# Kitty's Kitchen

Recipe of the Week

From

- 3 lb. fryer quartered 3 IL. GPA
- I cup dry white wine ½ cup soy sauce
- 1 teas. powdered ginger 1 clove garlic, crushed

Put wine, soy sauce, ginger and garlic in a jar and shake well. Place the chicken pieces in a glass bowl, pour the marinade over, and chill several hours. At serving time drain chicken pieces on paper towels, and grill over a good charcoal fire, turning several times and basting with the marinade. Cook 2 to 3 inches from heat for 25 to 30 minutes. This recipe can be easily doubled, serves four as is.

Pull the husks back, not off, remove all the silk from each ear. Replace the husks. Soak the ears 10 minutes or so in a bucket of water. 
