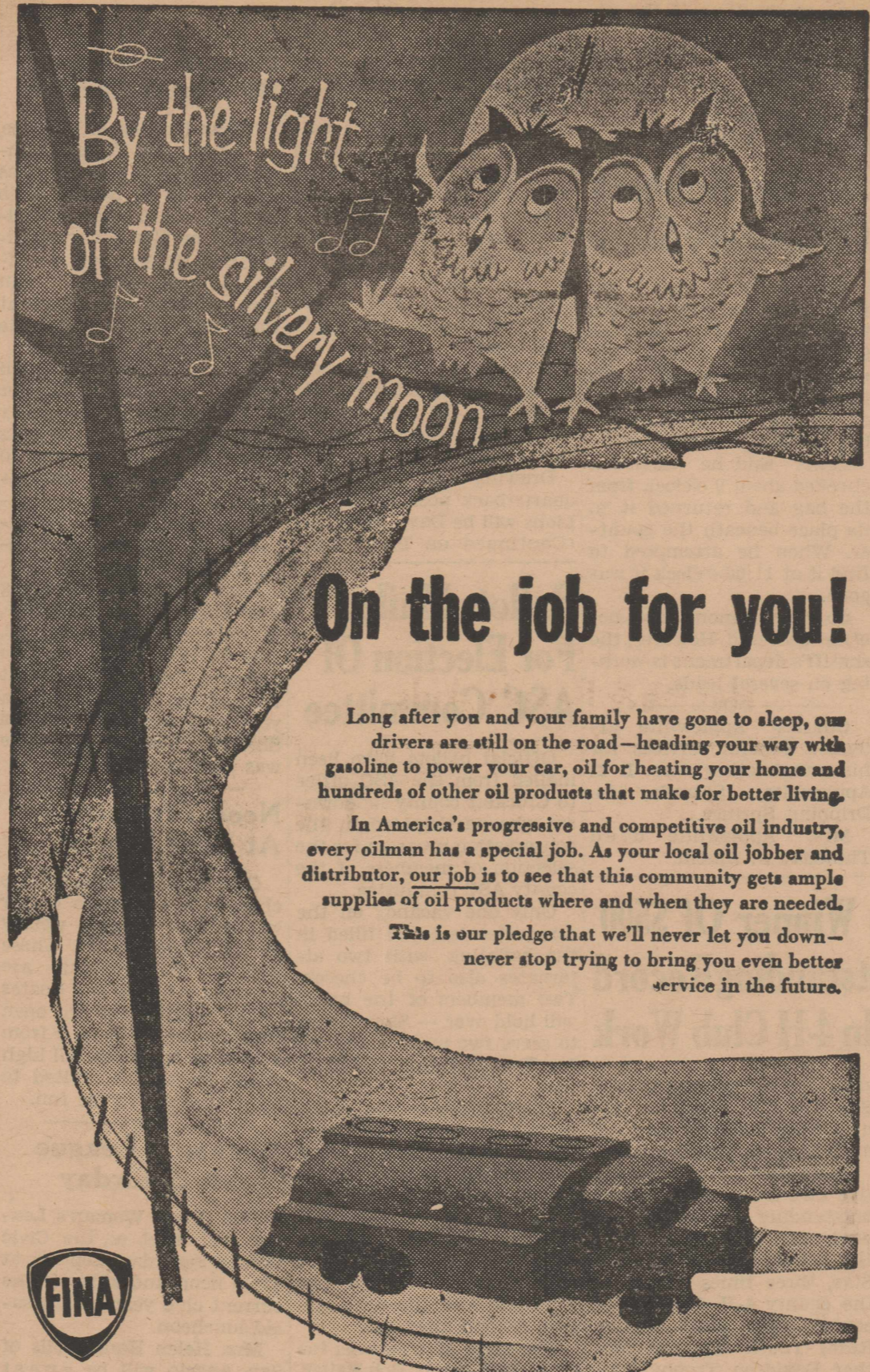

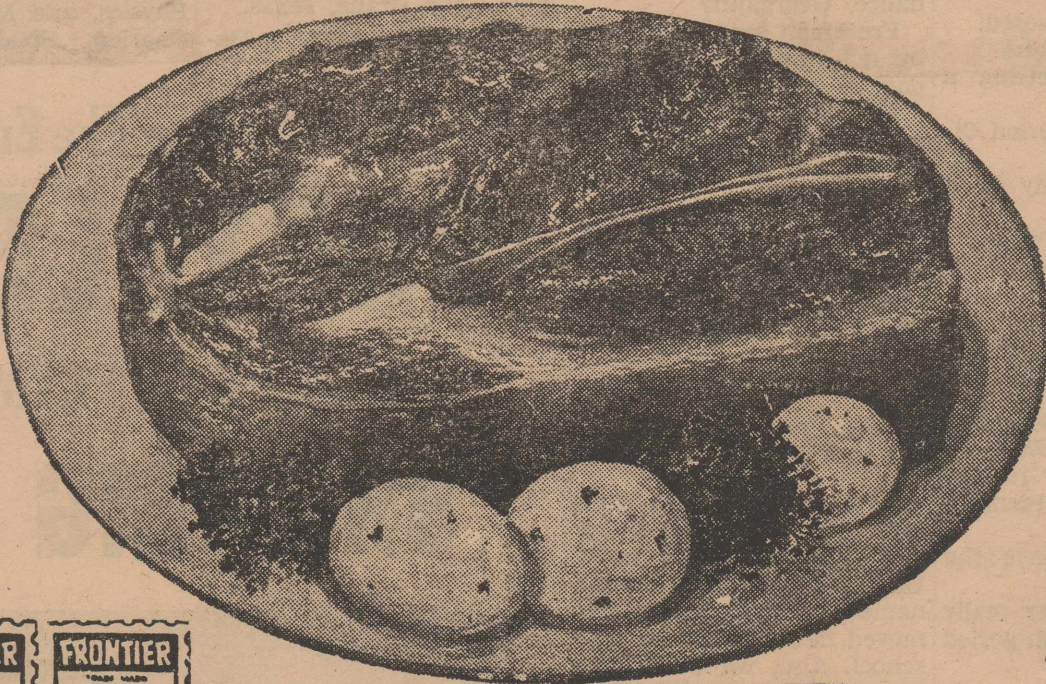

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Poppy Seed Poundcake

1/2 cup poppy seed
1 package poundcake mix
1/2 teas. vanilla extract
1 tablespoon finely-grated lemon peel

Pre-heat oven to 325 degrees. Toast poppy seed as follows: Place in a pie plate, bake about 15 minutes or until crisp, shaking pie plate every 5 minutes for even toasting. Cool.

Make up poundcake batter as cake-mix label directs. Just before pouring into loaf pan, stir in poppy seed, vanilla and lemon rind until blended. Use 10" by 5" by 3" loaf pan, prepare pan as label directs. Bake cake 1 hour and 15 minutes or until top is golden, and cake tester, inserted in center, comes out clean. Cool cake in pan

on rack, about 20 minutes. Then loosen edges carefully with spatula, turn cake out on rack and cool completely. Frost with lemon icing.

Lemon Icing

1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
1 1/2 teas. vanilla extract
1 1/2 tbs. milk
1 1/2 tbs. lemon juice
yellow food color
grated rind 1 large lemon
1 tbs. poppy seed

Cream margarine until soft, gradually beat in 1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar, then vanilla, milk and lemon juice. Gradually beat in remaining sugar until icing is light and fluffy. Color icing pale yellow with food coloring. Spread on top and sides of cake with spatula. Sprinkle top with lemon rind and poppy seed.

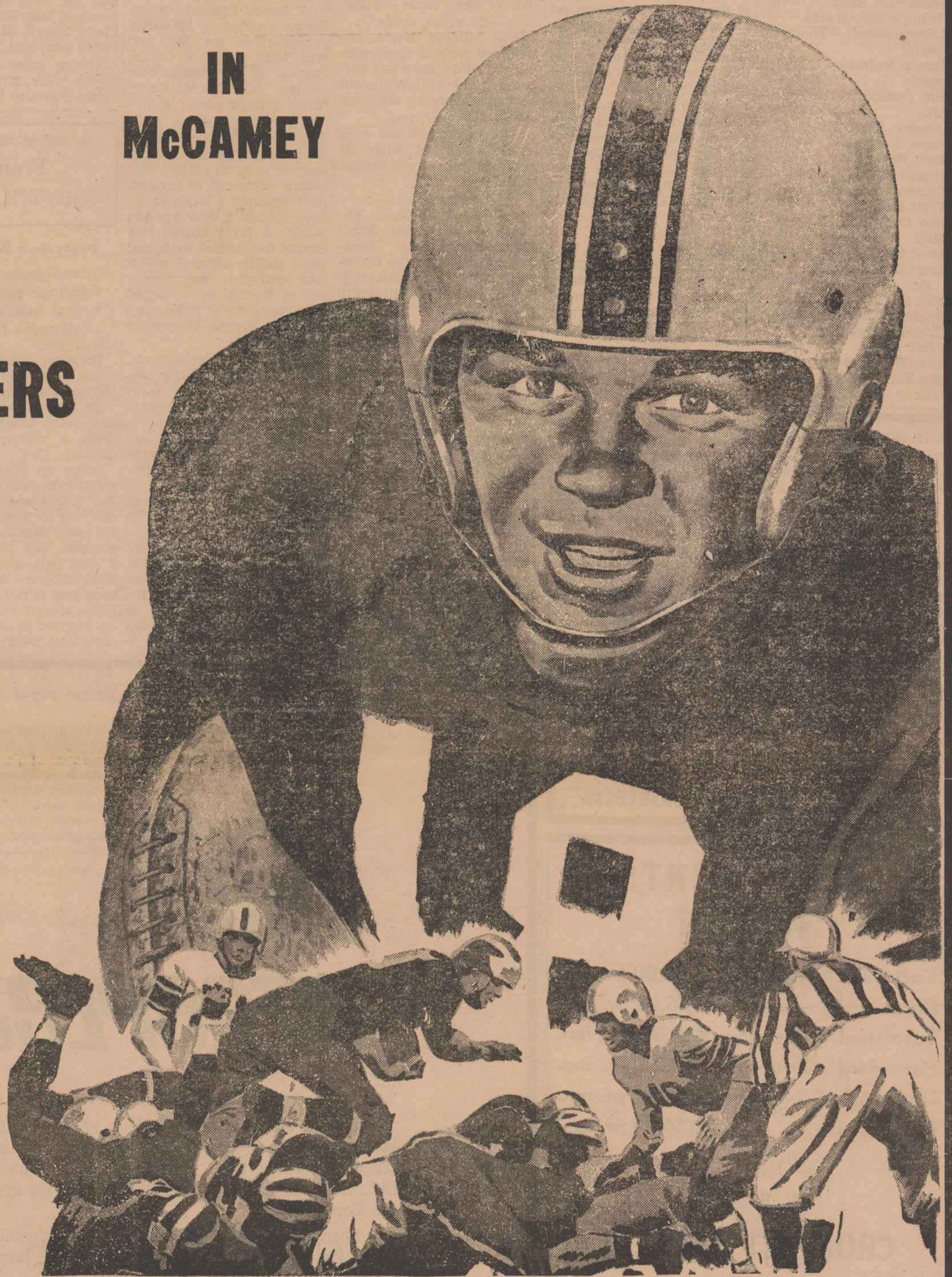

Wise and Otherwise
 Rambling Reflections
 By Dr. R. F. Curl

My wife is an avid television fan, although even she cannot stomach the tawdry day-time tidbits of soap opera. I must confess that I also have an eye and ear for this marvelous communication medium. I do honestly believe, however, that I am more selective in my viewing. Fortunately from long years of training I have a built-in mechanism by which I can tune out distracting sounds and sights and go serenely on reading. In this way I have put in a few chapters of my current favorite, Short's "The Gospel According to Peanuts", while Lawrence Welk and his crew were in full blast with their well-rendered selections which some wag has claimed are to music what fundamentalism is to theology.

But I started out to say that two particular programs have caught my eager attention in recent days. One was the Billy Graham broadcast from England. He is a marvelous preacher and has all the technique of modern attention getting psychological devices.

I have heard the man many times on radio and by television. Only twice have I been in a live audience in which he was speaker. Once was in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas. There were 70,000 people there and I would have needed a telescope to have seen him. The loudspeakers carried his voice, although with something of a harsh and metallic twang. So you can see I didn't get so much from that personal appearance of a truly great preacher and speaker as I did last week over television.

Which serves to remind me, that I am puzzled as to why folks like back pews in church services. Any preacher can testify they do. And I must confess that I am no man for the front bench myself. I try to fool myself that

it is because I am innately modest and do not wish to parade myself in ostentatious fashion. I am sure that I deceive myself and that I really have other deep-lurking inhibitions — maybe even an inferiority complex.

Be that as it may however, I shy away from the front pew. But neither do I want the back row either. When I pay my money at the ball game, the concert, or the theater I want to sit up front where I'll be sure to see and hear all that goes on. And in church of all places I like to get down close enough to see the preacher's eyeballs. For as in no other form of communication is the whole man involved as he is in preaching. Phillips Brooks, that great Episcopalian preacher who charmed and challenged the elite city of Boston for a whole generation, during a time when it was at the apex of its glory, once defined preaching as "The communication of truth through personality." So the preacher does truly preach as much by his tones and overtones, his facial gestures, and his movements as by his words.

For that reason I was exceedingly glad that I had a ringside seat to hear Billy Graham about a year ago when he addressed three thousand American churchmen at a luncheon meeting. I was right down almost at his feet and he came through in the same superb way that I saw and heard last week from London.

He has a Biblical message that applies in most relevant fashion to our day. He finds the truth in the Bible and applies it to the individual in both his personal life and his relationships in the world of which he is a part.

We are fortunate that his full-length, professionally produced, film, "The Restless Ones," is to be shown at The Ranch Theatre this fall. It deals with the problems and challenges which our teen-

agers face.

It will be deserving of the widest possible viewing by both youth and adults. Brother Jim Hancock is Chairman for the promotion of attendance on this film. He will deserve, and I am sure, receive the fullest help from many, many Ozona citizens interested in our young people.

The other recent television production that moved me was the grand final showing of "What's My Line" which bowed out last Sunday night after seventeen and one-half years. The viewing was for me somewhat nostalgic. In a way it marks the end of an era not only for the producers and performers but for the millions of viewers.

If you saw it, I know you were impressed by the reproduction of some scenes from the very first telecast. My wife and I were amazed to be reminded of the great strides television broadcasting has had. We were watching Sunday night's show in the very beautiful color, which our cable has been bringing in recently in wonderful fidelity despite the handicaps a cable has in distance, temperatures, and atmospheric conditions. No one can even imagine what the future will bring with instant world-wide telestar casting just around the corner. But you can be sure you are going to be living in much more contact with those black and yellow brothers who form a part of God's human family.

I was amazed and startled when the producer Sunday night reminded us that since "What's My Line" came on

the air 70,000,000 babies have been born in these United States.

"What's My Line" will be seen no more, unless the enterprising producers begin those ceaseless rounds of dreary re-runs. But the problems of population explosion and distance annihilation will continue. More and more of us will live closer and closer together. Tell me, please, how we shall get ready for this.



Gulf Oil Corp. filed applications to re-enter and complete the lower zones as wildcats and the upper zones as wildcats and the upper zones as wildcats or extensions to 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production at two projects in the Tippet multipay field of Crockett County, 10 miles southeast of McCamey.

The No. 1-G J. H. Tippet, former Devonian gas producer, 3 1/4 mile northeast of 4,950-foot Wolfcamp oil production and one location southeast of lower Leonard oil production, will be plugged back to 6,370 feet.

It was drilled to 6,362 feet and completed in February, 1948 and deepened and re-completed in the Devonian for 6 million cubic feet of gas daily at plugged-back

depth of 6,420 feet. Location is 3,501 feet from the northeast and 330 feet from the northwest liens of 40-31-H&TC.

The No. 4-B J. H. Tippet, completed this year as a small lower Leonard oil producer and in March 1956 from the regular Wolfcamp field pay, will plug back to 6,180 feet.

Operator had filed application Aug. 23 to plug back to 6,500 feet and complete as a 5/8-mile northeast extension to 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production.

Location is 4,508 feet from the northeast and 440 feet from the southeast lines of 40-H&TC.
