## Grand Jury Returns Six Indictments

Six indictments were returned this week by a Crockett county grand jury which was impaneled Monday morning for the Spring term of the 112th district court by Judge Charles Sherrill of Fort Stockton.

The jury returned four indictments Monday and then recessed until Wednesday morning when it was reconvened and found two additional indictments.

Four defendants were named in indictments returned Monday, charges including felony theft, burglary, forgery and passing a forged instrument, and child desertion.

The theft indictment returned Monday charged theft of a pickup truck belonging to John Smith of Ozonia. No arrest has been made in this case.

Jose R. Rodriguez was charged with burglary in connection with robbery of the Ozonia Butane Co. several weeks ago.

Thomas F. McClain was indicted for forgery and passing a forged instrument the indictment charging he forged a check which was cashed by Doyle Elmore at the Ozonia Oil Co. No arrest had been made yesterday in the child desertion case.

Two indictments were returned Wednesday morning, both against Jack Minica, for felony theft. One indictment was for theft of 50 joints of pipe February 15, from B. W. Wiseman, Jr., and the other for 6 joints of pipe on or around March 22, from Calvin Douglas, Minica was release on bond.

The above cases will be disposed of in trial before the judge or by jury within the next six months.

## Judge Appoints Widow To Serve As Commissioner

Mrs. Rex Halydier, widow of the late Precinct 2 County Commissioner, was appointed this week by County Judge Bernice Jones to serve as commissioner from that precinct until the next general election, which will be in November, 1968.

Mrs. Halydier is the second woman to serve as a county commissioner in Crockett county and the fifth to be appointed to fill the office vacated by their deceased husbands. Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Sr., was appointed to fill out the term of her husband as commissioner from Precinct 1, Mrs. W. S. Willis was appointed sheriff following the death of her husband while holding that post in the county, and Mrs. Tom Casbeer succeeded her husband as county treasurer.

Judge Jones herself was appointed by the Commissioners Court as county judge following the death of her husband while in office. She has since been elected to a full term in the office which she is now serving.

Miss Leta Powell, county and district clerk, was also inducted into office by appointment. She had served many years as deputy clerk under the late George Russell and at his death in 1954 she was appointed to serve until the next general election, the widow being named as deputy clerk. Miss Powell has since been elected without opposition to successive terms in the post.

Funeral services for Carl Hurst, 78, were held Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from James Funeral Home with Rev. John Henry Cash, pastor of the Comstock Baptist Church, conducting services. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Hurst died Monday afternoon in Crockett County Hospital after a lengthy illness. He was born in Royce City Feb. 11, 1889.

Mr. Hurst was a barber here for many years before moving to Comstock, where he was in the restaurant business. He returned to Ozonia two years ago.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. Mabel Wakefield of Ozonia; a half brother, Arthur Boag of Alba, a niece and a nephew.

## FOR SONORA YOUTH — 5-Year Probated Sentence Imposed On Murder Count

Robert Ramos, 19, of Sonora received a 5-year probated sentence, after pleading guilty to charges of murder without malice in Dist. Judge Charles Sherrill's court here Tuesday morning. Ramos waived the jury and submitted his punishment to the court. The sentence carried the provision that Ramos not return to Sutton County.

The youth was charged in connection with the shooting death of a classmate, Juan Jose Arrebaldo, also of Sonora, three years ago, at which time Ramos was a juvenile.

He has been in the state training school at Gadsdenville, on a charge of firing a gunshot at Highway Patrolman Joe Wylie, since shortly after the incident.

A Sutton County grand jury decided Jan. 16 that the youth should stand trial in connection with the death after Dist. Atty. Dixon Mahon indicated that Ramos would either have to be brought to trial or released from the state training school on probation at that time.

The trial was moved here on a change of venue earlier this year. Ed Idar, San Angelo attorney, was appointed to represent the youth.

## Lions Capture Title At Iraan's Cactus Relays

In their last warm-up prior to the district meet, Coach Chick Womack's tracksters captured the championship at the 11th Annual Cactus Relays last Saturday in Iraan. The Lions won the meet with 134½ points aided by 5 first places, but the Rankin Red Devils stayed right behind the Lions all the way. The Ozonia victory in the mile relay gave the Lions the victory. Rankin finished second with 124½ points.

Maggie Galindo, George Cox, and Gary Sutton won first places as did the mile relay team of Cox, Rodney Pagan, Fleet Coates, and Derold Maney.

Galindo, OHS letterman distance runner, came on in the final lap for a 5:05.8 mile several seconds off his best time of 4:54.3.

Cox again won the 220 yard dash in addition to running on the mile and 440 yard relay teams. Cox's time for the 220 was 22.1; thus, Cox will enter the district meet undefeated at this distance.

## County Ranchers Receive \$394,500 In Incentive Pay

Checks totalling \$394,500 were mailed this week to 164 Crockett county ranchers representing incentive payments on wool and mohair marketed during the calendar year 1966. Cliff Elder, office manager of the Crockett county Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization office announced.

The wool incentive level was fixed at 24.8 percent, the percentage difference between the national average price received by growers for their wool and the support level fixed at 65 cents per pound.

The national average price of wool was found to be 52.2 cents per pound. The Crockett county average price made the sharpest drop from the national average last year in the history of the incentive program. The county average price was 46.9 cents per pound. The 1965 national average was 47.1 cents per pound while the county average was 46.5 cents, making the incentive rate that year 31.6 percent.

The mohair incentive level was set at 41.2 percent on a national average price of 53.7 cents per pound. The county average price was a little above the national, 54.8 cents. A total of 120 Crockett county growers marketed mohair totalling 707,000 pounds on which incentive payments of \$149,000 were made.

Crockett county wool producers numbered 164, marketing 2,100,000 pounds of wool in 1966, for which they received \$245,500 in incentive payments.

To account for wool marketed on the backs of unshorn lambs sold by ranchmen, the incentive rate was set at 52 cents per hundredweight of live animal. Unshorn lambs sold in the county weighed 7,368,000 pounds.

Ozonia FFA Judging teams won the sweepstakes award at the Sul Ross College judging contests in Alpine last weekend. The award is given to the team placing highest in all contests. Ozonia teams were tied with the Eldorado teams with 13 points each. Ozonia won by a flip of a coin and was awarded the winning banner. The points were compiled in range, wool and livestock judging.

In the range judging, the Ozonia team placed second in overall competition. Placing first in range placings, they placed third in plant identification. Mike Baker was high individual with Kenneth Davis second in range placings. Baker was second and Davis fourth in overall individual awards. Other members of the team were Bobby Mayfield and Gale Cavanaugh.

Ozonia placed third in wool judging competition. Buddy Couch was fourth high individual in the contest. Other wool judges were Charles Childress and Steve Hubbard.

The livestock judging team consisting of Dwight Childress, Bill Everett, David Cooke and Rex Bland, tied with Iraan for eighth place. Dwight Childress was second high individual in cattle judging.

Friday night prior to the Sul Ross contests the Ozonia FFA team participated in a practice wool judging contest held at Marfa, placing second. In individual standings Buddy Couch placed third; Charles Childress, fourth, and Steve Hubbard, eighth.

An Ozonia-Rankin scramble for the championship trophy appears to be in the making when the 8 member schools of District 8A meet in the district track meet tomorrow at Lion Stadium with preliminaries to begin at 8 a. m. and finals set for 3 p. m. Three divisions will be underway at the same time as the varsity squads, B-teams, and elementary divisions will each be competing for a championship.

The Ozonia Lions, coached by Chick Womack and assistants Joe Marlett, Grosse Moehler, and Harry Earles, may rate the favorite roll on the basis of championships at the Ozonia, Sonora, and Iraan meets as well as its runnerup spot in the big San Angelo meet.

But the Rankin Red Devils have the overall team strength to give the Lions quite a battle for the district title. The Red Devils have strong potential in the relays and sprints along with a good hurdler, quarter miler, and half miler. Sonora and Eldorado cannot be counted out and their point total could go a long way toward determining the championship. Other member schools are Menard, Junction, Iraan and Sanderson.

At least 5 District 8A records—recorded since 1965—are in danger with Ozonia's Gary Sutton and George Cox most likely to set new marks. Sutton should easily break his own record of 158"-1¼" set last year, and Cox old mark was 23.7. Sutton or John Mayo of Eldorado are both capable of breaking the shot record of 54'-8¾" set last year by Don Childs of Big Lake. Laney Cook, Sonora, will have a shot at his high hurdle mark of 14.9 set last year. Rankin and Ozonia 440 yard relay teams could better the 44.4 held jointly by Eldorado and Ozonia teams. And the Ozonia mile relay team of Derold Maney, Fleet Coates, Rodney Pagan, and Cox have an excellent chance to snap the 3:30.3 mark by Sanderson in 1965. ## Three Incumbent School Trustees Are Re-Elected

Only 284 votes were cast in Saturday's School Trustee election, which returned all three incumbents to office. The small vote reflected either a lack of interest on the part of voters, or satisfaction with the present administration. The total vote was almost 200 less than last year's total of 483, which was off from the previous year.

Taylor Deaton, incumbent and secretary of the board, led the ticket with 179 votes, followed by Charles E. Davidson, III, with 174, and Bill Carson, board president, with 151 votes.

Other candidates on the ballot were Bill Lewter, who received 100 votes and Mrs. Boyd Baker with 50. Harold Shaw, the only write-in candidate, received 91 votes.

In the County School Board election, both incumbents were unopposed and were returned to office with totals of 248 votes for Hillery Phillips, trustee for Precinct 1, and 262 for W. W. West, trustee at large.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Backyard Barbecued Chicken

3 lb. fryer quartered  
3 lb. GPA  
1 cup dry white wine  
1/2 cup soy sauce  
1 teas. powdered ginger  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
Put wine, soy sauce, ginger and garlic in a jar and shake well. Place the chicken pieces in a glass bowl, pour the marinade over, and chill several hours. At serving time drain chicken pieces on paper towels, and grill over a good charcoal fire, turning several times and basting with the marinade. Cook 2 to 3 inches from heat for 25 to 30 minutes. This recipe can be easily doubled, serves four as is.

Roasted Corn

This is an easy way to roast corn on an out-door grill.

Pull the husks back, not off, remove all the silk from each ear. Replace the husks. Soak the ears 10 minutes or so in a bucket of water. Shake off the water and lay the ears on the grill, over hot coals but not on them, and let them steam about 20 minutes if the corn is young, 25 minutes if on the mature side. Turn occasionally.

Simple Tossed Green Salad

Mixed greens  
1 cup salad oil or half olive oil  
1/4 cup wine vinegar or lemon juice  
1 teas. mixed dried herbs  
1 scant teas. salt  
Fresh-ground black pepper to taste  
Mix all ingredients except greens in a jar and shake well. Tear up greens, making sure they are well washed and crisp, and placed in chilled bowl. Coat greens with dressing and toss well.

Location is 1,895 feet from the north and 1,905 feet from the east lines of 1-31-University. Contract depth is 1,500 feet.

The discovery, the same operator's No. 1-12 University, was finalized Feb. 22 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5 million cubic feet of gas per day, from open hole between 900-1,425 feet.

Shell Oil Co. No. 8 Mitchell, in 10-NNN-1. Z. Bullock, eighth producer and 7/8-mile northwest extension to the JM (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona, flowed gas at the daily rate of 4.6

million cubic feet, plus 156 barrels of load water in 24 hour.

Flow was through a 22-64-inch choke and perforations between 12,940-13,919 feet. Testing continued.

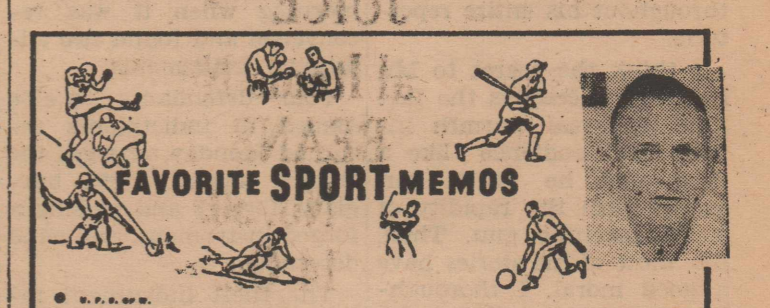

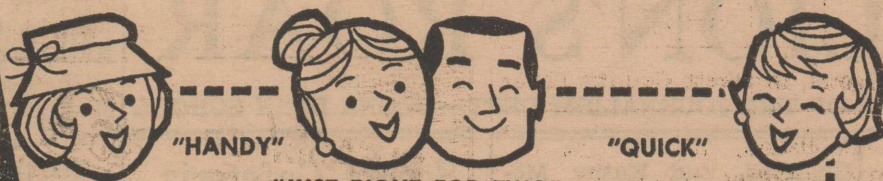

### Ozona Student May Shelve College Business Training In Favor Of Guitar Pickin'

Denton, Texas — What started out as a career in the marketing world may end up in a musical career for David Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted M. Lewis of Ozona. David, a freshman at North Texas State University, answered an ad in a local paper wanting musicians for a rock and roll band and that started the wheel turning.

Lewis auditioned and he made lead guitar in the new campus band called THEM WHAT'S GOT!? That is a weird name for a band, Lewis admits, but he explains its origin thus: "We were all just sitting around trying real hard to think of a name that would be out of the ordinary and yet would be different from all of the other crazy group names. The band of which Lewis is now a member consists of three guitars and a drummer and a singer. The other members of the band are Oobert Alanis from Bandera, Steve Gates from Iowa, Larry Powers from Arkansas and Mal Richards from Sweetwater, Texas.

Lewis hopes that in the summer his group can go to Los Angeles and play some of the top teen night spots but next spring he plans to be right back at North Texas.
