LITTLE LEAGUE PARENTS TO MEET APRIL 5

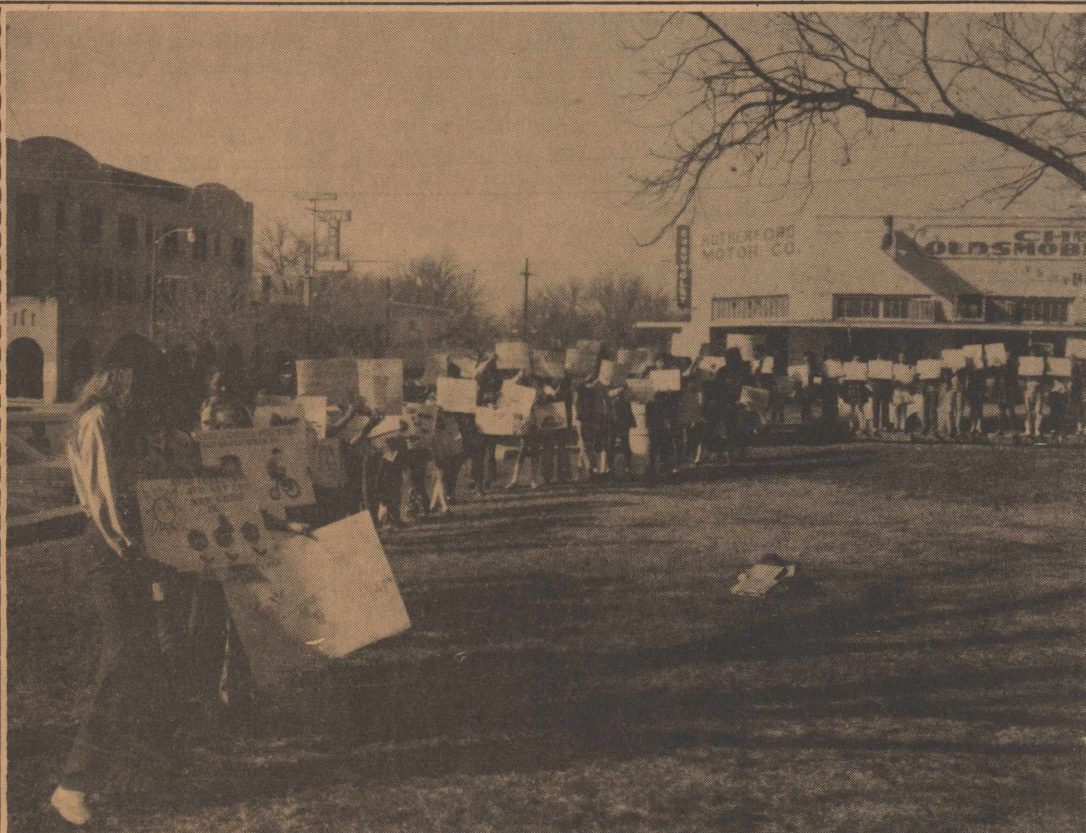
John Harris, president of the Ozona Little League Association, has called a meeting of parents, coaches and umpires April 5 at the Civic Center at 7:30 p.m.

Truck Load Beer Overtures On Lancaster Hill

Ozona lawmen spent the better part of Tuesday morning directing traffic and clearing the highway at Lancaster Hill after a van loaded with approximately 2,000 cases of beer overturned and spread its contents over a large section of Hwy 290.

The accident occurred when the tractor and loaded trailer were being towed down the steep hill by a Pecos wrecker around 7:30 a.m.

The wrecker and truck tractor overturned on one side of the highway and the loaded van-type trailer careened to the other side and overturned, bursting the top and spilling beer over the highway and down the hillside. The accident occurred near the bottom of the hill about 30 miles west of Ozona on Hwy. 290.

Both the truck driver and the wrecker driver were taken to the Crockett County Hospital where one was hospitalized with a broken leg, the other suffered only minor bruises.

Man Who Bolted From DPS Bldg. Captured After All-Night Chase

Everybody got into the act last Thursday night when a prisoner escaped from the DPS building and made his get-away in a stolen vehicle.

When the escape was discovered, all available lawmen fanned out from the building in an effort to apprehend the man, leaving dispatcher

Bob Falkner with a young couple who had also been detained. Finding himself with Falkner busy at the radio, the boy bolted from the building. In hot pursuit, Falkner chased the young man and after a few laps around the Little League ball park, caught him.

The other officers were not

so fortunate. The escapee, who had been picked up in a stolen vehicle, helped himself to a pickup belonging to Burl Ruthardt and headed west. Sometime during the confusion officers discovered that the name the man had given them upon his arrest, belonged to a law officer in Tucson, Ariz.

Ozona officers began an all-night search for the fugitive which ended around 9:00 a.m. the following morning in Sheffield when Sheriff Billy Mills found the man in a vacant house there.

After his escape around 9:00 p.m. Thursday night, he drove to Sheffield in the Ruthardt vehicle. Seeing a roadblock on the highway ahead of him, he pulled into a private driveway in Sheffield and abandoned the auto. He evidently spent the remainder of the night in the empty house where he was apprehended. At present he is making his home in the Crockett County jail.

Lions Dominate Class AA Division At Iraan

Coach John Richey's Lion Track Team had an easy time of it at the Cactus Relays in Iraan last weekend, scoring 193 1/2 points to take an easy victory in the Class AA division.

The Lions had 69 points coming out of the field events before the running events got started. They had very little competition as they zipped

past second-place Alpine with 86 points and third-place Marfa with 66. Other AA scores, all teams in District 5-AA, were McCamey, 57; Reagan County, 55; Coahoma, 35, and Stanton 11. The only other district contender is Crane and they are considered the team to beat for the Lions' district championship.

The Lions will participate in the Eldorado track meet Saturday and their strongest competition will be Brady, whose track team piled up 228 points in winning their own track meet last week.

Coach Richey feels that the Brady tracksters will give the Lions a good test in all events. He said the Brady team has better times than the Lions in many events and that it will take the best effort of every Lion to win the meet.

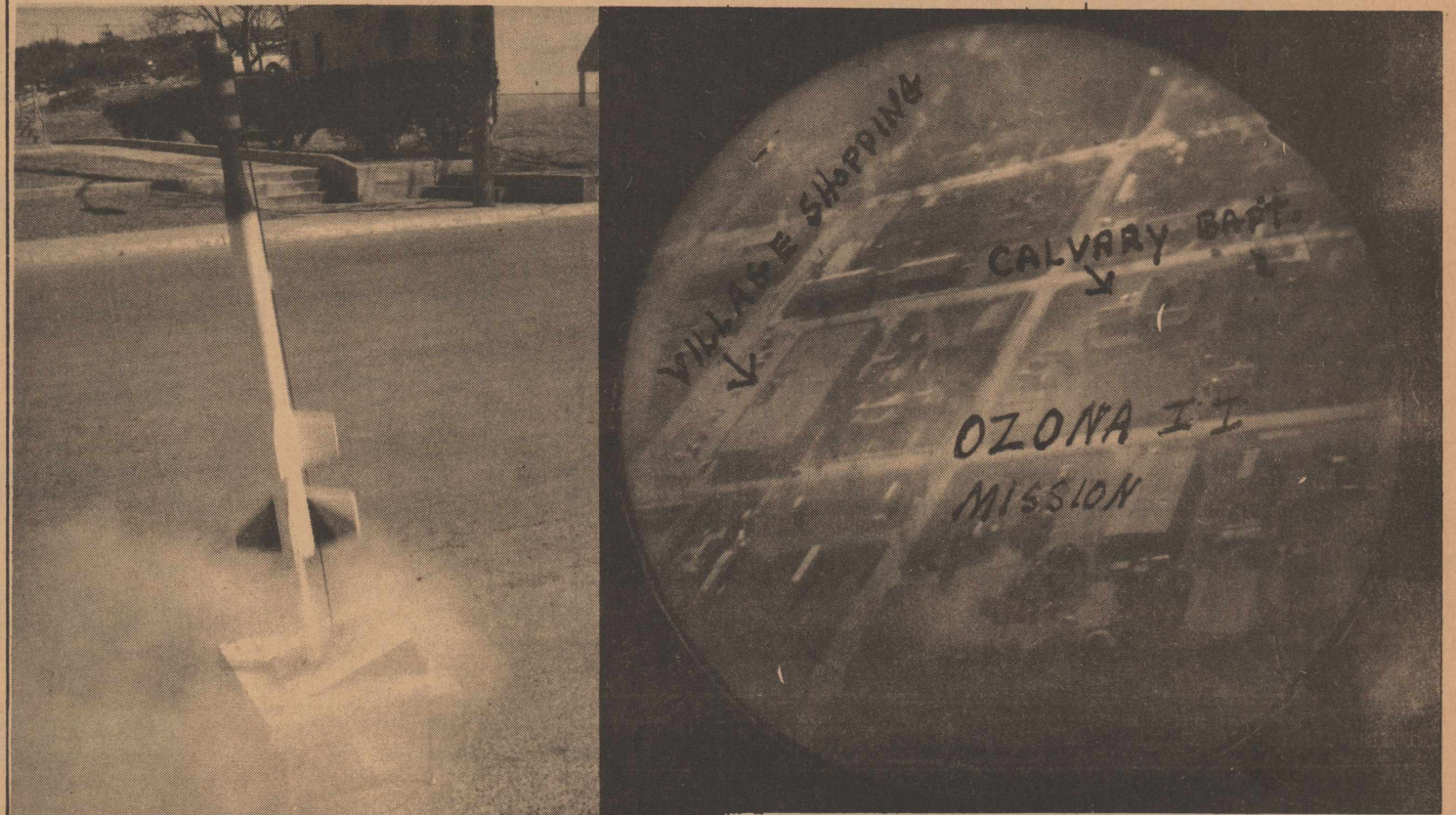
Members File School Board For Re-election

MARCH -- RED CROSS MONTH

Those of us who attempt to keep up with things through the newspapers and the nightly newscasts frequently suffer from a little recognized disease caused by an unusual "diet" deficiency. Daily, we partake of a mixture of blood and thunder and not infrequent skullduggery that totally beclouds the good things in life. We hear and see nothing but bad news, and the principal symptom of this new ailment is that we eventually come to believe that in the whole wide world there isn't any such thing as good news.

Well, the American Red Cross has just provided an antidote to clear up this myopia. March is the month for the local Red Cross chapter to campaign for members and funds. Accordingly, it has provided a summary of accomplishments during the past year. The end impression is that we are blessed here with an abundant supply of citizens -- activists, if you will -- who care enough about this community to devote a considerable amount of time to insuring there will be help when it is needed.

The Red Cross provides the organization for these volunteers to band together. Under its aegis, they donate blood to sustain life in those of us who are ill or injured; learn and pass on to others the skills of first aid, water safety, and home nursing; make up the core of a highly trained group that stands ready to piece together lives shattered by a natural disaster; and work out the problems of veterans, servicemen, and their families. A community thrives on the vitality of its citizens. In our local community, and in our national community, the Red Cross and its volunteers are leading examples of what is possible in our life. They provide good news for the rest of us -- and we, as individual citizens, can make sure there will be an abundance of this healthy "diet" by giving wholehearted support to the current Red Cross campaigning for members and funds.

GOVERNMENT SNOOPING

Seldom has there been so much general confusion about the matter of "government snooping," currently very much in the news. And it is time to clarify some of these matters.

Last October 15, 1970, President Nixon signed into law the so-called "Organized Crime Control Act." It included, among many other provisions, specific legislation charging the FBI with the responsibility to investigate all bombings and bombing attempts on any property of the government, or that of any institution or organization receiving Federal funds.

Because of the increased responsibilities to the Federal Bureau of Investigation arising from the new act, the President further proposed, and provisions were made for, the appointment of 1,000 additional FBI personnel - some of whom would be Agents in the field, and others assigned to important support roles at the FBI headquarters.

It is difficult to believe that these simple facts could be twisted in such a way as to attack the FBI and Director J. Edgar Hoover, but one or two Washington politicians (to use the term in the worst sense of the word) managed to do so. They maliciously charged that the FBI planned to saturate college and university campuses with "1,000 undercover agents" to "snoop on students" and monitor their activities.

The charge of course, was false--unless we are to assume that all students on all campuses are bombers and terrorists. But although it was pure bunk, the accusation was picked up and used by the Communists, the extremists, and the left-wing press, as one would expect it would be.

The facts are--as all responsible members in the House and Senate know--that the duties and responsibilities of the FBI are strictly proscribed by law; that the FBI is not, never has been, and--so long as Mr. Hoover has anything to say about it--never will be a national police force. The Bureau is an investigative, intelligence gathering agency; and it initiates investigation only when there is information indicating that a crime within its legal jurisdiction has been committed. The new act stipulates that if there is a bombing on any campus which receives Federal funds, it will be the responsibility of the FBI to investigate that criminal act. If there is no bombing, there will be no investigation - period. The truth is as simple, and as cut and dried as that.

We find it difficult to believe that the alarmists who attacked the FBI are truly concerned with unrestrained government snooping. But if they are, we can suggest at least one government bureau toward which they can direct their attention; the Internal Revenue Service. This agency maintains enormous files of information on hundreds of thousands of perfectly law abiding citizens. Any and all of this information can be used against the citizen, in a court of law, at any time. No law-abiding citizen is given the right to remain silent, as are criminals under the Miranda decision of the Supreme Court. Such information given to this Federal bureau, although supposedly confidential, can and is given without the knowledge and/or consent of the citizen to local and State governments, who then make it a part of their intelligence files. Invasion of privacy? Try to plead that when the IRS investigator shows up at your door.

There is indeed a vast amount of "government snooping" carried on today--but not by the FBI.

Lemon Poppy Seed Cake

- 1 pkg. lemon chiffon cake mix
 - 1/2 cup poppy seed
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1 pkg. lemon pie filling
 - 1 teas. grated lemon peel
 - 1/2 cup heavy cream
- Soften poppy seed in water for one to two hours. Prepare cake mix according to directions on package. Add poppy seed to cake batter mix (packet No. 2). Pour batter into two 9-inch loaf pans. Bake and cool according to directions on package.

To prepare cake frosting, reduce amount of water for pie filling to 1/4 cup. Add lemon peel and cook as directed on package; chill. To prepare frosted layer cake, split one of the loaves into thirds horizontally. (Other loaf may be used in favorite recipe or frozen). Whip cream; fold into chilled lemon filling. Spread lemon mixture on each layer and put layers together. (Do not frost sides of cake). Chill before serving.

Tips for Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

March is the last month recommended for planting and transplanting trees unless balled and burlapped.

There's still time to plant fruit trees here, and some serve a triple purpose in your yard, welcome shade, fruit and spring blooms. Plant trees in well-prepared soil in a hole at least twice as large as that required by the root system and twice as deep.

Discard any clay soil and

fill with good soil mixed with manure, bone meal and peat moss. Fill hole until two-thirds full, tamp down soil while holding tree in your hands to prevent tree from sinking deeper than grown in nursery. If your lot is small, you may want to try several dwarf varieties. Trees that have not been fed already should be fertilized now. The recommended procedure is to punch holes several inches deep and several inches apart beneath the "drip" of the tree, fill them with fertilizer and water it in slowly. Old, established trees impoverish the soil and are then more susceptible to drought injury and the attack of disease and insects. Large trees should be fed every three years with a complete fertilizer such as 6-10-5, about one pound to every inch of circumference at nearly shoulder high. Organic fertilizer as well as chemicals are needed, and care should be taken to supply the elements needed for plant growth according to the requirements of the individual garden soils. Organic fertilizers are slower acting and less liable to burn than chemicals. If your Cydonia japonica have finished blooming they should be pruned now. Remove mistletoe from trees now, for it shows up well against bare branches. Nasturtiums do well in poor soil, making more blooms and less foliage. Cut lawn grasses short to remove all the dead grass. Fertilize now and water well, to have a pretty dark green turf. Use at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per 1,000 square feet. Should you have tender plants or vegetables just coming up, don't fail to rake enough dirt over them if a freeze is expected. Don't neglect spraying for early insects. Trees and plants are so full of dust that they are more susceptible to red spider and aphids than usual.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

Cong. O. C. Fisher

The present supreme court, with signs indicating a revolution against the radicalism of the old Warren Court, is a favorite topic of interest by court watchers these days.

Observers think they detect the Burger court moving gradually to the right, though some of the Justices who vote with the Chief Justice may go either way -- depending on the issue.

The uncertain votes -- the pivotal ones -- are usually cast by Justices Black, Stewart and Harlan. In most major decisions at least one or two of them has sided with the Burger sentiment.

The solid Warren Court bloc still on the court is Justice Brennan, along with Justices Douglas and Thurgood Marshall. Mr. Justice Black, whom they formerly could usually count on, has become more independent.

The Burger bloc on the court includes as its most consistent adherent Justice Blackmun -- President Nixon's second appointee. He has voted with Burger 45 out of 47 times.

These two Justices can usually count on Justice White, and the "swing" votes are up for grabs on most of the big issues that arise.

The newly constituted court has already shown that it is not hide-bound to Warren court precedents in its decisions. For example, it was a 5-to-4 decision that recently opened a gaping hole in the confession rules laid down in the notorious 1966 case of Miranda vs. Arizona, which has hampered law enforcement ever since.

Soon the court is to act on more than 60 important cases, including desegregation steps (including school busing), the power of juries in death penalty cases, the right of private schools to get public funds, pornography, the scope of federal eavesdropping authority, and the right of youths to pick the kind of wars they would agree to fight as draftees.

With the present tight lineup, the next appointment of President Nixon -- when it comes -- will be of extraordinary importance. The President has made two excellent choices in his announced purpose to change the "complexion" of the old Warren court.
