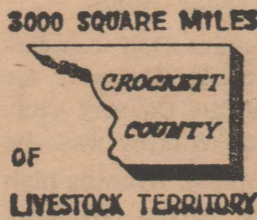

## Former Ozonan Dies In Houston After Seizure

Mrs. Jerry Beasley, 28, died at 11:00 a. m. Wednesday in a Houston hospital after being stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage at her home in Houston the previous Wednesday night. Funeral services are pending at Janes Funeral Home. Mrs. Beasley never regained consciousness after the seizure. She had been in apparent good health before the fatal attack.

Mrs. Beasley, the former Cecilia Ann Cooke, was born in Boerne February 10, 1939. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cleophas Cooke, she lived in Ozona all her life until her marriage to Jerry Beasley in 1956. They had been residing in Houston for the past two years, where she was employed with NASA. Mrs. Beasley was a member of the Baptist Church, a descendant of one of Crockett county's pioneer families.

Surviving are her husband and two daughters, Karen, 10, and Leann, 8; one son, Wade, 6, all of the home; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cleophas Cooke, of Ozona and Bob Cooke of Morehead City, N. C.; her maternal grandmother, Mrs. S. E. Norris of Boerne; two nephews, and numerous aunts, uncles and cousins.

Cliff Elder, Crockett County ASCS office manager, reminds ranchmen who have sold wool, unshorn lambs or mohair that they should come by the office and sign applications for 1967 incentive payments.

"You will need to have the dates of shearing and the number of head shorn, as this information must be entered on the applications. Also be sure to report any purchases of unshorn lambs, this includes unshorn buck lambs," Elder added.

Some funds are still on hand for 1967 conservation practices, Mr. Elder said. Ranchmen who plan to do such work are asked to call the office before starting the work.

She will be in charge of all entries in Crockett County. Anyone interested in entering the contest may contact her at the Homemaking Department at high school.

The contest is divided into four divisions, sub-divisions includes girls between the ages of 10 and 13; junior division will be ages 14 through 16; senior division consists of girls from 17 through 21 and those 21 and over will compete in the adult division.

Deadline for entries is November 18 and the district 5 and 6 competition will be held December 2 at the Schleicher County High School in Eldorado. Counties included in the two competing districts are Bander, Crockett, Edwards, Gillespie, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney, McCulloch, Mason, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton and Val Verde. District winners will compete in the state contest.

National winners will receive a trip to Rome, Athens, the Greek Isles and Madrid. There are many other prizes to be given at the district, state and the national contests.

### P. O. Dept. To Distribute Zip Code Information

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced yesterday that Zip-a-List kits will be distributed to all local box holders during the period Sept. 10, 18 and Oct. 1. Persons not receiving mail through boxes may request a kit at the post office window.

Patrons are urged to use the postal cards in the kits to obtain zip codes needed for addresses in their personal mailing lists. Each boxholder will receive eight cards with spaces for the addresses to be zipped by the post office and for the return address. No postage is needed. Users are reminded to print clearly and include their return address in order that the post office will know where to deliver the completed forms. Without the return address, it is impossible to return the forms. In addition to the Kit, which is folded like a closed accordion, a separate card will be delivered to remind residents of the local zip code.

The project is part of the Postmaster General's program to make zip codes more accessible to the mailing public and thereby increase the use of the codes in mailing addresses.

Zip code is necessary all year round, says postmaster Hokit, but it is more important than ever around the holiday season. Zip Code increases mail accuracy and assures prompt delivery.

### Lions, Badgers Battle To 13-13 Tie In Opener

Ozona's Lions and the McCamey Badgers fought to a bruising 13-13 deadlock last Friday night in McCamey in the season opener for both schools. Ozona scored on its first two possessions and held a 13 point lead with over 4 minutes remaining in the first period. But the Badgers came back for TD's in the 3rd and 4th quarters to knot the score. The final and tying TD by the Badgers came with less than three minutes in the ball game.

Kicking off, the Lions forced McCamey to punt and took over the ball at the Lion 42. In a beautifully executed drive, the Lions drove in for the score in 9 plays. With strong blocking up front and with Fleet Coates, Rodney Pagan, and Randal Clepper getting calls from QB David Huff, the Lions stayed on the ground to the McCamey 13 yard line where David Huff found end Larry Kilgore alone in the right corner of the end zone and hit him with a scoring pass.

In the scoring drive, Coates had runs of 4, 6, and 4 yards; Pagan went for 18, 2, and 5 yards; and Clepper had two carries for 10 yards. Larry Don Webb kicked the extra point. Ozona 7 - McCamey 0.

Again holding the Badgers at bay, the Lions scored on their next possession. The scoring drive was good for 55 yards, but 40 yards of it came on the scoring pass from end Donald Huff to halfback Coates. Huff, coming around from his end position, hit Coates going full stride at the 12, and the Lion left halfback scooted in for the score. The extra point attempt was no good, but the Lions lead was 13-0.

Stymied on the ground by the fierce line play of the Lions, the Badgers gained most of their yardage and tying scores with a passing attack spearheaded by QB Marvin Landers and end Nolan McMarilyon.

The Lions hope to counter the Owl attack with a balanced passing and running attack of their own. OHS has strong runners in Fleet Coates, Rodney Pagan, and Randal Clepper as well as Beto Diaz. The Lion passing attack has QB David Huff at the helm. The southpaw, who started his first game at QB last Friday night, has good receivers in Donald Huff and Larry Kilgore, along with Coates, Pagan, and Clepper.

The Lions interior linemen are veterans with good size. The guards are 190 pound John DeHoyos and hard hitting 150 pound Johnny Barbee. At center it's 210 lb. Marlin Farris, and the tackles are manned by two of the district's top tackles in 220 lb. Gary Sutton, All-West Texas as well as All-District in 1966, and Wesley West, a 180 lb. senior, who made the first team All-District offensive team in 1966. West was injured early in the McCamey game and did not play in the second half, but is expected to be ready for the game against the Owls.

When the Lions switch from offense to defense, possibly two changes may be made. Beto Vargas will come in to play one corner, and Diaz could see some action at a defensive halfback.

Mosley and Gerber are hoping all hands will be ready tomorrow night after several bruises and minor injuries suffered in the hard-hitting McCamey game.

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Navy ROTC Tests Now Available

Applications for the Navy's twenty-second annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to J. A. Peltó, principal at Ozona High School. This nationwide examination will be given December 9 and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Mr. Peltó explained, over 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipman at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on 30 June 1968, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

Twice the Lions drove inside the McCamey 20 during the second half but were unable to push on in for a TD.

Late in the fourth quarter McCamey drove some 80 yds for the tying TD with most of the yardage coming on two plays. Nearly 40 yards was picked up when officials called the Lions for pass interference. The final 36 yards and the TD came on a desperation pass from Landers to McMarilyn, who caught the ball right at the Lion goal. The attempted place kick to put the McCamey crew ahead was stopped when the Lion forward wall, led by tackle Gary Sutton, put on a big rush and forced the kicker to hurry his attempt.

The Ozona defense against the McCamey running game was double tough, allowing the Badger runners only 50 yards net rushing, while Lion rushers picked up 187 yards.
