

Add onions to bacon drippings in skillet and cook stirring occasionally, until tender. Add beans, tomatoes, chili powder, salt, and pepper, mixing well. Cook, uncovered, over low heat, stirring occasionally, 20 minutes. Stir in cheese and cook until cheese is melted. To serve: Turn into serving dish. Sprinkle bacon over top. Makes 6 servings.

Drivers Bills — Modernization of Texas' license plates and driver's licenses would be accomplished by a pair of bills introduced in the House by Reps. Milton Schiller of Cameron and Dick Cory of Victoria.

Cory's bill would provide for a color photograph of the licensee on the driver's license. Persons under 21 years of age would be issued different - colored licenses. Proof of birth date and fingerprints would be required on the applications.

A bill by Schiller calls for reflectorized license plates. Motorists woud pay the added 30 cents cost per plate.

Blue Law Proposed - A new twist to the old Sunday "blue laws" is proposed in a bill by Rep. Billy Williamson of Tyler. It would levy an occupation tax on persons selling or renting personal property on Sunday.

Actually, the tax would be so rough as to prohibit Sunday sales. It would be at the rate of 10 percent of the receipts from the sale or rental, with some deductions provided. Anyone violating the measure would be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 for each violation.
