## Robbery-Kidnap Suspect Is Killed By Ozona Patrolman

Department of Public Safety patrolman John Harris, facing death at the end of a pistol, shot and killed a suspected thief and kidnaper early last Wednesday with a single blast from his shotgun.

Harris, stationed in Ozona, killed Richard W. Hargrove, 23, of San Angelo shortly after he allegedly robbed the Tumbleweed Restaurant in Rankin and took Mary Reed, 24, the waitress, as hostage.

Witnesses said Hargrove entered the restaurant when only three other persons were inside about 1:30 a.m. He pulled a gun on the cook, Mrs. Annie Mae Hill of Rankin and called Miss Reed to the kitchen. The only other person in the building was John Watson, 19, also of Rankin.

After taking \$48 from the cash register, witnesses said, Hargrove forced Miss Reed into his pickup at the point of

a gun. Watson notified authorities.

The pickup truck sped out of Rankin on Highway 349 and ran a roadblock at the intersection of 349 and 29 near Iraan. DPS patrolmen manning the roadblock gave chase and after about two miles of high speeds Hargrove lost control of the pickup and it overturned.

According to reports Harris and patrolman Dean A. Watson of Iraan went to the pickup to get the passengers out. The truck had overturned on the driver's side. Harris told Hargrove not to move and the officers started lifting the girl out of the truck. Just as they got the girl out of the truck Hargrove raised his pistol and pointed it directly at patrolman Harris. Harris had a shotgun pointed at Hargrove and Hargrove grabbed at it.

A story in the Dallas Morning News quoted Sgt. Leon

Roberts, supervisor in the area where the shooting took place, saying "The patrolman was bent over looking into the cab of the truck and the gun was right in his face. There wasn't anything else the patrolman could do."

Miss Reed, suffering from bruises received in the accident and in shock was treated at an Iraan hospital.

The officers found \$124 on Hargrove's body. An employee of the Tumbleweed Restaurant said that \$48 of that money was taken from the restaurant's cash register.

## Annual Crockett 4-H Horse Show Set May 1

The annual Crockett County 4-H Horse Show will be held Saturday, May 1, at the Fair Park Arena. Frank McMullan, Jr., and Bob Bailey are co-chairmen in charge of show activities.

## Doran Bill Would Permit Hikes In Crockett Salaries

State Representative Hilary Doran of Del Rio has introduced in the Texas House of Representatives in Austin a bill which would allow the commissioners court in counties "of from 3,700 to 3,800 population and property valuations of not less than \$45 million dollars" to set the salaries of county and district officials at a maximum of \$12,000 a year.

A story from the San Angelo Standard-Times Austin bureau, and published in a recent issue, said the population figures used in the bill were from the 1970 census. It was among other local bills introduced by the Del Rio legislator.

The proposed new law patently applies to Crockett county only, since the population and valuation figures fit this county's only.

The proposed law would make it possible for the Commissioners Court to raise the county and district salaries to \$12,000 over the present statutory limits. Officers included would be the commissioners themselves, county and district clerk, sheriff, county auditor, county attorney and treasurer.

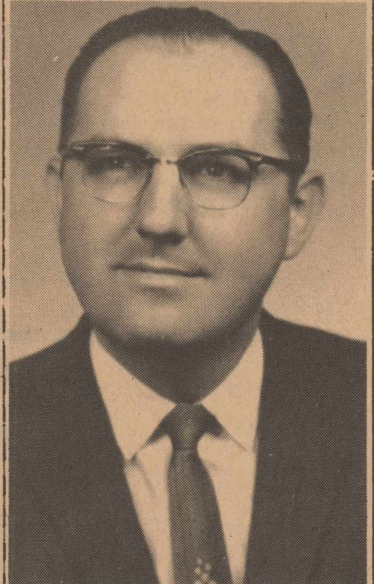
## First Baptist Spring Revival To Start Sunday

Services will be held daily Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. until 11 o'clock and each evening at 7:30.

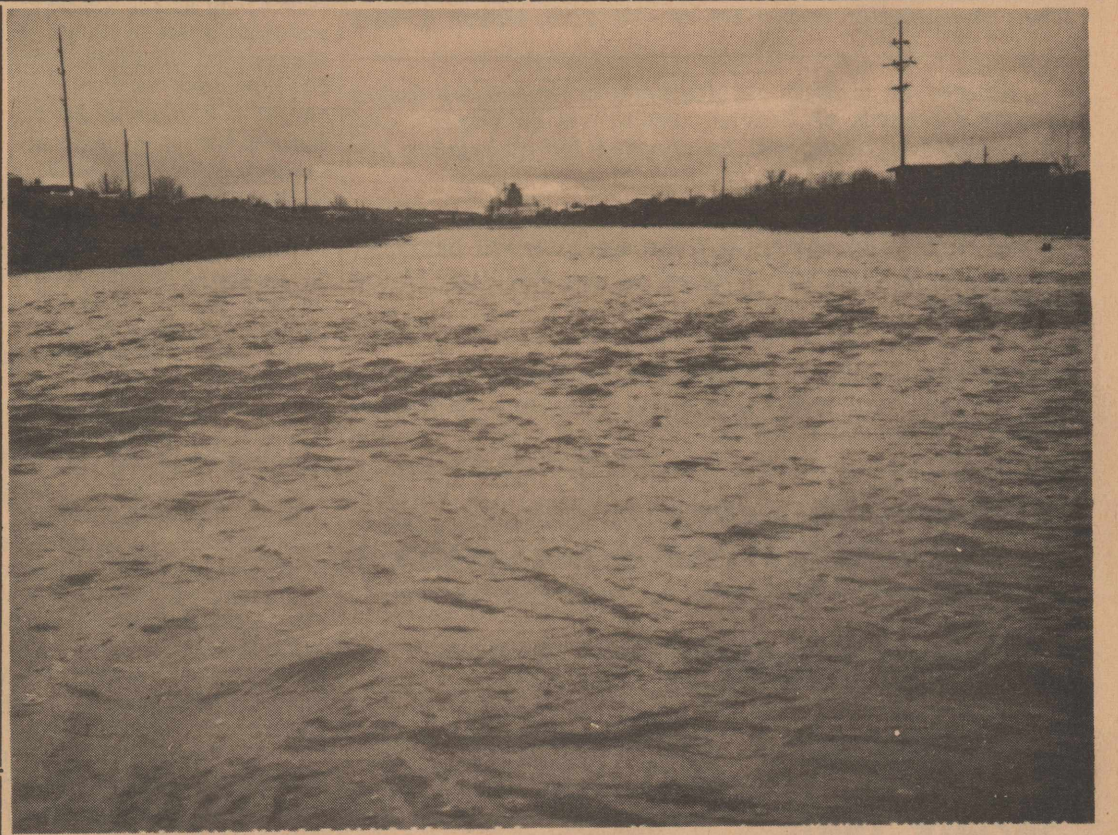
The nursery will be open for all services.

## Soaking Rains Dent Devastating 6-Months Drouth In West Texas

If Thursday night's heavy rains throughout Crockett County did not break the drought, it was surely dented.

The spring thunderstorm which dumped 4.6 inches of moisture on the city was the first appreciable amount of rainfall in the immediate area in six long, dry, windy, dusty

months. The rain was accompanied by heavy hail, but the stones were soft and for the most part small and damage was slight, except to fruit and tender plants.

A shower Friday night added .6 of an inch to the total another brief shower pelted Ozona Monday morning.

Rainfall was heaviest in the eastern part of the county where from 5 to 8 inches of rain was reported by various individuals. Up to 2½ inches of rain fell in the extreme western edge of the county and amounts of up to 5 inches were reported north of town. Reports varied south of the city with 1.5 to 2.5 inches being reported. The rain was

general throughout the county and parched rangelands will benefit greatly.

Optimism reigns among ranchmen in the county, who feel that the rains brought an end to one of the most severe droughty spells since the 1950's. However, most agree that more rain must follow before pasture land will be in good condition, but it is a good start.

Mrs. Kaleta Shepperson is Worthy Matron of the local chapter and R. L. Flowers, Worthy Patron.

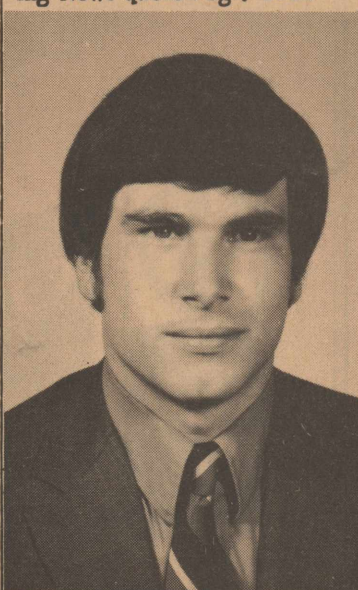
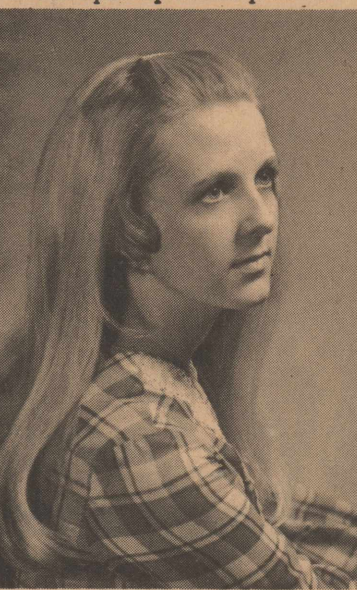
## Lion Golfers Finish Second In Dist. Race

Ozona's district golf lead went down the drain at the final district tournament in Stanton last week and Big Lake emerged as District Champions with the Lions forced to settle for runner-up.

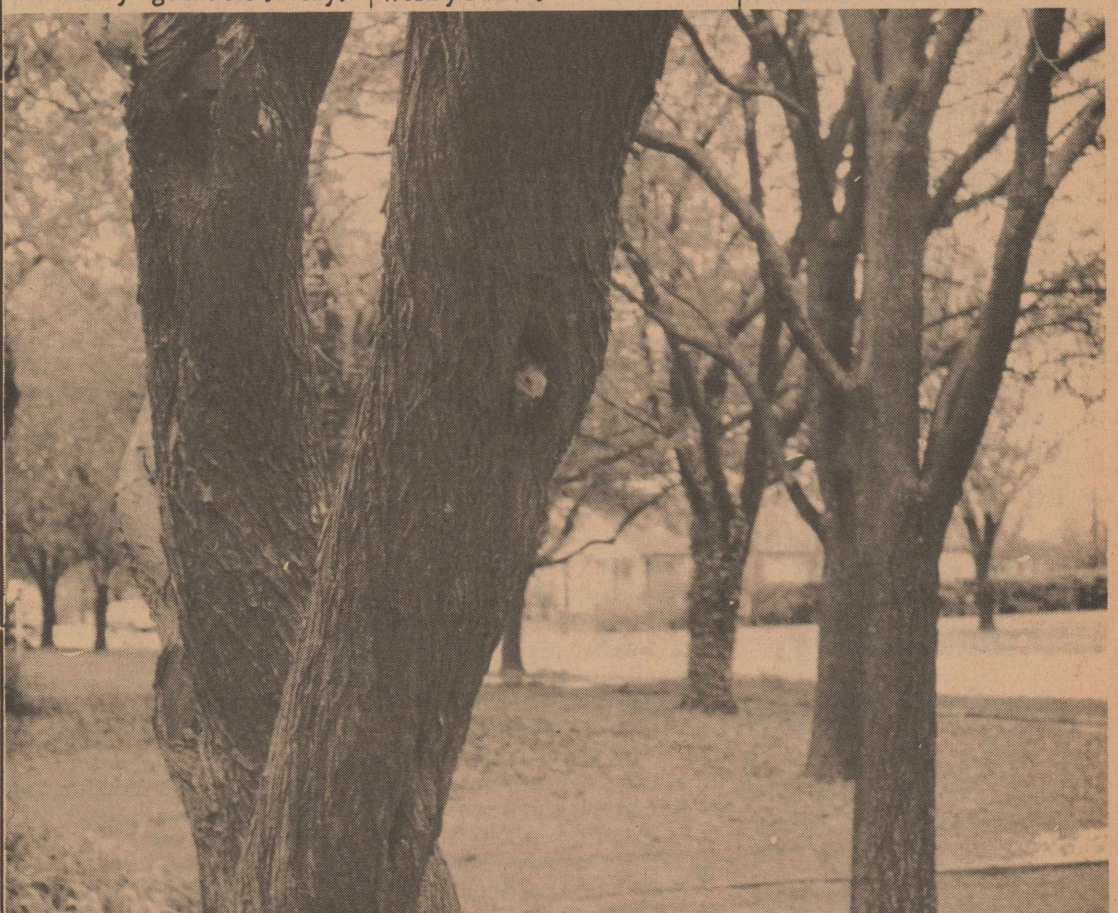
The Lions' David Williams shot a 73 to clinch the title of District Medalist. His brother, Mike Williams, is in the number two spot.

**Chapman Family Is Historical Society Topic**

The Crockett County Historical Society held its regular quarterly meeting in the Auditorium-Coliseum Monday evening with twenty-five members and guests present. Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Walker of San Angelo were present to hear Mrs. Walker's sister, Mrs. Alma Oberkamp Roach, give the history of their family, The Chapmans.

Ted M. White, vice-president, introduced the evening's program with an original poem entitled "Crockett County Pioneers." He presented Mrs. Roach who told many interesting stories of early Ozona and its inhabitants.

The Chapmans were early Texans and very early settlers in Crockett County. The great grandfather, Jim Chapman, came to Texas in 1821 with Austin's Colony and grandfather Guilford Ratliff Chapman and his wife, Nancy Jane Jackson Chapman, settled near Menard in 1865 when the whole country was still open range. In 1872 they moved to Llano. Mrs. Guilford Chapman lived to the very ripe old of 108 years and visited in Ozona when past the age of 100 years.

The son, Jim Chapman, and his wife and two young daughters, Myrtle (the late Mrs. Ralph Watson) and Bertha (Mrs. Sam Cox), started to Emerald in 1890 but upon arrival found the little colony in the process of being moved to Ozona. So their wagon was never unloaded at the original destination but came on to Ozona. Their first home was a tent located where the present home of Mrs. Clark Barton now stands. A cyclone had destroyed all buildings except one which was located just north of the present town square.

Jim Chapman was a great hunter and a favorite fiddler for pioneer socials and dances. He was a Ranger under Capt. George Baylor and made a number of trips up the trail to Abilene, Kansas between 1880 and 1887. He had the first saloon in Ozona which was located where the present Oberkamp building now stands. After the jail was built he moved his family there and it was there that Alma, Mrs. Roach, was born. They later moved to the Stirman house, which was located just across the street east of the John W. Henderson home.

Other children born to the couple were Edgar, Jim, Joe, Ted, Bill, Winnie (Mrs. Jimmy Walker), Catherine (Mrs. Dan Kidd) and Helen (Mrs. Bill Foster).

Mr. Nussbaumer, the son of Mrs. Lela Mae Nussbaumer of San Angelo, formerly Lela Mae Phillips of Ozona, was one of four men killed in a plane crash at Iran during a thunderstorm Thursday night, all were residents of Fort Stockton.

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**Offset Spotted In Southwest Crockett Field**

Monitor Natural Gas Co., Midland, will drill the No. 3-54 Clegg as a 3/8 mile southwest offset to its No. 2-53 Clegg, dual Clearfork opener and lone producer from that pay and Canyon sand gas producer in the Ozona field of Crockett county, 37 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, on a 1,325.4-acre lease, is 2,413 feet from the north and 487 feet from the east lines of 54-Q2-D&SERR. Contract depth is 2,500 feet. Ground elevation is 1,970 feet.

The discovery was dually completed March 26 for 120 barrels of 33 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 900-1, through a 24-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,041-2,106 feet. It was finished from the Canyon and January 10 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3 million cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 214,341-1, through perforations at 5,620-765 feet.

J. C. Barnes Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-C Harris, in 11-3-WCRR, 3/8 mile southeast of Strawn and 3/4 mile south and slightly west of Pennsylvania detrital production in the Enconrado multipay field of Crockett County, 15 miles northeast of Iran, pumped 47 barrels of new oil plus 140 barrels of water in 24 hours.

Testing continued through perforations at 8,821-836 feet, identified as Fusselman, but parable to the Pennsylvania zones.

**NEW LEFT OFFENSIVE**

It is not without significance that in the weeks preceding the massive "peace" demonstrations planned for this month and next, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has come under especially heavy attack from the New Left's political allies and ultra-liberal elements in the media. The FBI is the nation's principal agency for uncovering criminal, subversive activities. If the FBI is inhibited, the revolutionary organizations that mask as "peace" groups will have a much greater opportunity to achieve their objectives.

For months, the nation's most respected law-enforcement agency has been the target of abuse from spokesmen for the "peace" movement. Those who oppose indictment of persons charged with conspiracy to kidnap presidential aide Dr. Henry Kissinger have been especially noisy in their condemnation of the FBI. Life Magazine, in its April 9 issue, adopted the position of the "peace" militants, deploring FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover's "preoccupation with the surveillance of student groups" and saying that the Bureau's function is "under serious question."

The FBI isn't being questioned by millions of Americans who rightly regard the Bureau as the model law enforcement agency and a bulwark against bombers and protesters seeking to terrorize the United States. Atty. Gen. John Mitchell undoubtedly spoke for law-abiding citizens when he said attacks on Mr. Hoover consist of "slan-

derous falsehoods and the most vicious kind of name-calling."

An example of vicious commentary on the FBI is an article by Tom Wicker, Associate Editor of The New York Times, in "Life." He wrote that "it now seems likely that they (FBI officials) did almost as much to create the threat (of internal communism) in the public mind as they did to root it out in the courts." Contrary to what Mr. Wicker suggests, the revolutionary threat is real. Certainly, there is nothing unreal about the bombing of the U. S. Capitol and the Army Mathematic Center at the University of Wisconsin.

Equally manacng -- and equally in need of FBI surveillance -- are the "peace" protests scheduled to begin April 24 and climax May 1, the traditional communist day of celebration, and May 2, anniversary of the Kent State riot.

These demonstrations were planned by a meeting of leftists at Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 5-7 of this year. This spring offensive by the radicals is likely to be on a scale far beyond

anything the United States has experienced. The thrust of the May Day protests will be to demoralize the U. S. government and people and produce instant capitulation in Southeast Asia.

It is important that the FBI be strongly supported in its vital surveillance of the New Left. These intelligence operations are the only way of preventing the spread of urban terrorist warfare against the American people.

The country needs something more, of course. It needs a coordinated campaign by the federal government to reveal the statements and objectives of those who have organized the spring offensive. If President Nixon went on television to tell who planned the offensive and describe the political and psychological objectives of the New Left, the effectiveness of the radical war from within would be greatly reduced.

Unless President Nixon takes action to neutralize the radical offensive, the United States is likely to suffer more strife.

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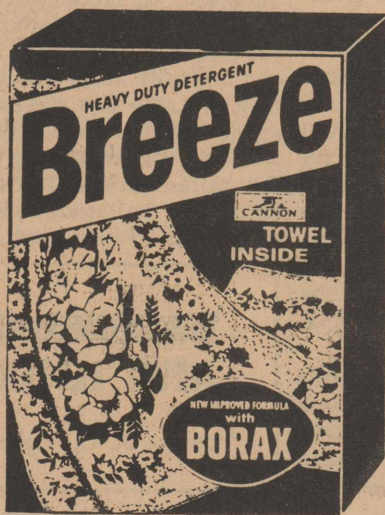

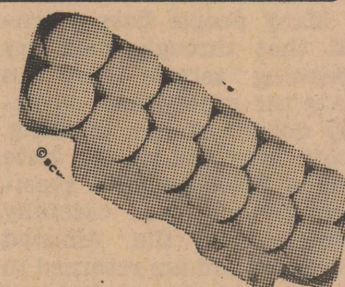

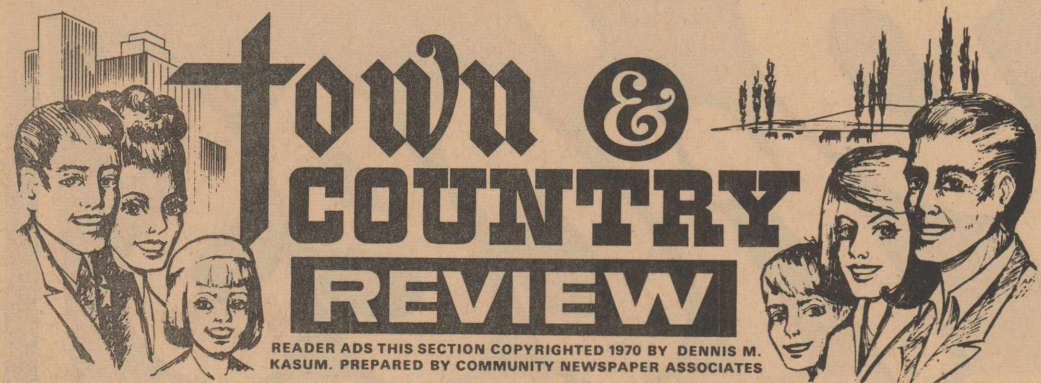

## Oil Activity Zooms With Four New Finds

One Crockett County field gained two producers, one was assured in another and tests continued at a confirmer in still another.

The Ozona (Canyon sand) gas field of Crockett County was extended 1 1/4 miles northwest on the southwest side with completion of Monitor Natural Gas Co., Midland, No. 1-53 Moody Estate (formerly Carson), 35 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.9 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 51,740-1 and gravity of the condensate, 56.4 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 5,927-7,059 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 47,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 1,420 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of 53-MM-T&StL.

The firm's No. 1-16 Austin Millsbaugh, 3/4 mile northwest of the nearest production and 31 miles southwest of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 900,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 108,200-1 and gravity of the condensate, 49.4 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,032-7,051 feet, which had been acidized with 1,500 gallons and fractured with 50,000 gallons and 73,000 pounds of sand.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of 16-2-I&GN.

Texaco Inc., Midland, No. 5-D A. R. Kincaid Trust, in 92-GH-C. R. Brooks original grantee, 3/4 mile northeast of the Ozona (Canyon sand) field and 5/8 mile north and slightly west of 6,200-foot Canyon gas in the Davidson Ranch multipay field of Crockett County and four miles southeast of Ozona, apparently has assured production in the Canyon, with the

flowing of 183 barrels of load water and 64 barrels of load oil in 24 hours, plus gas at the rate of 358,000 cubic feet per day.

Flow was through an unreported choke and perforations at 6,215-371 feet. Testing continued.

J. C. Barnes Oil Co., Midland, No. 1-C Harris, in 11-3-WCRR, 3/8 mile southeast of Strawn and 3/4 mile south and slightly west of Pennsylvania detrital production in the Encontrado multipay field of Crockett County, 15 miles northeast of Iran, pumped 85 barrels of oil, plus an estimated 150 barrels of water in 24 hours.

Recovery was through perforations at 8,821-836 feet, identified as Fusselman, but comparable to the Pennsylvania zones.

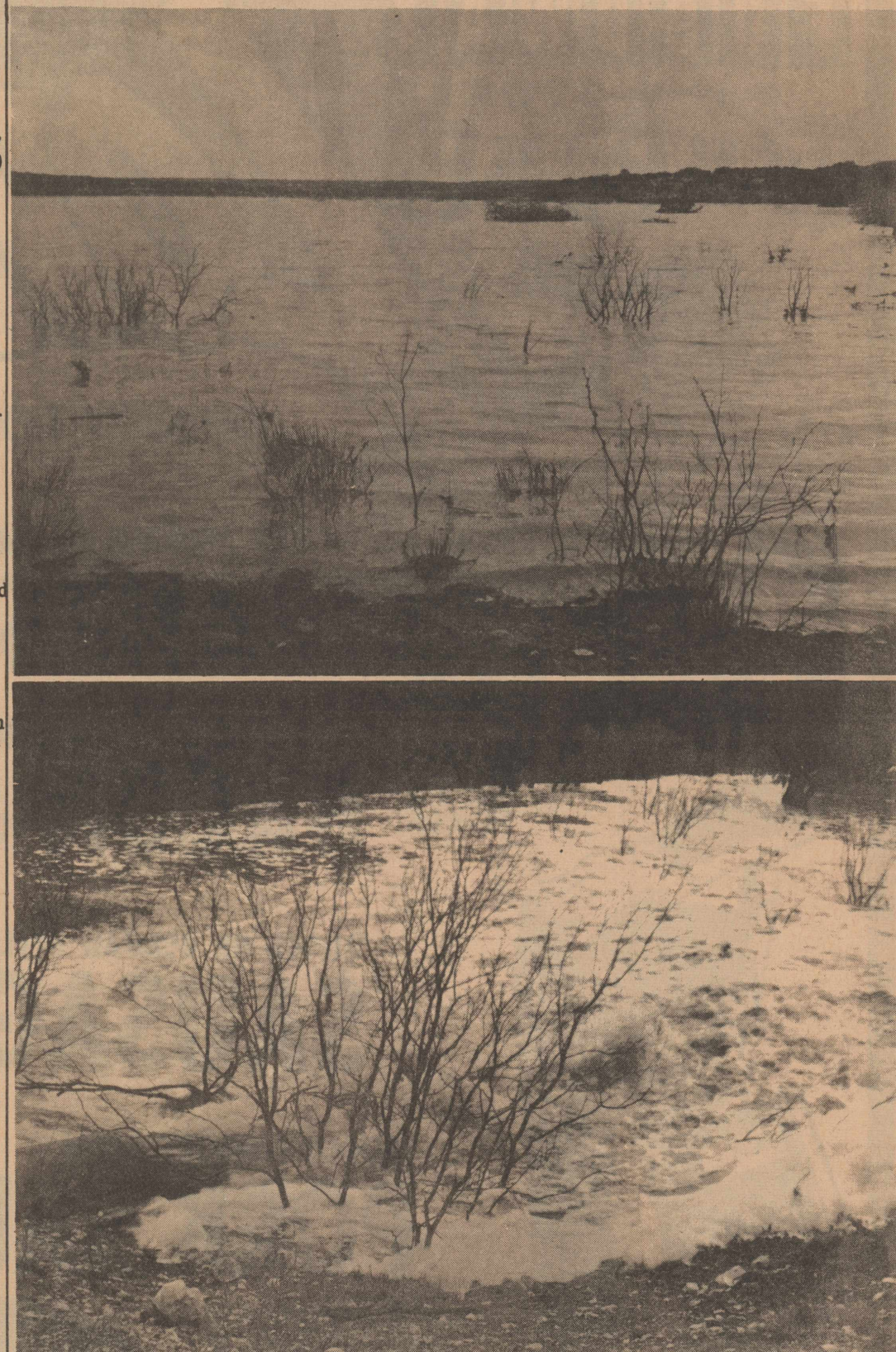

HOW FLOOD CONTROL WORKS--The huge lake of water above was impounded by a flood control dam on the W. E. Friend ranch a mile northeast of Ozona after Thursday night's rain. An estimated 8 inches fell on the watershed of Gurley draw which courses through the south and southeast part of Ozona. Had not this tremendous volume of water been halted temporarily by the flood dam it would have put Gurley draw out of its banks and into some homes in south Ozona. The flood water was held up until it filled the lake above the draw-down tube in front of the dam. Then water began to flow out through the 30-inch tube in orderly fashion. Bottom picture shows the outlet tube gushing water in a foaming roar which will continue until the backed up water is exhausted down to the level of the draw-down tube. The flood control dam is at left of the top picture.

### Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club  
By Mrs. Bailey Post

"A gush of bird-song, a patter of dew, A cloud, and a rainbow warning, Suddenly sunshine and perfect blue-- An April Day in the Morning," Harriet Prescott

I'm sure everyone is very grateful for the most wonderful rain last Thursday night. That morning I felt optimistic and hurried to plant or replace two Senisas in the downtown park and the Trading Post hedge for the Garden Club. The rain should improve the many horticulture specimens to be exhibited today at the Flower Show from 4 until 6 p.m. in the Civic Center. Everyone is cordially invited.

Even though the winter and spring months were very dry, with many high winds and severe freezes, especially the one before Easter, we hope you will be surprised, for usually unexpected beauty shows up in great numbers. Many blue ribbons and high awards will be given in the horticulture and Artistic Design Divisions.

Cladiums and elephant ears may be planted any time now where they will not be exposed to hot afternoon sun. Remember, they need water almost every day during the summer.

For a quick screen, plant castor beans to give lush bronze foliage in the late summer and fall.

Lilacs need a feeding of superphosphate.

Prune early flowering shrubs as they finish blooming such as dog woods, spirea, wiegela, mock orange, forsythia, etc. Easter lilies may be reset from pots when they finish blooming. Try not to disturb the roots by tapping pots to take them out easily. They will bloom yearly.

The later part of this month is a good time to fertilize newly planted lawns again so they will be well established by the time hot weather begins. Also, a light fertilizing to established lawns will help maintain a beautiful lawn for the summer.

Chrysanthemums should be divided for specimen plants and borders by the end of the month. Rework the bed where they are to be planted and separate into single plants. Discard the old root stem, using new side branches for better plants. To have well grown mum plants they should be kept well-watered all during the summer. They will repay you with beautiful and colorful blooms in the fall. Pinch out the top when planting, if too tall, to about six to eight inches high.

### 4-H SAFETY PROGRAM

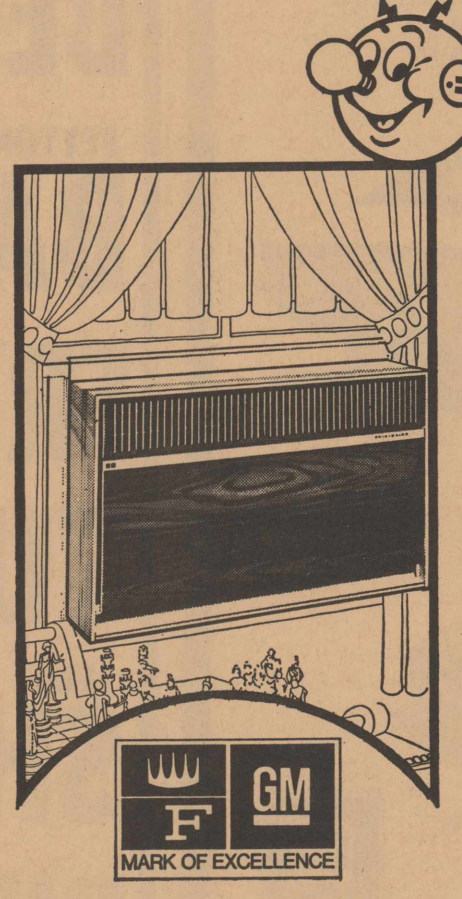
Over eighty young people attended a 4-H Safety program last week at a meeting of the Limazona-Tejas 4-H Clubs.
