evening favoring the establishment of a nursing home here. Motion was made by Mrs. Charles Williams, Jr., chairman of Christian Social Concerns, that the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the Hospital Board be urged to immediately pursue establishment of a nursing facility. The motion passed unanimously. The members of the Board recognized an increasing need for the facility and were aware that it might mean an increase in taxes, but urged immediate action while oil property valuations are favorable.

Another body of civic leaders, the Ozona Rotary Club, headed by John Lee Henderson, III, at its last meeting approved unanimously a resolution placing the organization on record as being in favor of immediate construction by the county of an adequate nursing facility.

County Judge Troy Williams told the group that it would take pressure from the public to get the court off a "high middle" in its consideration of the question. He said the court thoroughly recognizes the need for a nursing home facility and had had it under study for the past two years or more.

The court suggested that Rev. Berkley and the groups he represented have a petition prepared and circulated to secure signatures of persons favoring such construction and who are willing to pay any additional taxes that might be necessary to support the same.

Rev. Berkley stressed in his discussion the need for a "really nice" nursing home, declaring that if such a facility were provided there would be little doubt that it would be kept full to capacity. Successful nursing homes are presently being operated in Eldoardo and Sonora, and these facilities are being used by a number of Ozona senior citizens.

The sale of American scrap-iron to Japan before Pearl Harbor, soon returned to us in bullets that killed thousands of Americans, used to be the guilt-laden symbol of policy that recklessly put profit above national security.

Despite the opposition of the Chiefs of Staff and the field 24-0. Defense Department, Washington has withdrawn its opposition to the sale of \$12-million worth of British computers to Soviet Russia. The doors have thus been opened to similar sales by American producers. Its backwardness in computer technology has been one of the critical 3. He also added the extra bottlenecks in Soviet industry. Moscow has promised that points with a run. the British computers will not be used for military purposes. But at the very least, as Admiral Hyman G. Rickover has warned, they will "free other computers of Soviet design for weapon use."





Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

It's later than you think, so with frost approaching, do take time to enjoy the beautiful green of the hills and valleys own windows.

Many of the towns around us are stressing a general fall cleanup in October, so we don't want Ozona to fail to keep grooming yards and urging others to do so. Old trash may harbor insect pests or diseases, so should be placed where it can be hauled off. A sanitation program includes pulling up all of the spent bedding plants, cutting off tops of browned perennials, raking the ground to collect the surface debris, and removing from the garden. Also, plants that are now being dug and divided, should be carefully cleaned and all injured, diseased or dead leaves and stems removed.


