

A wierd and Demagogic decision was recently handed down by a Federal Judge in Washington. It invades the legislative field by outlawing the "tract" system of bunching students in local schools in accordance with their mentality and learning ability. The opinion forces school authorities to mix the mentally retarded with the more alert youngsters in the same classes in the District of Col-

The decision, by a Judge tempts to outdo anything the Supreme Court has ever to another in order to get a better mix of negroes and whites. And it forces a mixture of white and negro teachers in the district schools. It happens that 23% of the teachers here are white, and the Judge directs that they be distributed equally among all the schools in order to fully integrate the teachers.



The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a war-rant upon the Treasury in printed thereon the following: favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of war-rants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Air Force Reserve, and the






