Since Monday was the first day of summer, we can look forward without much enthusiasm to many long, hot days.

Recent research, conducted under a broiling summer sun, has vielded some intriguing new ideas on beating the heat. Here are some of them--to help you play it cool during the warm weather months:

Number one, keep your shirt on! Services Pend For Sanderson Wreck Victims

Services are pending at Janes Funeral Home for two men who were killed in a three vehicle accident early Monday norning on U.S. Hwy 90 in Terrell County four miles

east of Sanderson. The driver was the only occupant in each car. Dead are Edward R. Hill of Heywood, Calif. and Rafael Longoria of Acuna, Mex. Injured was Alejandro Marquez, 41, of Sanderson, who suffered broken ribs and was treated in the Sanderson Clinic.

The accident occurred when Hill, traveling east, swerved into the right bound lane and crashed headon into the Longoria auto. Marquez, who was traveling west behind the Longoria car was unable to stop and crashed into the wrecked

Mrs. Lester McMillan was transferred to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo from a Big Spring hospital over the weekend. She had suffered a heart attack enroute from Ozona to Big Spring about two weeks ago, and was sufficiently recovered to be moved.

afternoon when a car passed them at a speed of around 100 miles an hour. They were parked in the patrol car about five miles west of town at the time.

The officers gave chase but were hampered by oncoming traffic and some extremely dangerous hills and curves. As they followed the speeder up Bachelor Hill, he passed three vehicles and continued at high speed, driving in the center of the road and forcing east bound traffic off the road-

The two officers caught up with the speeding car on a straight stretch of road and signaled with the siren and red light to pull over and stop. The driver eluded them and took to the center of the road.

Taking into consideration the hazard to other drivers on the road, Harris asked Sutton to shoot a tire in an effort to stop the car. Sutton shot the right rear tire, but the car traveled on for at least three miles at a speed of around 85 miles per hour with burning rubber and smoke hampering the progress of the car in

which the officers were driving. When it became obvious that the driver had no intention of stopping, Harris asked Sutton to shoot another tire. After Sutton shot the left front tire, the car kept going for about a mile at 65 miles per hour before the driver lost control, skidded sideways for 200 yards and plunged

through a fence. Harris jumped from the patrol car and ran to the other auto. Sutton was unable to see the two men through the dust and smoke, but heard a shot. The suspect emerged and began running into the pasture. Sutton ordered him to halt and informed him he was under arrest. When the suspect refused to stop, Sutton shot at him with the shotgun carried in the patrol car. The suspect kept going and just as Sutton started to shoot again, Harris came into his line of vision also chasing the suspect. Sutton dropped the gun in the front seat of the patrol car and took up the chase. The officers finally caught the man and handcuffed him. Only then did they discover that he had received a wound from the shotgun blast.

The subject was incoherent, according to the officers, and they were unable to talk with him. He told them he was wanted for murder in Louisianna, but apparently he was in a confused state since no record of a murder charge has been found.

The well was drilled about two years ago on land included in the Dick Henderson contract with the Crockett County Water Control District which provides water rights to the district on certain acreage on the ranch Henderson formerly owned adjoining Ozona. This is the ninth producing well in the system complex, four on the east hill and five on the west hill and the Henderson contract area-each area apparently producing from a different water stratum. The wells range in production levels from 200 to 500 gallons per minute. The above well is not presently needed and will play a stand-by role.

PROTECTING THE POLICE

One hundred policemen were killed in the United States last year. Fifty-one have been killed since January 1, seven of them in New York City.

Attorney General John Mitchell urges that serious consideration be given to imposing the death penalty on cop killers. But there is a serious drawback: a clever lawyer can so shake up some jurors where the death penalty is involved, that accused murderers, guilty or not, often go scot-free.

When two policemen were shot to death in Harlem last month, the New York Daily News observed that such killings are often made in order to establish a reputation, i.e., so that the power group or gang can brag

Congressman Gerald Ford, the House Minority Leader, has asked the Select Committee on Crime in the House of Representatives to consider a bill offering a substantial reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone who has assassinated a policeman anywhere in the country.

The recommendation makes sense. When the Daily News announced that \$35,000. had been offered for information regarding the latest cop killers in New York City, police received hundreds of calls. But it is not enough after the fact. A Federal law offering a reward automatically in every case would be a serious deterrent to such a crime.

Write to Congressman Ford, or to your own congressman, encouraging such a law. An attack on a policeman is a threat to us all.

The treaty, explained Docksai, calls on America to withdraw its troops immediately and to "end the imposition of Thieu-Ky-Khiem on the people of South Vietnam." In exchange, the Communists promise to "enter discussions" regarding the release of our POW's, to guarantee the safety of our withdrawing troops, and to talk about the safety of those who have "collaborated" with the U.S. or the Saigon government. "Plainly," he said, "pledges to 'enter discussions' mean nothing. The discussions in Paris have been going on since 1968. The U.S., by contrast, is to pledge itself to very specific actions by the treaty."

The Young Americans for Freedom, largest conservative youth organization in the country, is especially concerned about the safety of those who have "collaborated" in the defense of South Vietnam, said the youthful leader. Such Vietnamese in the various forces of the South, combined with their families, constitute nearly half the population.

"You can only look with scorn and sorrow," said Docksai, "on those who support a treaty to depose the duly elected government of South Vietnam and to replace it with the one-party dictatorship in the North." The government there is so repressive, he pointed out, "that it recently sentenced the leader of a pop music group to 15 years in jail for his group's 'melancholy, heart-rendering' beat." Yet the leftists in our country, he continued, "have no qualms about cooperating with that government, while denouncing those in the U.S. and South Vietnam as 'repressive.' "

Pledges made by North Vietnam are meaningless, said Docksai, when the past record of the Communists is considered. "The Communists have violated all 15 of the cease-fires they've agreed to," he continued. "They have also violated both Geneva agreements since the days they were made. The provisions of the 'People's Treaty' neglects to call for North Vietnamese withdrawal from Laos, Cambodia or South Vietnam. The 'People's Treaty' is in essence a surrender document that would mean complete totalitarian domination of Indochina," Docksai said. He urged individuals wanting more information on the treaty to write to Young Americans for Freedom,





Increases in wholesale prices on all beer and liquors will go into effect July 1. At the same time an increase in the State Sales tax from 3½ to 4% becomes effective – applying to these products.

The increase in wholesale prices will approximate 25c to 30c on each fifth of liquor and the increase in beer prices at retail will amount to 35 to 40 cents per case.



Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Though the late showers were light, they were refreshing and have greened up the grass where rain fell. Too, it was great to be able to curtail watering for a few days.

As summer heat progresses, water becomes more important. During periods of scant moisture, be sure flowers, shrubs and vegetables receive suffi-

peat moss to prepare soil mix- liquid fertilizer. tures, it is best to soak the peat in water several days before you mix it. If used in the dry state, be sure that the other parts of the soil mixture are saturated with water. Plants potted in a mixture of soil and dry peat will die in a short while unless pots are immersed in water for several hours.

If your crepe myrtles stop blooming, spade superphosphate into the soil around them. Also, make a deep mulch of grass clippings and old leaves or peat moss around the plants. As flower heads fade, cut them rell. from plants. This often will cause new growth which results in more flowers later in the



Borderline Case

Preparing for summertime festivities, the Thompsons built a brick barbecue pit at the back end of their property. But neighbor Hanks took a dim view of the project. Checking the boundary line, he discovered that the bricks protruded several feet onto

Mortified, the Thompsons offered to buy the strip of land for a fair price. But Hanks wasn't interested in money. Instead, he demanded that the



mand into court, the judge did order the bricks removed. The judge said Hanks could not be forced to sell a piece of his land, however small, that he chose to keep for himself.

This is the law's traditional view, when an object overlaps the boundary line onto a neighbor's property. Whether it is a barbecue pit or a gutter or a fence or a garage wall, the neighbor may usually insist an actual physical removal — rather than having to accept money as compensation.

However, removal can be costly indeed—a real hardship on the first party. In recent years, courts have shown a growing willingness to "weigh the equities" of the situation, refusing to order a removal that is plainly unjust. Take this case:

A farmer was haled into court on the ground that the wall of his garage extended exactly one inch into a neighbor's farm. The neighbor demanded destruction of the wall; the court said no. Noting the slightness of the in-

trusion, the court said: "The law does not bother with

What if the intrusion is not by mistake but on purpose? That tilts the scales sharply in favor of the neighbor. Almost always, the court will order outright removal, regardless of the hardship

it may entail. In one case, a boundary line between two lots was in open dispute between the owners. One owner, without waiting for the dispute to be settled, went ahead and built a house on what he

thought was his own land. As it turned out later, his house extended almost four feet into the adjacent lot. Here, a court ordered him to remove the house, despite the obvious hardship. The court said he could not complain of a predicament he walked into with his eyes open.






