



The heavy weekend fall sent draws running in all parts

of the county and some roads

to the south were impassable

Monday morning. Weekend rains brought 3½ ranches on the Pecos River and reports of up to 6 inches of rainfall were received from the south part of the county. Heavy rains fell east of Ozona and up to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches was common in

the northern part of the county. Varied reports were received from individual gauges over town. T. J. Bailey's gauge recorded 5.9 inches of moisture for the period Thursday through Monday and the gauge at Mrs. had filled to the 3-inch mark at mid-afternoon Sunday after

being emptied the night before.

The month of July chalked
up a rainfall total of 4.20 inches, all coming in the final week or ten days, to bring the total for the year in Ozona to 11.62. The first two days in August had a total rainfall of 3. 42 to bring the yearly total for the city to 15.04.

Unseasonably cool temperatures accompanied the front which brought the showers and Tuesday was the first day to see the mercury climb above 70 degrees in over a week. Tuesday was also the first day Ozona residents had seen the sun shine in the same length of time.

FIRST WATER WELL in all the vast reaches of Crockett County was located in the heart of early-day Ozona. The windmill on its wooden tower and the cypress tank and trough provided water for the entire population, for domestic and livestock watering. Note the dim road leading in from the west, upper center, winding its way directly to the windmill. The big tree to the right center of the picture is the then youthful liveoak tree under which the first Crockett County Commissioners Court held its first meeting after the county's organization in 1891. The big tree, now much larger, is in front of the Baptist Parsonage and is marked with a bronze plaque. The First Baptist Church is built directly over

the old well. The historical marker which will be dedicated this week will be erected on the church grounds. The above picture, made in about 1900, is from the collection of Mrs. Ira Carson. It was taken from the hill behind the Baptist parsonage looking approximately west-southwest. Note the tents under the big tree and the covered wagons to the left at the edge of the clearing. The tall building to the left was the first courthouse, then under construction. The black figures on top are workmen putting on the roof. The town's livery stable is at right - note hay stack.

#### U.S. BATTERED BY DEFEATISTS

A very prominent columnist whose work is syndicated by a large American newspaper is now spreading the word that the United States has suffered its first great defeat, Crockett Field in Vietnam. And he deprecates American successes in other wars as having been the result of the fact that our Gets Extender; allies were able soldiers and strategists.

This is pretty thin stuff when you recall that our allies in World War I were all but defeated when United States Marines stood off a mighty German bid to cut through American lines to get to Paris. American soldiers, sailors and airmen also gave a great account of themselves. Gen. John J. Pershing insisted that the Americans have their own, separate sector of the battle line.

In World War II our allies in Europe and Africa consisted chiefly of Britain and Russia. In the Pacific and Asia the Americans fought with little assistance but with a valor unsurpassed in history. No one would want to deny the great parts played by the British and Russians in winning the war in Europe, but neither can it be denied that without America our allies would have lost.

We did not lose the Korean War; we simply halted it at the 38th Parallel. Nor has the war in Vietnam been lost. We have kept South Vietnam free, as well as Laos | Helen Henderson Wilkins 5/8 and Cambodia. Pollsters say Senators Muskie and Kennedy are running neck-and-neck right now, with George McGovern, Eugene McCarthy, ial was in Cedar Hill Ceme-Birch Bayh, Fred Harris, Ramsey Clark, Mayor John Lindsey, Rep. Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

The recent good rains have given us a respite from daily watering, and we hope they will continue through the month of August and bring moisture to all.

August doldrums, summer istlessness, vacations, and the recent rains may tempt us to lessen gardening activities, but this is a critical period for shrubs, trees, and other plants. A lack of soil moisture now will weaken these plants, making them less resistant to winter, only a few months away.

Peonies should be moved as seldom as possible, but if your plants seem to be crowded and flowering has diminished each season, now and on through October is the time to move them to a new location. Dig and separate each clump into several divisions, each new one should have at least

three, preferrably five, growth and Gary Boyd. buds or "eyes" on the root crown. Give them rich soil in a sunny spot and plant so that eyes on roots are one and onehalf inches deep. Check your old clumps to see if they have been covered to deeply, for this causes a flowering failure.

The perennial ground cover, Ajuga, has proven to be a toughie, spreads rapidly to form a uniform ground cover with rich green leaves that turn purple-bronze in the fall. In the spring, six to eight inch spires full of fragile blue blossoms appear.

to be divided about every four years is the day lily. This will allow plants to become established before winter, and assures bloom for next spring if cared for properly.

If you haven't had the plea-

sure of planting a hanging basket and watching it grow, you are missing a treat. They fill open spaces and provide color and beauty for many different places. There are many vareties of containers you may use and a wide choice of plants. One potting mix that has been given is - two-thirds organic material (peat moss. compost, etc.) and one-third mineral matter (soil, sand, perlite etc.) These proportions should be adequate for proper drainage and ample air circulation to the root system. secause of frequent watering the plants will need to be fertilized often. Liquid plant food can be added at the time of watering, and be sure to follow directions on label. Some of the most popular plants to use are coleus, Lantana, vines, geraniums, periwinkle, petunia, impatiens, begonia and succlents. Try to select plants for one basket that will require the same amount of moisture, sun or shade for the best results.

If you plan a fall garden, prepare the space now by spading, add new soil or soil builder if needed.



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



In a recent interview, Mrs. Paul Perner, nee Elizabeth Odom an octogenarian with happy rean octogenarian with happy re-call of the spirit of pioneer days told of helping her older sister bring the family drinking water each day from the well. The Odom family lived under the hill and the little girls went sloshing home trying to keep the keg from overturning as the toy wagon raced down the hill. J. W. and Elizabeth Binyon Odom with their children, ended their westward trek from Callahan Co. in 1891 with perpanent settlement in the new town of Ozona. Coming westward, they lived for short times in the settlements

of Wentworth in Sutton Co. and in Emerald, the first settlement in Crockett County.

Another pioneer recalled the town well in Ozona for a different reason. In an interview in 1964 Mr. Walter Dunlap recalled his first job with horses. "I was just a kid," he said. "Ozona's first water supply was a cypress water tank by the community's first well. The tank had to stay full all the time or the wood would dry out and shrink, allowing the iron rings to slip and cause leaks. A pump jack was mounted on the well, and horses were used for power. It was my job to keep the horses moving, pushing and pulling the circular
