USDA also announced a payment rate of \$1.46 per hundredweight on unshorn lambs sold or slaughtered during the 1970 marketing year. This compares with the 1969 rate of \$1.09 per hundredweight. The payment on sales of live lambs that have never been shorn is based on the payment rate of shorn wool, average weight of wool per hundredweight of lambs, and value of lamb's wool relative to the

Crockett county producers received an average of 37 cents per pound for wool sold in 1970. One hundred fortynine producers in the county sold approximately 2,000,000 pounds of wool and 137, 195 head of lambs. Mohair producers numbered 109, producing approximately 800, 000 pounds of mohair. The average price received by Crockett growers for their mohair was 39.2 cents a pound. Wool marketing in the county was up last year from the previous year when 1,826,000 pounds were sold. Mohair was likewise up from the previous year when 620, 000 pounds were

THE LETTER OF THE LAW

The harsh verdict in the case of Lt. William L. Calley Jr. is two. Two girls on the team certain to be a matter of hot dispute for a long time. A few thoughts on the matter would team, the managers, Shelley appear to be in order.

First, it is abundantly clear that the six-man military jury, ball: Crane, first; Big Lake, in reaching its verdict, adhered to a strict, relentless interpretation of "the letter of the law," which was their right and maybe even their duty. From ancient times, mankind has endeavored (without much success) to "civilize" warfare. The famous Dutch legal genius, Hugo Grotius (1583 - 1645) observed some 350 years ago that the laws of nations had, even at that time, "condemned" the use of assassins to kill an enemy. Yet the Communist aggressors in South Vietnam routinely hurl hand grenades into crowds of civilian shoppers, theatres and restaurants. Thousands of loyal government workers have been openly assassinated, kidnapped and tortured by the Vietcong. Clearly, the "laws of war" are not observed by the enemy. More than that, the "doves" in America make no demands that the perpetrators of these heinous crimes against civilians should be brought to justice.

The sense of outrage felt by the American people, it seems Luncheon For and Rebecca Everett, second; to us, stems directly from this blatant "double standard;" one rule for us, another for the Red invaders. Thus, Senator J. William Fulbright, powerful chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, sanctimoniously suggests that the "war crimes principles developed at Nuremberg' should be used against Presidents Johnson and Nixon, and against Generals Creighton W. Abrams and William C. Westmoreland. But there was no suggestion on his part that the same rules apply to Communist General Vo Giap, or Mao Tse Tung, or the Communist international rulers Kosygin and Brezhnev. As usual, his "rules" are applied selectively-against the United States, but never against

Or what about Senator George McGovern, whose public utterances have been considered so favorably by the Communist enemy that they have been used consistently for the brainwashing, the mental torture of our American prisoners held by the Vietcong in North Vietnam? Is not the "letter of the law" to apply to those who give "aid and comfort" to the enemy? Campus "revolutionaries" openly flaunt the law while college administrators close their eyes or look the other way. Rapists and murderers and killers and thieves are routinely freed by permissive courts on the thinnest of legal technicalities. Since when are laws to be used leniently against some, but harshly against others? Little wonder the public outrage against the double standard used in judging the Calley case.

If the "letter of the law" of harsh retribution is to become the order of the day, then let us begin immediately; let the arrests be made now, across the board and without fear or favoritism. And let us start with the supporters and collaborators of our enemy; the Vietcong flag wavers, the bombers, the hate-America punks, and those who by word and deed give aid, support and comfort to the Red Fascists.

Mrs. Bailey Post I am going to be optomistic nough to hope that between April showers you will make the most of your gardening opportunities. Much of the success of your summer garden and

lawn depends on what is done

this month. Repair winter storm damage to your garden, groom spring flowering shrubs and bulbs and give some attention to perennials. It's mulching, unmulch- blooms and spindly stems cut ing and remulching time, time back to encourage flowering to fertilize and time to plant. And April is a month to enjoy the results of your autumn la-

Severe freezes in the year damaged many landscape plants throughout our area. Check damages, which are just beginning to show on some plants, before limbs, branches and twigs of trees and shrubs are obscured by new foliage. Prune away dead or damaged

Cut spent daffodils, hyacinths, tulips and others, but leave the foliage until it matures and browns, because it is manufacturing food for next year's blooms.

If you grow camellias, snip off faded blooms still clinging to the bushes and rake away all blossoms that have fallen to the ground to prevent spreading mums, penstemun, Shasta daisy f petal blight. You can sweep faded azalea blooms from plants with a soft broom.

Hardy annuals you planted in the fall need their faded until late spring.

Perennials will benefit from being fertilized now. Apply 20 to 25 pounds of a 5-10-5 fertilizer for each 1,000 square wettable powder, liquids or feet. When working this into the soil, be careful not to injure early bulbs or dormant perennials. Hardy asters, chrysanthemums, gerlura, gloriosa daisies, perennial phlox, cannas. oxales and others may be lifted, divided and replanted

at this time. When resetting these plants, work in a heaping tablespoon of fertilizer and a handful of bonemeal in the

soil beneath each plant. Container-grown prennials, now available at garden centers, should be set out now for late summer and autumn bloom Ready to be transferred to permanent garden spots are carnations, dianthus, gaillardia,

and others. If any of your oak trees or shrubs need to produce a greener foliage and healthier growth feed them an acid-forming fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate or sulfate. Since our soil is alkaline, it would help to fertilize the area under the trees and shrubs with chelated iron. Which comes in dusts,

granules. It will also cause your grass to be darker green. Feed roses with a rose food you can get at several places, and be sure to follow directions on the label. This will help produce better roses for the flower show April 22.
