Pay Indicated From 3 Zones In Crockett Test

An extensive Northwest Crockett County wildcat has indicated production in three zones.

Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Midland, No. 2 Tippet, in 37-31-H&TC, Crockett County Ellenburger wildcat, 10 miles southeast of McCamey, 1 1/2 miles east of the recently opened one - well Tippet, West (Ellenburger and McKee oil) field and 3/4 mile southwest of the firm's No. 1 Tippet, producer in the Tippet multipay field, has indicated production in three zones with the flowing of gas and recovery of shows on drillstem test.

Tool was open 45 minutes on the test taken in the Connell sand between 6,548-585 feet, which recovered 3,800 feet of gas in the drillpipe and 300 feet of mud-cut oil. Flowing pressure was 390-155 pounds 45-minute initial and (Continued on Last Page)

Construction On Highway 163 In Crockett Begins

The Texas Highway Department has announced a new construction project on State Highway 163 in Irion and Crockett Counties. The construction consists of widening three bridges between Ozona and Barnhart, and the reconstruction of grading, structures and surfacing from 5.0 miles to 11.5 miles south of Ozona.

The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, Jones Brothers Dirt and Paving Contractors, Inc., stated that the construction was due to begin about March 13, and will be completed by November, 1967. A public meeting of the contractor and Highway engineering staff was held last week in the local engineering office.

W. F. Dixon, Senior Resident Engineer of Ozona, in charge of construction on this project, stated that traffic will be routed through construction. Although adequate barricades and warning signs will be prominently displayed, motorists should use extreme caution while passing through the area as it will be heavily traveled by large construction equipment.

A temporary speed zone of 40 m. p. h. will be established for the entire length of the project. Co-operation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals and warning signs.

Gulf Opens Gas Pay In O-B Trap Ellenburger Test

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 Ozona-Barnhart Trap Co., in 14-OP-GC&SF, assured Ellenburger gas pay opener one location northeast of production in the three-well Holt Ranch (Ellenburger oil field of Crockett County, 8 3/4 miles north of Ozona, flowed 1.8 barrels of new oil and 19.3 barrels of load water in 171 hours. There was no gauge on the amount of gas.

Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 7,569-640 feet, with considerable load remaining.

Production was assured earlier with the flowing of gas at the daily rate of 1,360,000 cubic feet, plus 3.5 barrels of oil and 31.7 barrels of load water in 167 hours.

Lions Cop Track Title At Sonora; Second of Season

Ozona High School won its second championship trophy of the track season Saturday when they captured the Sonora Relays with a team total of 121 points. Finishing behind the Lions were Sonora, 82 points, Eldorado, 79 points, and San Angelo B 63.

Saturday, Coach Chick Womack's tracksters will be in Eldorado looking for championship number 3, but several AA squads, including a powerful Brady group, may block Lion efforts.

The Lions broke two meet records Saturday when both the 440 yard and 880 yard relay teams easily snapped the old marks. The 440 yard relay unit of Thomas DeHoyos, George Cox, Fleet Coates and Derold Maney ran a 44.2 to break the old record of 44.8 by Eldorado in 1964. The 880 yard relay foursome of DeHoyos, Cox, Maney, and Catarino Cervantez snapped the record of 1:34.0 held by another Lion team of 1964. The new record was 1:33.4.

Speedster Cox added a win in the 220 with a 22.1 clocking to remain undefeated. Cox's 22.1 ranks as one of the better marks in the 220 yard dash. Junior weightman Gary Sutton again won the discus with a toss of 158 feet 10 1/2 inches and finished second behind Mayo of Eldorado in the shot. Sutton's 166 feet 3/4-inch record in the Ozona Invitational Meet ranks 6th in th state among all discus throwers - regardless of classification.

Miler Maggie Galindo again won the mile run; Tony Cullins, only a freshman, took the pole vault with 11 feet 6 inches; and Derold Maney got a second in the intermediate hurdles.

Other Lion placers were Tony Garza, 5th in the discus; Marlin Farris, 6th in shot; Cervantez, 6th in broad jump and 100 yard dash; Fred Chandler 5th in the 330 yard hurdles; DeHoyos 5th in the 220; and Joe Bob Stephens, 6th in the mile.

Senator Mike Mansfield wants us to stop bombing.

Senator J. William Fulbright wants us to stop bombing.

That's an impressive array of names, listed, we hasten to note, in order of insistence on stopping the bombing, and not in any order of unimportance.

In Vietnam are some men from this community — sons and husbands of subscribers to this newspaper.

In Vietnam, also are several dozen good and resourceful news reporters. Dozens of others have visited Vietnam and talked with the men fighting the war.

We've seen no dispatch from any accredited American correspondent in Vietnam that:

 - any corporal,
 - any sergeant,
 - any lieutenant,
 - any captain,
 - any major,
 - any colonel,
 - any general,
- fighting the enemy, face to

face and hand to hand, has said that we should stop the bombing of North Vietnam's supply routes.

We've had no letters from any of our local men saying "Stop the bombing."

And this is to tell the men in Vietnam from our town that we're against stopping the bombing — until they tell us to declare otherwise.

So pour it on men!

- 1 (7 oz.) package of chocolate bits
- 1 (7 oz.) package of caramel bits
- 1 (7 oz.) package of salted skinned peanuts
- 1 can chow mein noodles
- Melt chocolate and caramel bits over hot water. Add peanuts and can of chow mein noodles. Blend well and drop by teaspoon onto waxed paper.

Former Ozonan, Pearlletta Morris, sent me the above recipe from Maine. I didn't quite understand the "salted skinned peanuts", so used "Planters Party Peanuts." They are easy and quick to make and delicious. Children would enjoy making these.

Milkyway Cake

- 8 Milkyway candy bars
 - 2 sticks margarine
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 4 eggs
 - 1/2 teas. soda
 - 2 1/2 cups flour
 - 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
 - 1 cup pecans
- Melt candy bars and 1 stick margarine over hot water. Cream together sugar and other stick of margarine. Add eggs, mixing well. Dissolve soda in buttermilk and then add alternately with flour. Mix all well and add pecans. Pour into lightly greased and floured tube pan and cook 1 hour in 350 degree preheated oven. This cake is so good, an icing is not necessary. Chocolate glaze may be used.

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

An Oddity of the Adam Powell fiasco has been the widespread injection of racism into the case. Powell's suit to be sworn in, filed last week, claims the vote against seating him was because he was a Negro. And his Harlem cohorts have blasted "whitey" for Adam's fate, and openly threatened to invoke a "Burn, baby, burn!" way of showing their resentment. That was the war cry employed by Negroes during the tragic Watts riot in Los Angeles.

The United Council of Harlem Organizations, made up of 87 civil rights groups in the area, held a meeting following Powell's exclusion, to denounce the House action.

"What has just been done is an insult to every Negro voter in America", screamed Hulan Jack, the organization's chairman.

Black Nationalist James Lawson warned: "This slogan of Watts is going to be adopted by the Black Nationalists. If Powell is not seated and given his chairmanship back, he said, that is "Burn, baby, burn!"

At a three-hour mass protest held in Adams' Harlem church, the tone of the afternoon, according to the press, was set when many in the audience refused to stand at the play of the Star Spangled Banner. There were shouts of "No! No. We ain't represented in Congress, we ain't going to sing."

And at the delayed conclusion of the National Anthem, the audience almost unanimously boomed.

The Tragedy of this unpatriotic display is that it reveals the practice of racism at its worst. It pre-emptively poses that Powell could do no wrong and that the sole reason for the refusal to seat him was that he was a Negro.

Nothing could be further from the truth. It serves to disclose how utterly irresponsible a constituency can be — basing their support of a representative solely upon his color, with no concern whatever for qualification or behavior.

The outgrowth of Adam's lawsuit to force the Speaker to swear him in may be an historic confrontation between the judicial and legislative branches of the government. There is ample reason to believe that the House may decide to refuse to honor any court order, as many of us believe it has a right to do in this situation.

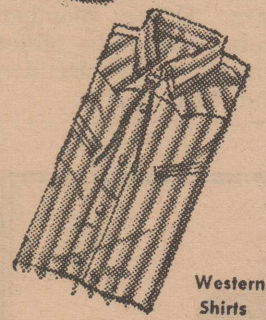

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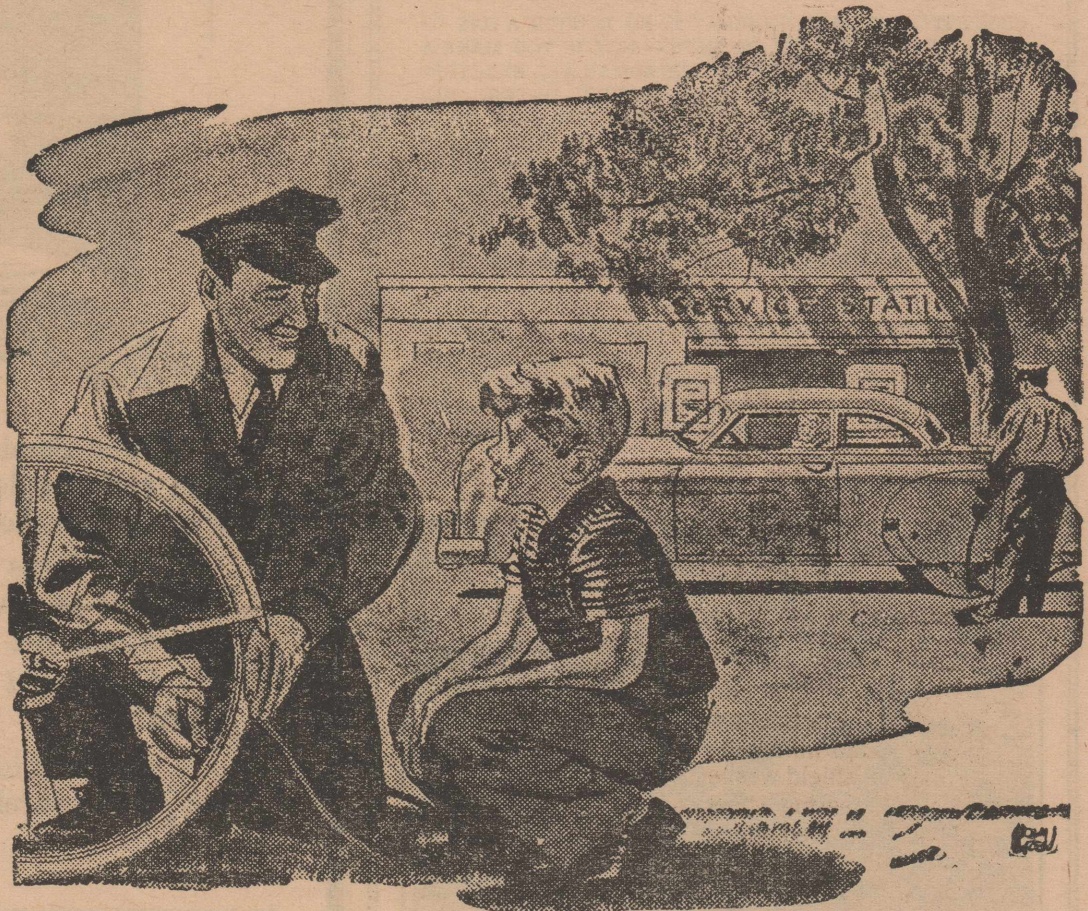

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JM Gas Field Is Extended By Two New Strikes

Shell Oil Co. No. 9 Mitchell, in 10-1666-1. Z. Bullock, indicated 3/4-mile northeast extension on the northwest side of the JM (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona, has flowed gas at two additional intervals while drilling.

It flowed gas rated at 1.5 million cubic feet while drilling at an unreported depth between 13,782 and 14,002 feet.

Earlier, it flowed gas for 30 minutes at the daily rate of 1 million cubic feet when drilling reached 13,792 feet in a sidetracked hole, and still earlier, at the daily rate of 650,000 cubic feet when drilling reached 13,416 feet.

While drilling in the original hole, it flowed gas rated at 13 million cubic feet daily at 13,808 feet; 7.5 million cubic feet at 13,135 feet, and 6 million cubic feet at 12,946 feet.

Gulf Oil Corp's No. 10-A Mitchell, in 72-Q2-GC&SF, 7/8 mile southeast of production in the JM (Ellenburger gas) field, flowed gas at the daily rate of 103,000 cubic feet per day for 24 hours.

Flow was through an 18-64-inch choke and perforations at 13,583-398 feet.

itiated by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee in 1964. The two markers previously erected honor former Governors William P. Hobby and Allan Shivers.

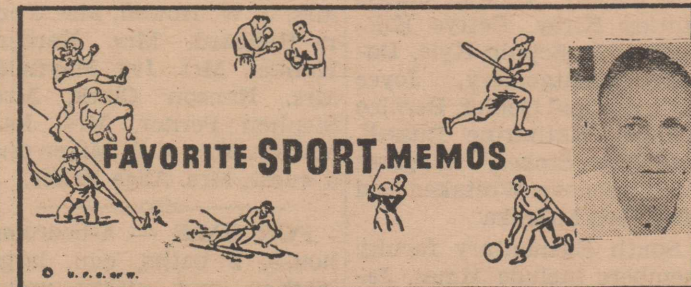
Master of ceremonies will be Homer Leonard of Austin, former Speaker of the House of Representatives.

one-hour final shut-in pressures were 3,011 and 2,927 pounds, respectively.

A 28-minute drillstem test in the Wolfcamp between 4,897-5,010 feet surfaced gas in three minutes, mud in 10 minutes and oil in 17 minutes, and flowed gas at the daily rate of 3 million cubic feet, plus 55 barrels of oil per hour. Flowing pressure was 564-552 pounds, 30-minute initial shut-in pressure and 45-minute final shut-in pressures were 2,438 and 2,410 pounds, respectively.

On the one-hour drillstem test taken in the lower Leonard between 4,625-707 feet, gas surfaced in three minutes at the rate of 577,000 cubic feet per day. Reversed out was 1/2 barrel of oil and 450 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 141-198 pounds; 30-minute initial and final shut-in pressures were 2,057 and 2,310 pounds, respectively.

There was no further information released by the operator which has drilled the well "eight." Contract depth is 7,000 feet.
