These were the looters. One might fill this entire newspaper with authenticated cases. In some instances the looters carried expensive transistor radios which had been professionally improved with a special attachment which permitted the owner to hear all police-band radio

There comes to mind a disaster which struck many years ago when a river ran riot. It was an "Act of God." Not man. The National Guard was moved in, and the first order from the Govvernor's office was: "looters will be shot on sight."

There was no exception. There were no conditions. Age, sex, color mattered not. From childhood it has always seemed that this was, indeed, the law of the land. For what erime could be more despicable than to carry off the property of those already the victims of disaster. And how much more despicable to cause the disaster and then loot!

No governor, to our knowledge, has issued any such order concerning looters, And until one governor does, and others follow suit, cities large and small in every one of the 50 States will be looted.
