Elections, Suits, Tragedies Fill Year

Officers Capture Two Burglars

Sheriff And Deputy Recover Furniture

Two alleged burglars had a field day, or night, at least until Bailey County Sheriff Don Clements and Deputy Sheriff Corey Green got busy, that is.

It all began shortly before 9 p.m. Sunday when D.A. Emerson, who as it subsequently turned out, was the victim, called the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center. He told the dispatcher that he had seen a pickup with a New Mexico license plate, and gave the license number, loaded with furniture and headed for New Mexico. Emerson said he chased the pickup before stopping to call officers.

Sheriff Clements and Deputy Sheriff Green left Muleshoe after checking for the owner of the pickup. They, along with an officer of the New Mexico State Police and two deputy sheriffs from Roosevelt County, picked out a suspected farm house. The officers saw a vehicle with no lights come down a road near the house and chased it, finding that it was the pickup reported by Emerson earlier. They apprehended the man driving the pickup as he met another pickup. The other man was also taken into custody by the officers. In a field near the suspected farm home, the officers found a number of items which had been reported as stolen from Emerson's home four and a half miles west of Enoche.

The two suspects were held in New Mexico, and were charged with breaking and entering. It was found that the pickup they were using to allegedly transport the stolen furniture and household items was owned by their employer, who was vacationing in California and apparently unaware of their activities.

Emerson told the Bailey County officers that his home had been entered from the north side, when the alleged burglars tore off a window screen to enter the home.

Wham, Wham, Wham The Truck Bounced

The truck went wham, into the back of the Muleshoe City Police car and bounced back. Then the truck went, wham, wham, . . . WHAM, . . . as it continued to bounce into the back of the car as a completely shocked city officer tried to stop it.

It really happened, last Friday night, in Muleshoe. Everything began when Muleshoe City Patrolman Forrest Williams received a radio message that a milk truck had been stolen in Littlefield. Officer Williams found a strategic spot at the east city limits of Muleshoe and sure enough, the truck showed up.

The officer radioed the Law Enforcement Center and requested assistance as the truck driver showed no inclination to stop. Joe Albro, city officer, was called and came out to try to help Officer Williams. They trailed the truck and it still would not stop. Round and round they went in an attempt to stop. Finally the truck appeared to be about to stop. The car driven by Albro made an attempt to cut off the truck and he stopped. . . momentarily. When Officer Albro started to get out of his car, the truck tried to take off again.

At that point, Officer Williams edged in back of the truck and it whammed into the rear of the patrol car driven by Albro. The officers thought perhaps someone was still in the truck attempting to drive it over the patrol car and when they finally got the maddened milk truck stopped, found it in gear and empty. In the confusion, the driver and apparently sole occupant had slipped out of the truck and disappeared into the darkness.

Although a suspect was picked up later, he was released for insufficient evidence. The truck was returned to the owner from Littlefield and the city patrol car went to the garage to have a bashed in rear repaired. Officer Williams went Cont'd. on page 3, Col. 4

Mike Garcia Jr Is Nominated To Academy

Miguel (Mike) Garcia Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Miguel Garcia Sr. of Muleshoe has been nominated to the United States Merchant Marine Academy, according to an announcement by Congressman Bob Price.

Mike will be competing with one other nominee, Raso, Ed. With Dale of Memphis High School.

Congressman Price said, "I believe a service academy education is one of the highest privileges any young man can experience. I am particularly pleased that we were able to nominate, this year, almost all of the 18th District students who requested consideration."

He added that the nominees will be notified regarding the scheduling of their scholastic and physical aptitude examinations by the relevant Academic Boards of various academies will study the records of the nominees and select for admission the ones whose all-around performance indicates the greatest likelihood of success in the academy.

"I want to extend to each of these fine young men my best wishes for success in this endeavor. My only wish is that each of them could have the opportunity to attend one of our fine service academies," Price concluded.

New Year Baby To Receive Varied Gifts

As of 12 midnight, December 31, prospective parents will become eligible to present their new born as the first baby for 1971. The first baby born as the new year begins will be the winner of a number of top prizes which are offered annually by local merchants.

The contest will be open until January 15 for a baby born in this county. For home births, the baby must be reported to The Journal within 36 hours after the baby is born.

Some of the prizes this year include, a case of baby food, three \$5 saving accounts, infant set, infant walker, baby blanket, baby quilt, two restaurants are giving free dinners for the parents, a diaper stacker, Playtex baby mirror and bottles, shampoo, set and haircut for the mother, one day free room service by the hospital, the first picture of the new baby, a diaper pail and flowers for the mother.

(During the last six months of 1970, controversy rages over the hospital district and bond election, deaths from traffic and other accidents are recorded, a contested election for county commissioner is held, and routine life continues in Bailey County.)

The annual sidewalk sale attracted hundreds of shoppers who were seeking bargains during the sale afternoon. High riding youths led off the Fourth of July celebration with a two night Junior Rodos just east of Muleshoe. Added events kept sightseers busy from early to late on the day of the 4th. The parade, coordinated by Jeff Smith, parade marshal, was termed the "best ever." Two floats honored the more than 145 area servicemen who served in Vietnam.

Although she failed to reach the top ten contestants, Miss Muleshoe, Treana Bryant, made a good showing in the Miss Texas Pageant in Fort Worth. A long-lasting heat spell in the area broke records established in 1969.

District Judge Pat Boone set the hospital district and bond election unit for July 29. He set it for a non-July trial. Nearly one-half inch of rain boosted the crop prospects in this area. It took the yearly total for moisture to five and one-half inches.

Becky Sain, Rotary Sweetheart, became the first Muleshoe contestant to enter the Miss Grain Sorghum Contest at Dimmitt for this year. Corby Velasquez, Beatrice Acosta and Diana Lucero were chosen as candidates for the annual Diaz y Seis queen contest. The queen was to be named September 1.

J.L. (Bert) Hudson, 61, became the first county traffic fatality for 1970 when he was killed, apparently instantly, in a two vehicle crash near Progress. His son-in-law, Clifford Parks, was critically injured in the accident which also seriously injured two women from Dallas who were in the second vehicle.

The Muleshoe Airport Board gave several suggestions for improving operations of the airport and Muleshoe County Club, by erecting several signs along the fairways and airport runway.

Less than a week after the first fatal accident for the county in 1970, a second fatality was recorded. Homer Dutton, 61, of Amarillo died shortly after visiting his station wagon at the east city limits of Muleshoe on Highway 70.

Dr. Homer Allison, formerly of Moulton, Ala., began a medical practice in Muleshoe. He opened his office at West Plains Memorial Hospital. Moving to Muleshoe with the doctor, were his wife, Lanora, and two children.

A request for more than 180 subpoenas was filed in District Court Clerk Nelda Mervitt's office for the hospital suit. The suit alleges irregularities and illegal voters.

Miss Muleshoe, Treana Bryant, became the second Muleshoe entry in the Miss Grain Sorghum Contest to be held at Dimmitt. Five of nine persons involved in a two vehicle city accident were hospitalized. Their injuries were termed from minor to serious.

Following two and one half days of testimony by around 25 witnesses, District Judge Pat Boone called a halt to the hospital district and bond election suit and ruled for the hospital district. He said those contesting the election failed to prove their case.

SWPS Continues Growth, Progress

A 14 percent addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 and plans for still another major power production unit in 1974 highlight a nearly 20-million dollar construction program for 1973, announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The addition to electric generating capability in mid-year will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 256,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power-producing capability at nearly 3,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago.

Tolk also revealed plans for the second 256,000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1974 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any bind insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers is concerned. It

takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order in to adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth," Tolk said

Police Activity Slows Down Over Holidays

During the four day Christmas holidays, activity around the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center slowed down considerably.

For the past several days, city officers failed four persons on charges of being drunk, two with minor possession and one for having no driver's license.

The Bailey County Sheriff's office noted one charged with car theft and two persons were captured and held for the sheriff's office on burglary charges.

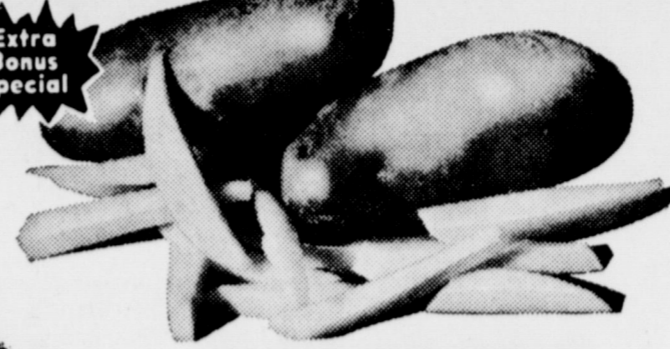

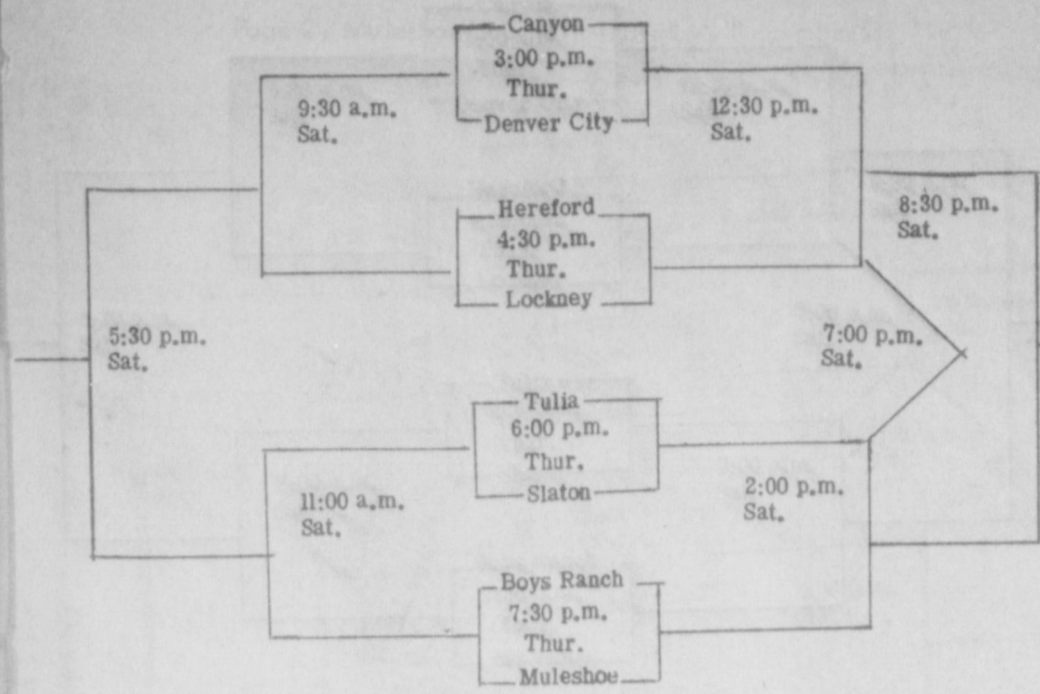

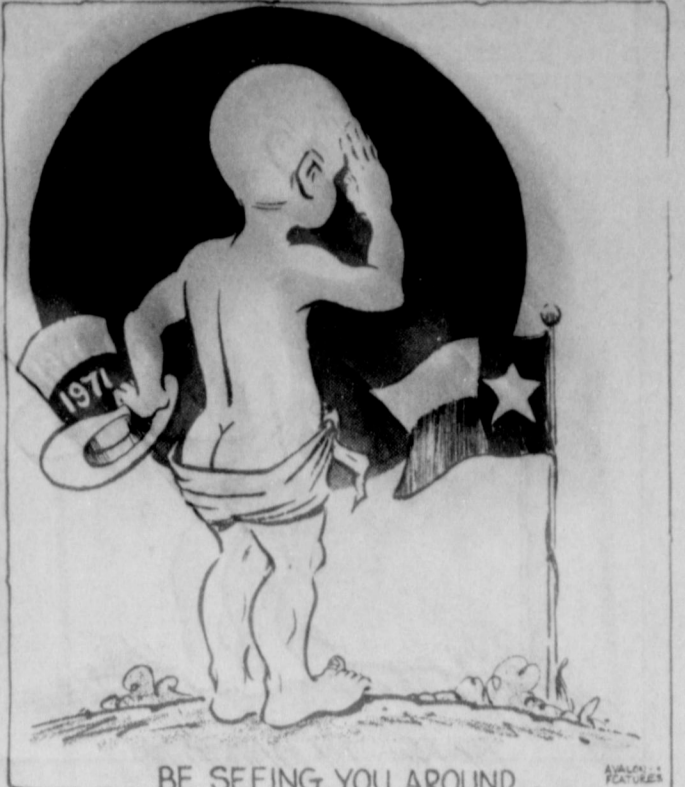

SEPTEMBER
 Bailey County Commissioners Court dropped the county tax rate from \$1.57 to \$1.25 for the coming year with two road bond tax series being paid off.
 Youth Football Inc. began its first season in Muleshoe with four teams suited out and a fall schedule established.
 Hailed as a very successful tour was the Chamber of Commerce sponsored Businessmen's Farm Tour. A large number of people toured the 12 farms listed and had an outside luncheon served during the tour.
 By virtue of receiving the most votes at a cent a vote, Beatrice Acosta was named to reign as Diez y Seis queen during the annual festival at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church.
 Roberto Gonzales, 21, died shortly after he was pinned between a truck being backed by Valente Jurado and a tool bin in a garage on the D.L. Redwine farm.
 The Muleshoe Mules football team defeated the Friona Chieftains 20-7 to break a 13 game losing streak and boost homecoming before a bone-chilled homecoming crowd. Judy Winn was named football queen during halftime activities.
 District Judge Pat Boone overruled a motion for a new hospital trial.
 Dean Gilliam of the Enochs area took the first bale of county cotton for 1970 to the Enochs Gin Co. for ginning.
 Poyner's White Store scheduled a big grand opening to show off their new facilities.
 J.W. Lee, 43, of Stegall, was killed in a two-vehicle accident 15 miles east of Dora, N.M. His father-in-law, J.O. 'Orbie' Phillips, was critically injured in the accident.

OCTOBER
 City Manager Albert Field received word that Muleshoe would receive \$25,000 in federal funds to be used for city park construction.
 Don Harmon, Dr. Charles Lewis and Curtis Walker were all named by the United States Jaycees as Outstanding Young Men in the Muleshoe area.
 A sneak freeze on October 8 dipped the thermometer into the 20s and the area's first snow was recorded. Crops expected to be damaged from minor to severe in the early blast of winter.
 Politics continued to dominate the local scene.
 Rain, sleet and snow slowed the harvest of crops and farmers began keeping a worried eye on laden skies.
 For the first time ever, Muleshoe was scheduled to host an American Legion Convention with the local American Legion Post to host the 19th District fall convention of the American Legion.
 A former Muleshoe doctor, Dr. William M. Dean, now of Morton, was reported to be critical in Lubbock Methodist Hospital where he was taken following a sudden illness at the Morton Hospital.
 A massive Jaycee-sponsored Sandhill Crane Hunt got underway with NBC cameramen on hand to film the hunt for a special 12 minute feature for national viewers.

NOVEMBER
 Lloyd Bentsen, Preston Smith and Ben Barnes, all democrats, carried Bailey County in the general election.
 A write-in candidate, Nolan Harlan, defeated candidate Rudolph

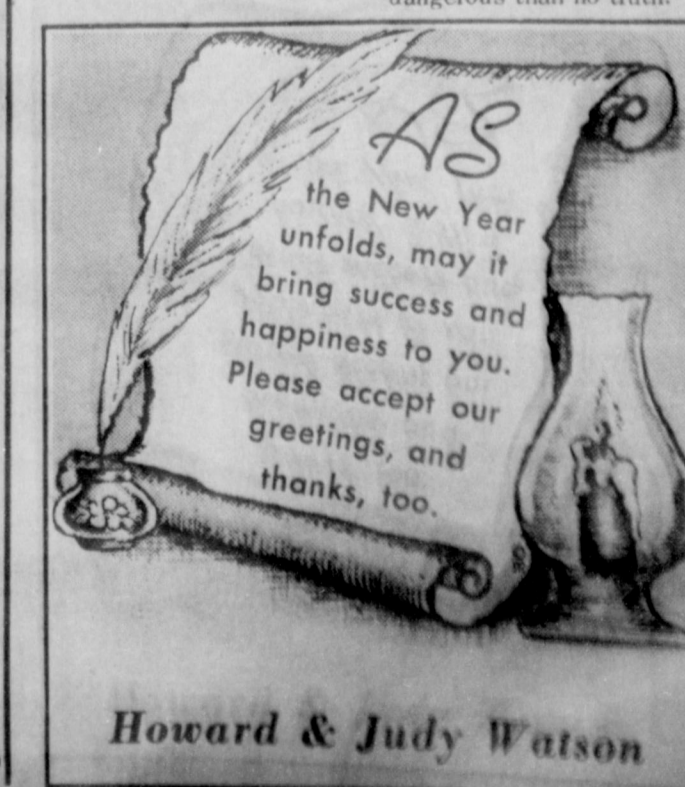


Moraw, 172-168, for Bailey County Commissioner of Precinct Four.

St. Clair Department Store scheduled a celebration to hail their 40th anniversary in business in Muleshoe.
 Donna Woodard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Woodard was named high school carnival queen and Laverne Carpenter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Carpenter, was named junior high school carnival queen during ceremonies at Muleshoe High School.
 The cotton harvest moved into full swing with some gins in operation around the clock.
 Rudolph Moraw requested a recount of the Precinct Four Commissioner ballots cast in the general election. Three county men were named to make the recount.
 Three Way school hosted a 25th anniversary celebration for the school with a number of persons reported.
 At least \$1,700 in merchandise was reported missing in a burglary at Maple, Bailey County Commissioner W.H. 'Bill' Eubanks said his grocery store at Maple was burglarized on a Sunday night. Suspects were later charged.
 A seven vote difference found by recounters named Rudolph Moraw commissioner of Precinct Four.
 For the first time, a Department of Public Safety helicopter was used in this area to transport an accident victim to a Lubbock hospital, Wayne Priest was injured in a feed mill accident near Clay's Corner and transported to Lubbock Methodist Hospital in the helicopter.
 Terry Wheeler and Tani Murrain were named Cold Star 4-H winners for Bailey County. They were honored during a 4-H banquet.
 Shaun Haley, four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Don Haley, was killed in a three vehicle pileup near Clay's Corner.
 Scott Williams, 53, of Seagraves, and a former Muleshoe resident, was killed by burglars he found inside Higginbotham-Bartlett, where he was manager in Seagraves. Two men were later charged with his murder. He was the brother of incoming County Judge Glen Williams.
 Robert Frias, an engineer from Odessa, spoke to a large crowd of Muleshoe citizens on organized agitators, how they work and what methods they use.
 Six burglaries were cleared up in Bailey County and a number in New Mexico and Morton with the arrest of two suspects.

DECEMBER
 An enlarged Christmas parade drew several hundred spectators to Muleshoe. The Muleshoe High School Industrial Arts Department was first place winner in the float division; Young Homemakers Club second and the Muleshoe Jaycees third.
 Six Muleshoe Mule varsity football players were named to the All-District football team, with some of the players receiving dual honors. They were Bobby Hayes, Donnie Wheat, Johnny Hayes, Rand Baker, Mike Riley and Tommy Clements.
 Ten persons were injured, some critically, in a two vehicle intersection wreck northwest of Lazbuddie in Parmer County. Six of the injured were hospitalized. At least one of the accident victims continued to be hospitalized in Lubbock Methodist Hospital as the year drew to a close.
 SP/4 Paul Edward Wolfe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Wolfe, became the county's third Vietnam victim. The first was Dub Hatfield and the second was Phillip Orozco.
 Meeting in regular session, the grand jury indicted 10 persons on varied charges, some of the persons received several indictments.
 Sam Gonzales, who works for the U.S. Post Office, won the grand prize in the annual Back the Mules football contest. He won two tickets to the Cotton Bowl and \$50 for expense money.
 Gordon Houston 'Corky' Green was sworn in as an attorney in ceremonies in Austin and announced he would be in the office of District Attorney Jack Young. He resigned his position as Bailey County Deputy Sheriff, effective January 1.
 John Mock, who failed to show up for indictment in Bailey County District Court and had been sought by officers, was arrested in Phoenix, Ariz. and returned to Muleshoe for trial for felony checks. He was held on \$100,000 bond.
 During a regular meeting, the Bailey County Commissioners Court asked for the controversial Community Action Program to terminate its activities in Bailey County.
 As 1970 drew to a close, threatening skies kept the area cool and cloudy. Little moisture was predicted in the dry county.

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Frantic pre-
parations are under way to ready
the State Capitol for the 62nd
legislative session which begins
January 12.

Construction workmen still
have to complete renovation of
the building and completion of
new offices and committee
rooms. Staffs must be hired
and assigned, opening sessions
planned and the budget and other
major bills drafted.

Surveys indicate that most
legislators are agreed that tax-
ing and redistricting of con-
gressional and legislative
boundaries are their toughest
tasks. But there is no short-
age of tough tasks for the law-
makers in 1971.

Legislative Budget Board has
pushed the estimated new re-
venue need to \$645.1 million,
and many think it will run a
great deal higher, perhaps as
much as \$800 million or more.
Very few ideas have been of-
fered on how to raise the new
revenue.

Political futures of many leg-
islators ride on the redrawing
of their district boundaries,
which must follow population
patterns of the 1970 census.
Among other major problems
pinpointed by legislators are:
*A multi-billion-dollar state
budget.

*Liquor-by-the-drink legis-
lation.
*Welfare programs, includ-
ing an increase in the \$80 mil-
lion a year ceiling on categori-
cal assistance payments.

*Laws to curb drug use and
prevent crime.

*Revision of auto insurance
regulations.

*Air and water pollution con-
trol.

*Financing higher education,
including a proposed tuition

Dear editor:
 Along about this time of the year it's customary to try to look ahead and predict what's going to happen in the next twelve months, or anything to get your mind off what happened in the last twelve, but the predictions business is in poor standing these days, nothing seems to turn out the way the experts forecast, from Viet Nam to the economy to the football season, so I thought I'd switch.

Instead of saying what's going to happen, I'd like to suggest what ought to happen.

And if you put it in one sentence, what the world needs most in 1971 is to re-discover the ability to kid itself.

Everybody takes everything too seriously, from college students to world statesmen. All the leaders are afraid they're going to say the wrong thing or pick up the wrong end. They have the idea everything you do has to be exactly right, everything you say has to be written down in advance.

Why, if they read a newspaper or a testimonial and they need to say it thank you, they pull out a paper and read it: "I thank you."

Nobody ever admits he has a crop failure, politically speaking. If a commission, after spending a year and a million dollars, criticizes some program, the program director claims the criticism basically was complimentary. Right now, both parties are still claiming they each came out ahead in the November elections.

Following are Congressman Bob Price's comments on House action to provide United Nations with special \$20 million grant for new building program:

I strongly oppose liberal efforts to give the United Nations a special \$20 million grant just so it can expand its bureaucratic base of operations in New York City.

In my view, we already pay far too much money to support this organization which has proven itself unable to either promote or maintain world peace. This nation simply cannot afford to sponsor such an expensive international debating society. What few good things the U.N. accomplishes such as international health and education programs can surely be separated out, re-organized and funded at more modest levels.

Supporters of this \$20 million give away argue that the U.N. will be forced to move its New York headquarters and relocate in a foreign country if we do not subsidize its new building program.

My answer to this argument is, if this is what it takes to get the U.N. out of the U.S., I'm for it.

Following are Congressman Bob Price's comments on House action to exempting .22 Caliber Rimfire Ammunition from the Gun Control Act of 1968: Late Monday, the House exempted .22 Caliber Rimfire Ammunition from the Gun Control Act of 1968. If this becomes law, hunters and other sportsmen will be able to freely buy rifle, shotgun, and .22 Caliber Rimfire shells without being subjected to burdensome federal regulations.

The House action marks the culmination of what has for me been almost two years of efforts directed toward persuading House liberals to drop their opposition to my legislation exempting sporting ammunition from the Gun Control Act. I pleaded my case based on my conviction that regulating sporting ammunition is of no real usefulness in preventing or solving crimes.

The turning point came recently, when the Treasury and the Justice Departments advised Congress that in the first two years of Federal gun control, there was not a single instance reported where ANY of the record keeping requirements from sporting ammunition led to a successful criminal prosecution.

Now that sporting ammunition has been exempted from federal regulation, I can redouble my efforts to have the Gun Control Act repealed in its entirety.
