt, pepper and ginger. Sear meat in this hot mixture. Add soy sauce and sugar to the mixture and boil for five minutes. Add tomatoes and green peppers and simmer for ten minutes. Make a paste of cornstarch and water and thicken mixture just before serving. Serve over steamed rice or noodles.

Mohair Promotion Funds Sought In Feb. Referendum

"If we don't promote our own products, who is going to," said Howard Derrick recently. Derrick, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, made the comment after reviewing the promotion plans proposed by the Mohair Council of America.

The Council, through an agreement with the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture, is asking mohair producers to vote YES in a mail referendum scheduled for February 6-17. If passed, the referendum would authorize deductions of 1 1/2 cents per pound of mohair from incentive payments mohair producers receive under the National Wool Act.

The funds would be used for promotion of mohair and development of new uses of the product.

"The mohair industry needs a promotion arm like the sheep people have in the American Sheep Producers Council. I think the Mohair Council of America can supply that need," said Derrick.

Fred Earwood, president of the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association, is in agreement. "Any new demand for mohair could change the picture overnight," he said.

Speaker Points To UN Influence On U. S. Policies

The United Nations was created to foster world government rather than world peace and by its methods of shunting aside the sovereignty of nations has brought about an increase from 200 million to one billion people enslaved under the communist yoke since 1945. General Richard B. Moran (USA, Ret.) told an audience at the civic center here Saturday night.

"Never have U. N. spokesmen condemned communist take-over. Now they are trying to destroy the only two remaining Christian nations left in Africa, Rhodesia and South Africa," the general declared.

"Due to the chicanery of our State Department, our foreign policy and our domestic laws are being formulated in the General Assembly of the United Nations by savage tribesmen of Africa together with the communist bloc nations."

Gen. Moran then told of a plan of Major Arch E. Roberts, retired Army officer who has written a book, "Victory Denied", to mobilize resistance to the United Nations take-over of the U. S. Military establishment and to halt the "internationalizing" of American fighting men.

Major Roberts seeks to arouse the various sovereign states to assert their authority as parties to the Constitution of the US and deny the right of the United States government to abrogate that constitution by means of the so-called United Nations Treaty. Action in this direction would be by resolution of the several states, stating that they no longer recognize the authority of the United Nations Treaty agreement, and make it unlawful for their citizens to comply with the agreement. This in the end would force the United States to withdraw from the United Nations.

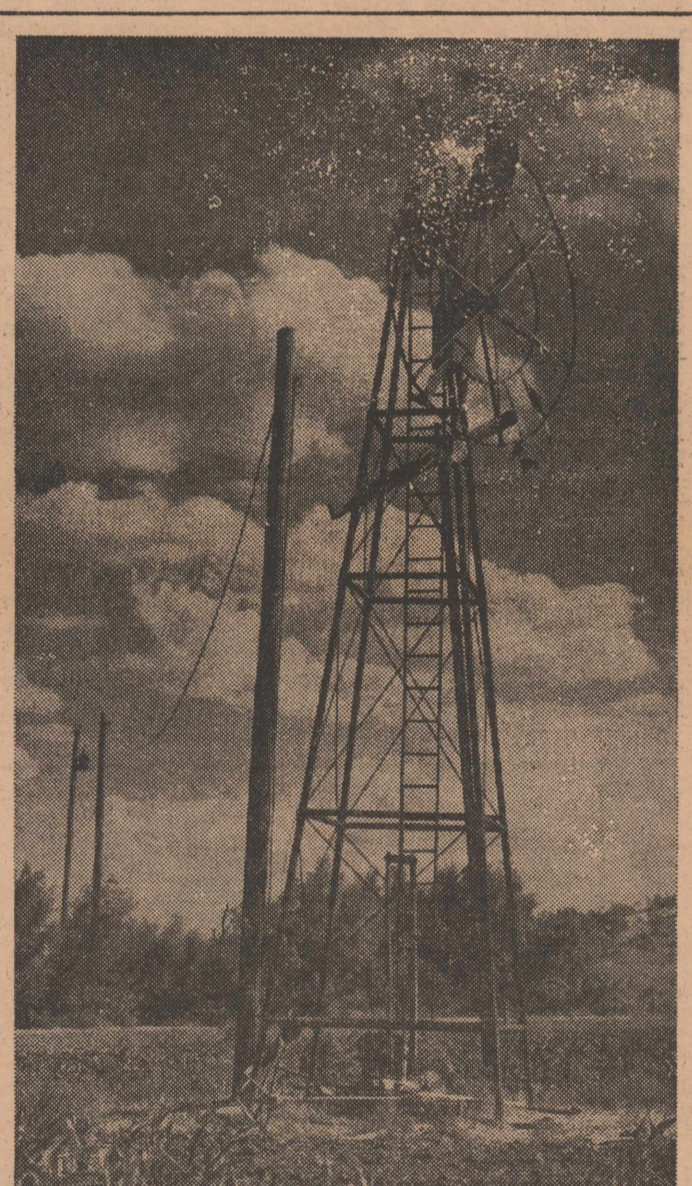
