**Bernice Jones Named Outstanding Citizen**

Around 140 Ozonans and area people were on hand Thursday evening at the Civic Center for the 7th Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Highlights of the program were keynote speaker, Mayor Jim Reese of Odessa, and the presentation of Ozona's outstanding citizen of the year, former County Judge Bernice Jones.

Other towns represented were San Angelo, Sonora, Odessa, Van Horn, Brownwood, Big Spring and Brady. In his address, which many declared was the best yet, Reese stressed the importance of dedication, optimism and responsibility.

Sprinkled with humor, his talk outline five areas of responsibility. The first, the individual's responsibility to himself; the second, responsibility to one's family; third, to one's community, and the final two, responsibility to the government and to God.

Past president Lawrence Jones expressed appreciation for the work of the officers, directors and various chamber members who had served on committees during the year. He then turned the gavel over to incoming president C. O. (Lefty) Walker, who introduced the 1971 officers and directors, and presented Jones a gift for his dedication over the past year.

Walker expressed a desire to hear any suggestions or criticism during the year whereby the chamber could help Ozona. Jim Marks, outgoing director, introduced Mrs. Jones and presented her with this year's outstanding citizen plaque for her "lifelong devotion to civic work."

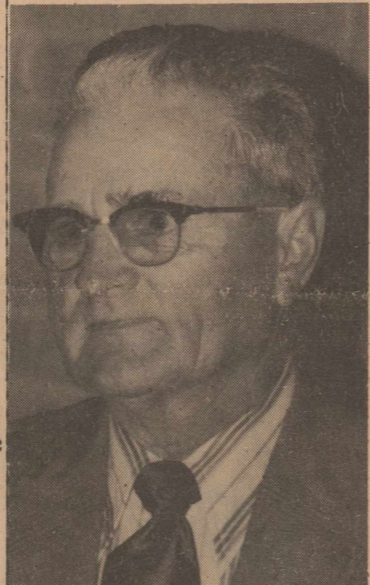

**Lions Drop Playoff To Crane To End Season**

Basketball season ended last Friday night for the Ozona Lions and their fans when they took a 57-36 drubbing at the hands of the Crane Golden Cranes in Iran. Both teams were well represented and there was standing room only in the packed gym.

The Lions led only once and that was when they made the first field goal. After that, it was Crane all the way. The Lions had a tremendous number of turn-overs and only hit for 21 percent of their shots. Only one Lion was in double figures and that was David Pagan with 13.

The Lions ended the season with 20 wins and 10 losses and were co-champions with Crane for district 5-AA. David Pagan was over-all high scorer for the Lions with 306 points in 25 games for a total of 12.2 points per game.

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He led in field goals with 122 and in assists with 51. Will Collett collected the most rebounds for the Lions with 199 for the season. He scored 294 points in 30 games for an average of 9.8 points per game and was second to Pagan in total points scored.

Jim Montgomery was the only other Lion to score over 200 points for the season and had the most free throws with 74. He scored 204 points in 28 games for an average of 7.3 points per game. Mickey McBroom had the best field goal percentage with 46%. Mike Jenkins had the best free throw percentage with 69% and Ruben Tambunga led in recoveries with 113.

As a team the Lions scored 1,523 points in 30 games for an average of 50.8 points per game. Their outstanding defense was responsible for most of their victories.

**Load Increases --- County Seeks Head Commodity Distribution**

Due to the increase in families receiving commodities under the Commodity Distribution Program in Crockett County a special meeting of the commissioners court was called last Thursday. The court met with E. H. Vaughn, Assistant Director, Commodity Distribution Division, to discuss the increased workload.

The present commodities program, which is shared with Sutton and Edwards counties is no longer adequate, according to the court. So, an agreement was made to separate Crockett County from the Sutton-Edwards program as of March 1.

Under the new program, Crockett County will hire a full-time worker-supervisor for the commodities program. The county will pay \$410 per month as a starting salary, plus giving the successful applicant all county employee benefits.

Applications for the job are being accepted by Judge Troy Williams now and will be accepted until next Thursday. Applicants will be interviewed Friday, Feb. 26, beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Requirements for the position include being a resident of Crockett County, a high school diploma, two years related experience and access to a car or a pickup. The applicant should be bi-lingual. The successful applicant will begin work March 1, after a brief training period.

This is an equal opportunity position with no discrimination as to sex or race.

Other business conducted by the court included approval of the construction of a deer-proof fence around Lima Cemetery and approval of special equipment for the new county ambulance.

**Trio Wanted In Kidnap Slaying Captured Here By Alert Deputy**

Several news stories and telecasts over the weekend gave reports of the kidnap-murder of a San Antonio woman and the apprehension of three teen-agers in connection with the crime. Brief mention was made that the trio was picked up near Ozona by an

Ozona deputy sheriff. However, the facts make a more interesting story and give credit where credit is due. Due to the sharp eye of deputy sheriff Lavon Parker the three were picked up before the crime had been discovered.

Parker was returning to town from the DPS building in his patrol car Friday night when he observed a 1971 gold Cadillac with a white top parked near the post office. He saw two young hippy types, wearing black leather motorcycle type jackets lower the trunk and climb in the car. The two boys were accompanied by a female, also attired in the leather jacket get-up. The males wore long hair with beads.

**Lloyd Loudamy, Former Ozonan, Dies In B'wood**

Funeral services for Lloyd Loudamy, 57, were held Sunday afternoon at 3:30 from the Wright's Funeral Home Chapel in Brownwood with burial near Rising Star.

Mr. Loudamy, former owner of Loudamy's Dress Shoppe in Ozona, was dead on arrival at Brownwood Community Hospital Friday morning, apparently of a heart attack.

Mr. Loudamy was born April 3, 1913 in Big Spring. He was a veteran of World War II.

Mr. Loudamy and his wife, Jo, came to Ozona in 1965 and opened a dress shop. They moved their business to Brownwood early in 1968.

Survivors include his wife, a son, a daughter, four sisters, and five brothers, including Bud Loudamy and Al Loudamy, both of Ozona.

After the vehicle drove off and headed west on Hwy 290, Parker checked the license plate number with the DPS dispatcher, the time was 8:05. The dispatcher advised that a vehicle fitting the description had purchased gasoline in a Sonora gas station earlier and the attendant noticed several guns in the back seat of the car. The vehicle had not been reported stolen at the time.

Noting that the occupants and the vehicle just did not fit, Parker followed the car and stopped it three miles west of town on a routine ch. The driver, who identified himself as Patrick Leigh Teague, did not have a driver's license. He told Parker that the car belonged to his step-father. When asked his step-father's name, he stuttered and stammered so long that Parker became even more suspicious and took both vehicle and occupants to the DPS office in Ozona for further investigation.

A check on the registration of the car revealed that it belonged to Robert G. Newsom of San Antonio. Parker called Newsom's residence and found that Newsom had returned to his home late that afternoon to find his wife missing, his car gone, the house ransacked and some money and guns were missing.

Briefly afterwards an all points bulletin came out from Fredricksburg where the body of an unidentified woman had been found near a little-used dirt road. She had been shot at close range in the neck. While talking with officials in San Antonio Parker discovered that the missing woman was wearing a copper bracelet with her name engraved inside. When this information was relayed to Fredricksburg, identification of Mrs. Newsom was almost certain.

The three, Patrick Teague, 19, Keith Hughes and Cindy Horner, both 17, all from Kemah, a suburb of Houston, told of arriving in San Antonio and seeing the car at a grocery store there. They followed a woman who was driving the

A PATRIARCH TUMBLES! This giant pecan tree in the Pleas Childress yard was tipped over by the strong wind from the northwest Sunday. The big tree apparently had a hidden diseased condition near the base and split at that point, its towering branches coming to a precarious rest on the roof of the two-story residence. Workmen on the roof (that's P. L., III, on the left) sawed off as many branches as they could reach to lighten the weight of the tree and in an effort to reduce its size to clear the house. But their efforts were only partly successful as the picture to the right shows. One big branch of the tree struck the eave at the corner and ripped away a section to leave a jagged tear. The main part of the tree lies on the ground with one broken limb hanging from the tree at the left. The tree was at least 60 years of age by Mrs. Childress' reckoning.

Crockett Gas Strike TwoField Extensions

A Seven Rivers dolomite discovery was indicated in Crockett county with the flowing of gas at the rate of 1.3 million cubic feet daily while bottomed at 1,004 feet at M. C. Vinson, Midland, No. 1-4 Shannon, in 4-UV-GC&SF, wildcat, 1/4 mile northwest of 1,445-foot oil production in the Vaughn multipay field and 1/2-mile east-northeast of a depleted Guen oil discovery. Operator was preparing to kill the flow and drill ahead on a 1,500-foot contract. Trey Oil Co., Abilene, has completed as a Seven Rivers sand gas producer the No. 1 Bouscaren Heirs, re-entry operation and twin to a Tubg gas producer in the Noelke multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County, five miles southeast of Iran.

It was finalized natural for a calculated, absolute open flow of 760,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day from open hole at 1,100 feet, where 5 1/2 inch casing was set and 1,105 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 1,105 feet on ground elevation of 2,515 feet.

In filing the application to plug back Thursday, Trey reported the project had been drilled in 1941 by Bolsachia. No other information was available.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines of 57-GG-TCRR.

Operator's representatives said several projects in the vicinity have been completed in the Seven Rivers sand, but none were producing.

A 1-1/8 mile northwest extension to lower Canyon production was assured in the De Paul multipay field of Crockett County with the flowing of 17 barrels of condensate, along with 555 barrels of load water in 64 hours, plus gas at the rate of 3 million cubic feet daily, at Texaco Inc. Midland, No. 2 A. H. McMullan, in 20-KL-Lee Henderson, Grantee, nine miles southeast of Ozona.

It flowed the above gauge on a 19-64-inch choke through perforations at 8,035-110 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 167,000 pounds of sand.

Testing continued. The field has eleven lower Canyon wells and two Strawn wells.

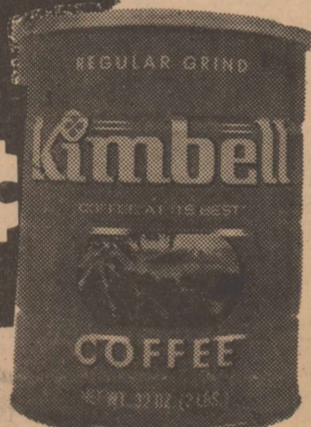

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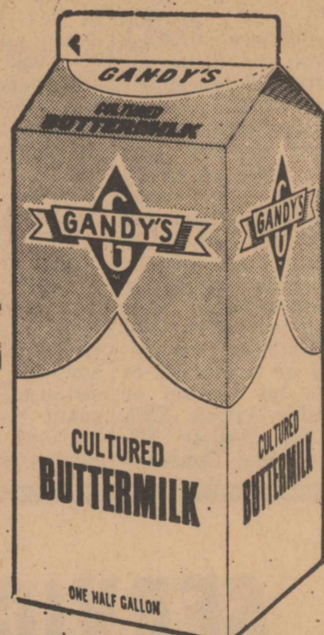

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to this Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:  
(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;  
(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;  
(3) Needy blind persons;  
(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.  
"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:  
"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.  
(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.  
(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.  
(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.  
(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission. Of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.  
(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.  
(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.  
(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution.  
(5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall enjoy the privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the Legislature and each of the hereinabove named officeholders upon election and any appointee to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information.  
(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary.  
(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State.  
(8) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless disap-

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.  
(9) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.  
(10) All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.  
(11) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.  
(12) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat nor or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.  
(13) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

**Tips For Gardeners**

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

These warm sunny days of the past few weeks are causing the early flowering shrubs, trees and fruit trees to show color in swelling buds. Usually, that means very little fruit if any, for another hard freeze is almost sure to come before winter is over.

Activity in the vegetable garden really gets underway this month. Our neighbors, the Dick Kirbys, the Bruce Mayfields and the J. C. Schroeders have their garden spots ready for planting and work. Hardier vegetables may be sown now or by the last of the month. Kinds to sow include carrots, lettuce, beets, mustard, turnips, kale, Swiss chard, Chinese cabbage, parsley, English Peas and spinach, also, plants of cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and onions may be put out now.

Flower seeds of all but very tender annuals should be sown directly outdoors as soon as the soil is in a nice crumbly condition for sowing.

Continue planting shrubs, trees and roses this and next month before the days get too hot.

If you are interested in ground cover to reduce work and to provide year-round color, try a few that have proved to be satisfactory in our area.

Common periwinkle, (vinca minor) evergreen, and/ora creeping juniper which provides a pleasing texture, light green in color in the summer and turns to a soft purple in winter. English ivy, (Hedera helix) should not be overlooked as a good ground cover. It will perform well in sun or heavy shade. Carpet bugle, (ajuga reptans)

is a very satisfactory ground cover in shady or sunny areas, but does best in light to dense shade.

Creeping liriope (liriope spicata). This is an evergreen with dark narrow leaves than the big blue liriope (L. muscari). The creeping Carolina jasmine (Gelsemium sempervirens) is an evergreen vine that can also be used as a ground cover if given no support. It is covered with yellow, fragrant flowers.

Why not try climbing varieties of the hybrid tea roses if you don't have space for a rose bed. The climbers are profuse bloomers and much more vigorous than the bush rose. They are ideal sources for cut flowers and can easily be grown against a fence or without support in a sunny location. Some of the best are, Don Juan (red), Climbing Peace, Charlotte Armstrong, Chrysler Imperial, Sutter's Gold, White Dawn, Crimson Glory and the charming flowering yellow Lady Banksia.

Recipe for fertilizing iris: 2 cups Vigoro, 1/2 cup coppers, 2 cups 20% super phosphate (white), 2 cups bone meal, 1 gallon wood ashes that have been kept dry. Mix well. Use 1/2 cup of mixture around old plants in November and repeat in February. Use less around new plants.

**WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER**

Cong. O. C. Fisher

The invasion of Laos by South Vietnamese troops, with U. S. air support, has apparently upset Communist troop and supply movement toward the south and has disrupted their war plans, at least temporarily.

This strategy, if as successful as now appears, should help to shorten the war, save American lives, and accelerate our withdrawal from Vietnam.

The interdiction of the Ho Chi Minh supply artery and this major interference with the capability of the enemy to kill Americans and South Vietnamese, is -- strangely -- bitterly opposed by certain hard core U. S. war protesters who refer to our supporting air strikes as "barbaric." This same spokesman has never found fault with anything the Communists have done over there.

When vast supply dumps inside Cambodia were overrun last year and 20,000 tons of enemy war materials were captured, it was learned that more than 75% of that booty came into the sanctuaries via the Cambodian seaport of Sihanoukville. That highly successful action set the enemy war plans back by about a year. Now with Sihanoukville closed off, Hanoi is forced to use the Trail to get men and supplies to the 400,000 Communist troops in southern Laos, Cambodia and South Vietnam.

That explains the importance of the new mission into Laos, and why Hanoi's cohorts in Pe-

king and Moscow are so unhappy about the way their plans are being messed up.

The Ho Chi Minh Trail, stretching several hundred miles through rough mountain jungles, is composed of a network of trails and roadways. So vital is that supply route, that Hanoi's suppliers have built two petroleum pipe lines down the trailway to fuel some 2,000 enemy trucks being used in the desperate effort to get guns and food to their hard-pressed troops. It takes about two months for each truck load to make the trip. All traffic will be stopped when the monsoon begins in May, and the rain will continue for five months.

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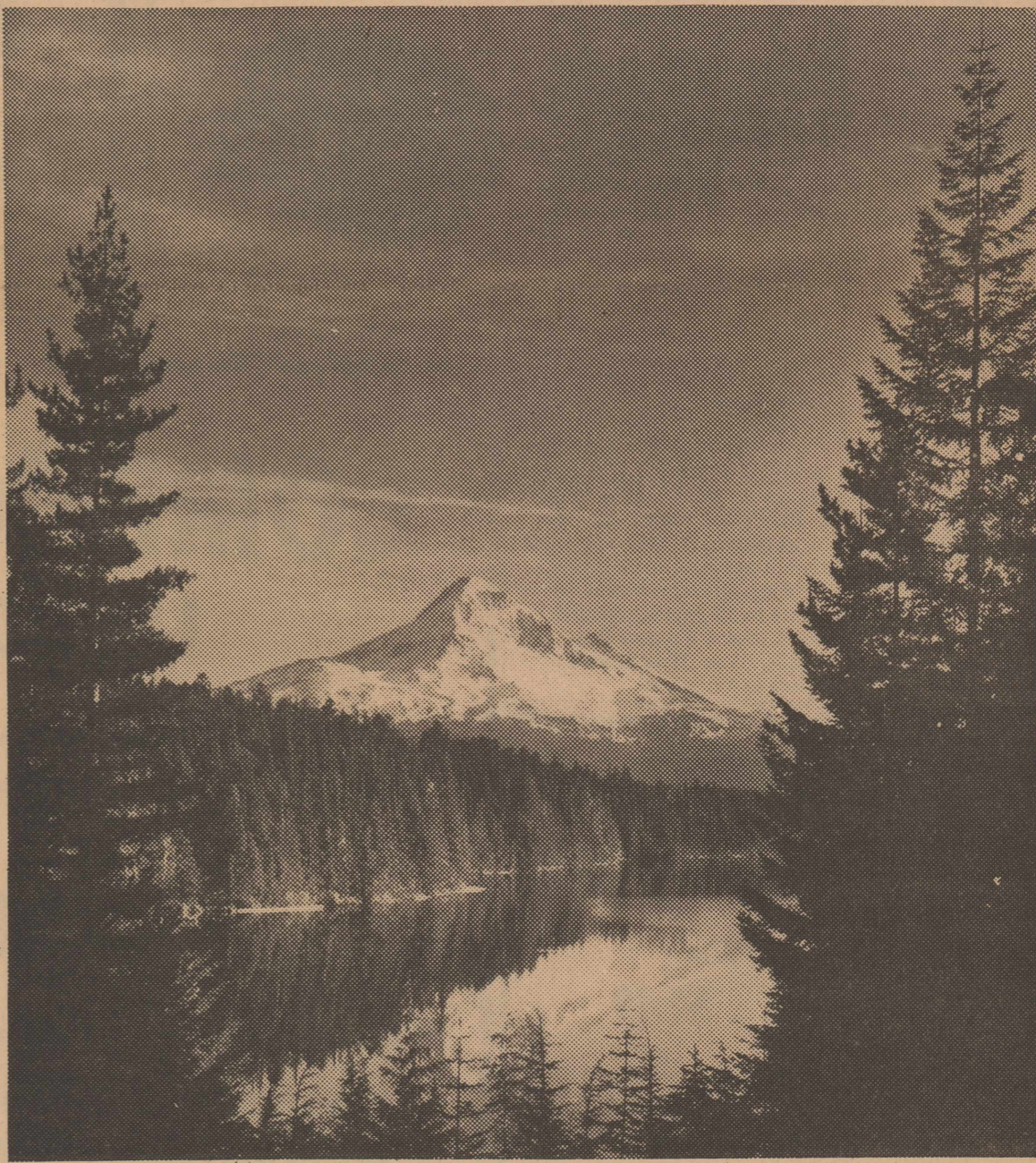

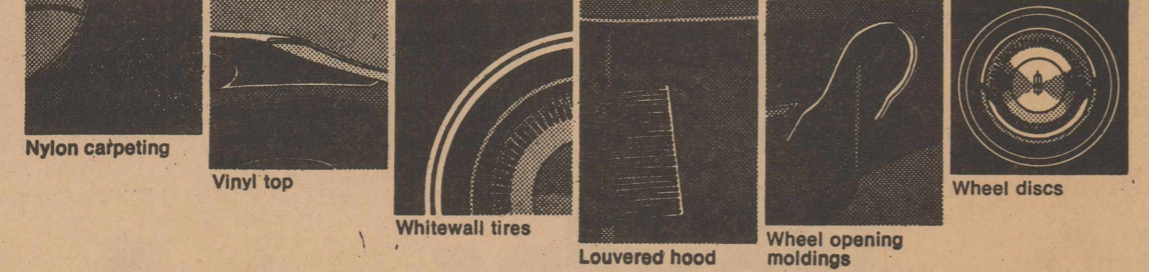

Teague was out on bail, charged with two counts of forcible rape and one count of burglary in Houston.

Ozona officers said the young people showed no remorse and openly laughed and joked about the crime.

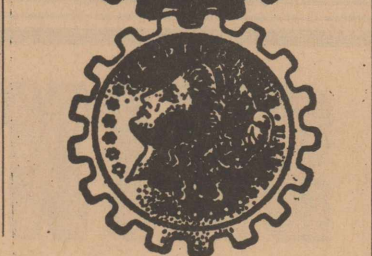
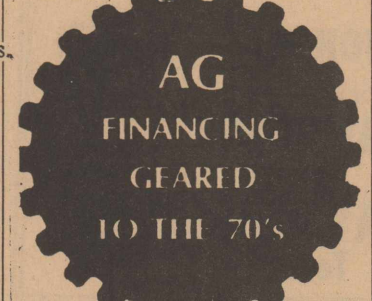
Mike Williams scored 9 points in 13 games, Gerald Olson scored 8 points in 12 games, Dean Shaw scored 3 points in 12 games
