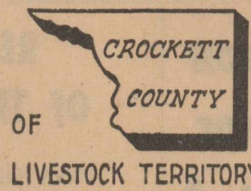

373 Signers On Petition Asking Court To Consider Nursing Home

Petitions bearing the names of 373 citizens of Crockett county and asking the County Commissioners Court to study ways and means to bring about a construction of a nursing home facility for the county were presented to the court Monday morning by the Rev.

John Berkley, pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church. The petitions were prepared and the signers sought by Rev. Berkley at the court's request after he met with the group at its October meeting with a verbal request of the court that it consider such a project.

The court asked for an expression from the people on the issue and the petitions were presented as such an expression.

County Judge Troy Williams and several members of the court promised a thorough investigation of all angles of the proposal, to study building plans and operations, and to come up with some concrete information on possibilities of realizing such an improvement for the county.

Rev. Berkley told the group that since his last meeting with them that he had reached a conclusion that a multipurpose facility might better fit the local need. There are many persons in the older group who do not now need full nursing care but need to have ready access to nursing care in case of need. A wing which would provide quarters for such persons able to care for themselves presently but approaching a need for intermittent care was envisioned in this dual purpose plan.

Judge Williams, speaking for the court, promised that study would begin immediately on the type facility which would best meet the need.

"This is not something to jump into without full study," the judge said. "It will take a while, but we will be working on it. The court appreciates this expression of interest on the part of the citizenship of Crockett county."

Board Sets Rates For Medical Bldg. Rentals

Rate of rental for the medical building, problems of finding registered nurses, the never-ending search for doctors to locate here, and questions concerning treatment for indigent patients occupied the regular meeting of the Crockett County Hospital Board Thursday evening.

Through its chairman, Joe Couch, the board voiced recognition of the need and desirability of a nursing home in Ozona but at the same time expressed concern for some of the problems to be faced in administration of such a facility. Presently, the great need would be for doctors, as it is now with the hospital, and for nursing personnel.

Rev. John Berkley, pastor of the Ozona United Methodist Church, who was present for the meeting, pointed to the great need locally for a nursing home, the large number of aging persons in the community, many facing immediate need and many more to face the need in a few years. Rev. Berkley also noted the great

economic loss to the community, pointing out that even a 20-patient facility would produce an annual revenue of approximately \$96,000 which is now, and will be in increasing numbers, leaving this community for others where nursing home facilities are available. Rev. Berkley said that he planned to meet with the commissioners court Monday to present the petitions bearing several hundred signatures asking the court to pursue the matter of a nursing home.

Rental charges to occupants of the medical building were agreed on. The charge to be used is based on square footage. Dr. Joe B. Logan is presently paying \$125 per month and the basic charge was calculated from that amount. The resulting charge would be \$209 for Dr. Louis Cole and for Dr. C. F. Mitchim, whose office is in a rear part of the building with no front entrance, the rate was set at \$50 per month. Dr. Cole is presently getting (Continued on last page)

County Agrees To Take \$146,684 For Land For IH10 Right of Way

Removing what is thought to be one of the last barriers to final construction of Interstate 10 through Crockett County, the county and state this week reached an agreement on purchase price of county

land needed for right-of-way for the super highway.

Memo of agreement and deeds were signed by members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court and the county judge at the court's Monday

session. The action culminated several months of negotiations.

Terms and form of the agreement were presented by Franklin Jordan of the State Highway Department right of way section. Under its terms, the state will pay the county \$146,684 for right of way over county owned land in the path of the Interstate highway through the town of Ozona.

Actual acquisition of the land, however, will not become effective until Sept. 1, 1972, and not then if there is some valid reason for a postponement of the requirement that the county vacate the land.

This time allowance will give the county time to remove any property of value, to relocate the county-owned recreation fields, such as the Little League field and the Powell athletic field. In that time too, the county will have to relocate its county road barn and equipment storage center. The present road barn is in the path of the highway and will have to be torn down or moved.

The county has acquired land at the north edge of Ozona which will be of use as a location for the new playing fields and for the county road maintenance headquarters. Mr. Jordan told the court that the price paid for the stretch of right of way, located in south Ozona, was the highest the state had ever paid for county owned land.

Speculating on the interstate 10 building program in this county, Mr. Jordan told the court that the IH10 plan of construction across this county calls for six more sections or segments to be contracted. The first segment will tie into present IH10 five miles east of Ozona and through the city to about the Early Chandler barns on the west. Two more segments will take the highway to the foot of Bachelor hill. Another segment will complete the road to the top of Bachelor hill and from there two more sections will take it to the Pecos River.

Chamber of Commerce officials report a large number of inquiries about hunting leases, by the day and by the season. With plentiful rains through the summer and fall, the deer are expected to be large in number and fat.

The county's deer and turkey season opens Nov. 13, and runs until January 2. Each hunter is entitled to kill three deer of either sex, no more than two bucks. No special permit is required for the antlerless deer, but a special tag in addition to the license tag must be attached to the carcass. The special tag may be obtained from the landowner where the deer is killed.

Prizes will be awarded again this year to hunters. A 243 S vage lever-action rifle will be awarded for the most points, for the widest rack and the heaviest field dressed deer, a Coleman camp heater will be given. Also, hunters may register at most stores for an ice chest which will be given at a drawing during the Chamber of Commerce banquet early in February.

Deer may be weighed and racks measured at the Trading Post, Ozona Body Works or Cooke's Market.

Another 5 Miles FM Paving For Crockett

The Texas Highway Commission today approved development of 5.0 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Crockett County as part of the 1971 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Engineer J. A. Snell of the Texas Highway Department said the estimated cost of the work is \$250,000.

The work authorized for this county is part of 304.3 miles of new construction and additional financing for 177.1 miles of FM and RM Roads previously designated and constructed in stages. Estimated cost of the program Statewide is 20.9 million.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved secondary roads under State-maintenance in the Farm to Market system.

Of the new construction in the program, 290.8 miles are new roads being added to the system. Of this total 192.8 miles or 66 percent are school bus routes and 178.6 miles or 61 percent are rural mail delivery routes.

Originally intended to get the Texas farmers and ranchers out of the mud and to provide for movement of agricultural produce to markets, the FM system also now affords city dweller and rural resident alike

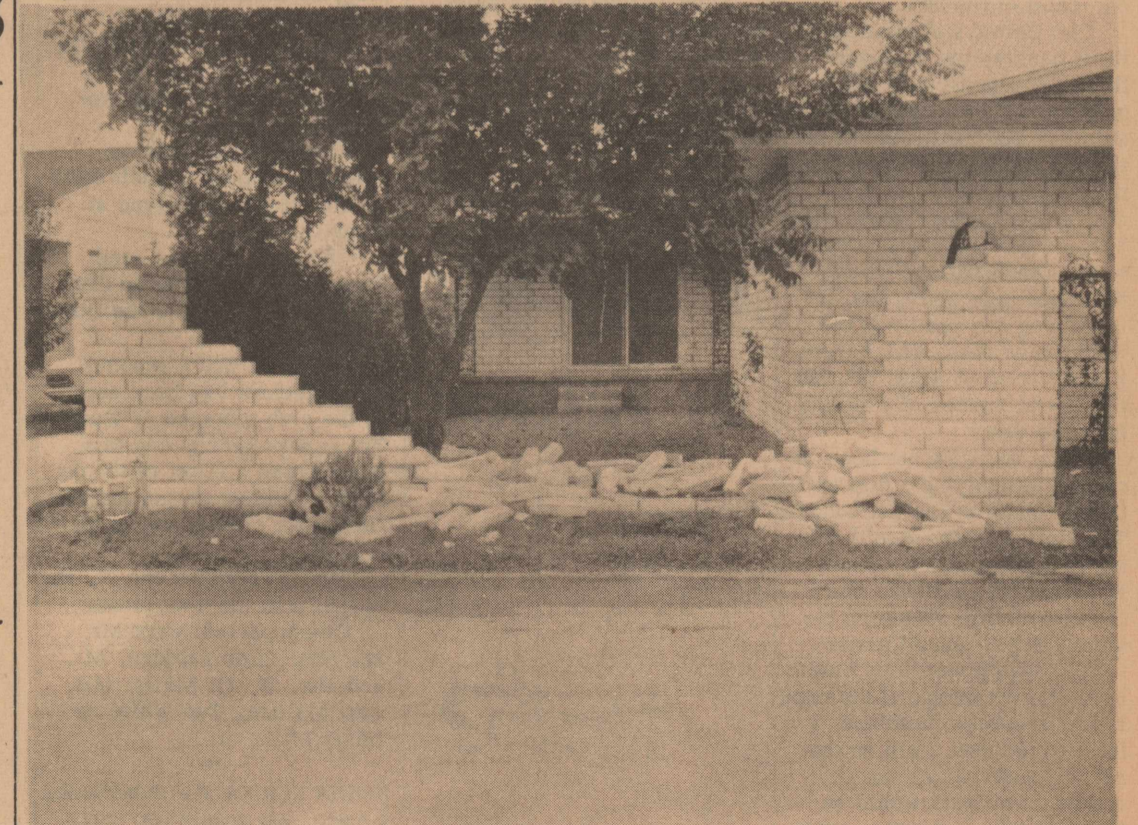
Lions Win First Dist. Game Over Stanton 22 to 0

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

Expulsion of the Republic of China by the United Nations sent shock waves through the Congress. The action was unwarranted and terribly unjust. It set loose demands for a reappraisal of U. S. financial contributions to the U. N.

The expulsion, demanded by Red China as a condition for admission of the Peking regime, makes it apparent the Communist bloc is now dominant at the UN level -- at least on some major issues.

The American effort to keep Formosa in the organization was lost on a procedural vote of 55 to 59. Among the 59 were such pipsqueak nations as Bhutan, Burundi, Guyana, Sierra Leone, So. Yemen and Zambia. Ever hear of any of them? And each had the same voting power as did the USA!

A strong move is now developing in Congress to trim Uncle Sam's annual contribution to the UN budget to the proper level. We now pay more than one-third of the bill.

The United Nations now faces bankruptcy. Last year the U. S. contributed \$318-million, of the total UN receipts of \$967-million. Under the UN charter each member nation is assessed a certain amount, but many ignore that. There are 76 nations in debt to the Organization, which right now owes \$176, 699, 974.

Among the debtors is the Communist bloc, which owes a grand total of \$118, 753, 898, the Soviet portion of which is \$86, 864, 900.

Thus, the USA has been suckered into paying a disproportionate share of the UN budget. The United States should quit being a patsy. If the United Nations is to continue, each member nation should be required to pay annual assessments, which should be based upon its percentage of the population of all the members. I have introduced a bill to that effect, under which the U. S. annual assessment would be \$68-million -- thereby saving the American taxpayers \$250-million a year.

Any Nation which defaults should be dropped from membership.

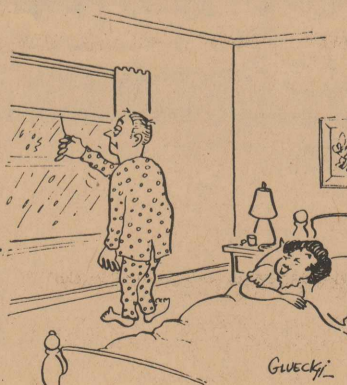

Senator Snelson To Be Governor For-a-Day Dec. 4

Austin--A special invitation is extended to all residents of Crockett County to attend the ceremonies and activities honoring Senator Pete Snelson when he becomes Governor of Texas for a day, Saturday, December 4, according to Lewis R. Timberlake, chairman of the host committee.

Under provisions of the Texas Constitution the President Pro Tempore of the Senate is third in line to the governorship and therefore becomes Governor when the Governor and Lieutenant Governor leave the state. A special predetermined day is traditionally reserved to allow the President Pro Tempore to invite his friends and supporters to the State Capitol to share in the honor of being named Chief Executive of the State of Texas. Governor Preston Smith and Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes have advised Senator Snelson that they will be out of the state on that date.

It is customary for the President Pro Tempore to be sworn in early on the morning of the designated day and then to carry out gubernatorial duties as he deems suitable and to greet his constituents and other friends throughout the day.

Senator Snelson will be honored at an inaugural luncheon as a highlight of the day's activities. Tickets for the luncheon will be made available in each county in the 25th Senatorial District.

Special guests at the day's events will be the residents of Senator Snelson's 25th district, which was recently revised to include 35 counties, 109 towns, some 60,000 square miles and more than 367,000 people.

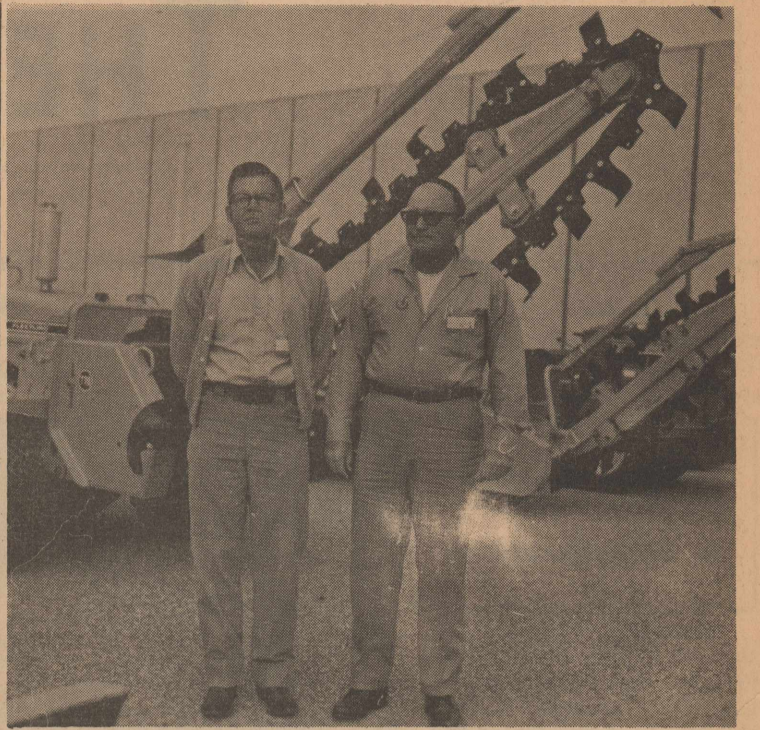

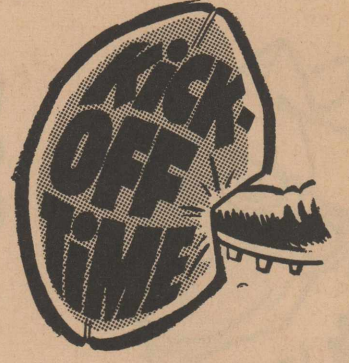

Tips For Gardeners
 From The Ozona Garden Club
 By Mrs. Bailey Post

From this date on through the winter months everyone will look forward to the beautiful sunny days we have most of the time. The temperature is just right to accomplish many tasks in your yard. Take a critical look at the overall appearance, and make a list of improvements to work toward.

Remember all evergreen shrubs entering winter with insufficient moisture, are more susceptible to damage from low temperatures and drying winds. Though there has been plenty of moisture the last few months, some shrubs may have been located where they didn't receive rain, so check any that may need water. Boxwoods are high on the sensitive list. Hollies and pyracanthas may drop their berries if too dry. Also, flowerbud dropping is one of the results of dryness at this time of the

year. I notice azaleas are full of buds. Soak well to the root zone.

If you haven't prepared the bed for roses, it should be done for planting next month or spring. Select an open spot that gets at least six hours of sun each day, has good drainage, and has no competition for food and water from tree roots. Roses grow best in a rich, porous, slightly acid soil that is supplied with additional plant food each month during the growing season. Select your roses now while you may see them in bloom. You will find new varieties on the market in the hybrid tea, floribunda, grandiflora, and climbers. Most climbing hybrid tea roses are "spring only" bloomers, but Big Splash and Don Juan are favorites through

the season. El Cid, a 1970 newcomer is a hybrid tea rose with an unusual fiery red-orange coloring. They are ideal for arrangements. The plants are vigorous and bushy.

Cut tops of peonies back to a few inches above the ground. Add a cup of bonemeal to soil around the plant, and mound with soil for the winter.

Keep mums watered to extend their blooming period.

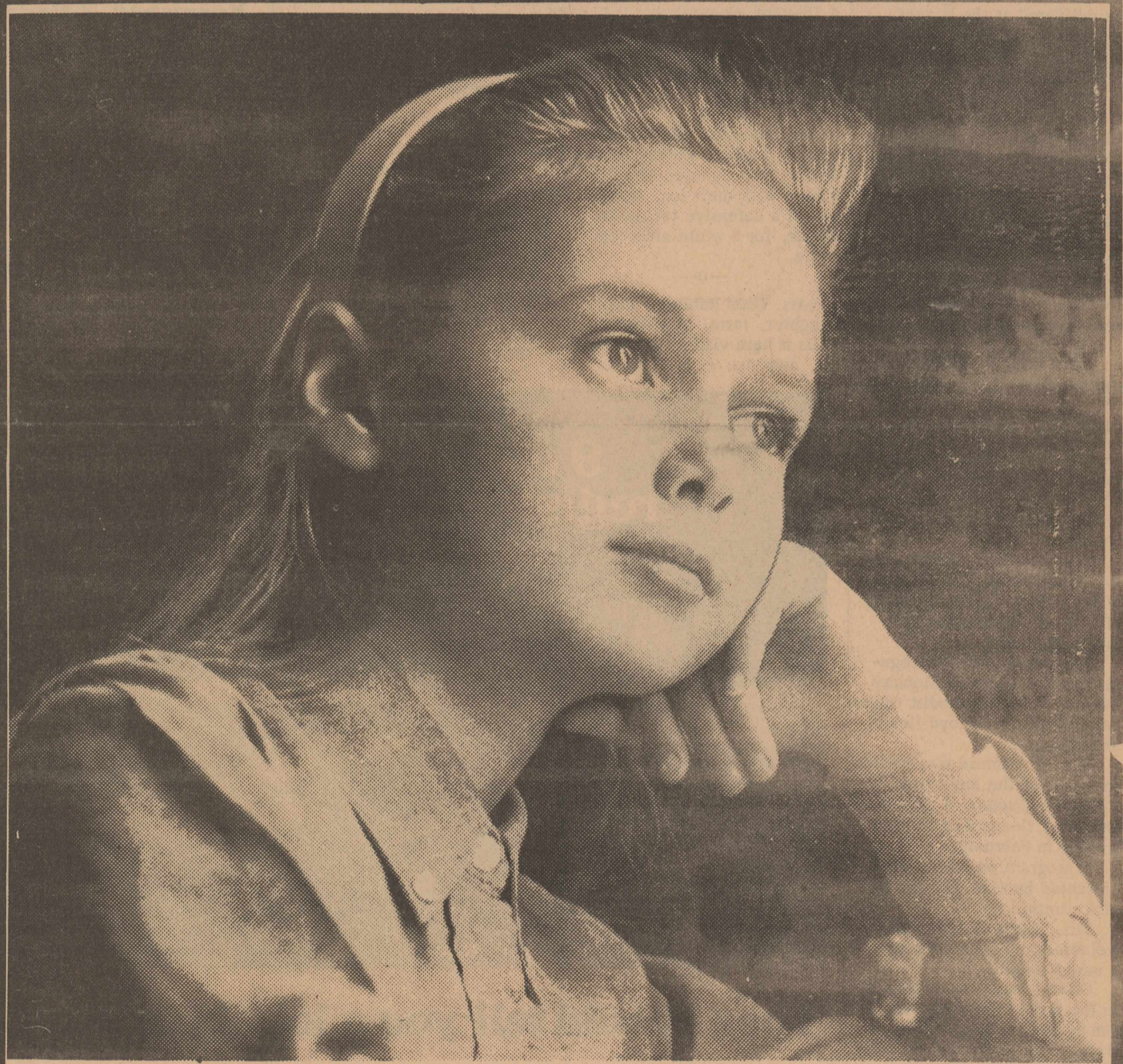
