Dr. King is unaware of the rising tide of indignation across the nation brought on by the scandalous waste in the poverty program along with the rioting and lawlessness carried on in the name of civil rights. It offends his logic when he is told he must be more concerned with civil rights and poverty than with the war in Viet Nam, where the cream of our youth crop, black, white, brown and yellow are fighting and dying. Our popular spectator sport of prize-fighting had its origin in some pretty bloody gladiatorial contests of Greece and Rome. Here, using a primitive form of brass knuckles known as the 'caestus,' the contestants were prisoners and slaves who foght one another to bloody deaths in the arena. The modern version of this sport, rugged though it may seem at times, originated in England. Here the spirit of humanity and fair play infected the sport. In 1866 it was systematized and refined by John G. Chambers and the Eighth Marquis of Queensbury after whom the famous rules of the ring are named.
