#### FLOOD OF MONEY CAUSES INFLATION

In the coming weeks and months (we hope not years) there will be much discussion about decisions of the Cost of Living Council and the Price Commission. Inevitably we are all at last going to have to come to grips with the facts of economic life. Inevitably we are going to be asking.

"What really causes inflation? Which come first, wage rises of price rises? Will we ever be able to break free of the Government controls vested in the Living Cost Council and the Price Commission? Why can't we be free—and have free markets for labor and commodities Thursday, December 3, 1942 the way it was before?"

First of all, United States Government spending, authorized by the Congress, is the basic and chief cause of nections at Barnhart for Ozoinflation. The pressures of these vast sums upon prices, directly and indirectly, drive them up. Even so, the measurable yearly increases in the cost of living in the United States have not been above 5.6 per cent in the last six years. Therefore, when wages rise generally above that figure a new pressure is exerted upon prices, causing a wageprice spiral above the rise in prices brought about by the surging money supply.

No one has all the economic answers, but we believe the President's Phase II should be given a chance, and that the Congress of the United States and the Administration itself should cooperate by reining in expenditures. John Maynard Keynes never dreamed of deficits such as those now being piled up. Let's not put all the blame on him, but let us work hard to regain our free economy.

#### DID HE LOSE ANYTHING?

You can argue whether or not smoking marijuana leads to the use of other drugs, or whether the high cost of buying "pot" causes other crimes, but if this article from a Texas college newspaper, the Eagle Grove Eagle, does not shake up every user or potential user of marijuana and the parents of both, then there is no hope.

The article, entitled "The Case of a Youth Arrested and Convicted for the Possession of Marijuana," poses the question: Did he lose anything when he was convicted?

"All he lost was the right to vote, the right to own a gun and the right to run for public office. He lost the opportunity to ever being a licensed doctor, dentist, CPA, engineer, lawyer, architect, realtor, osteopath, physical therapist, private detective, pharmacist, school teacher, barber, funeral director, masseur or stock broker. He can never get a job where he has to be bonded or licensed. He can't work for the city, county or federal government."



This is a general rule of law, that an employer is not liable for an employee's personal miscon-

duct outside the scope of his job. Thus, the owner of a bar was held not liable when a mischievous waiter gave a customer

a painful hotfoot. It is a different story, however, when the employee's duties do include a certain amount of

physical contact with the public. At a movie matinee, a noisy teen-ager was ejected from the heater by an irate usher. In doing so, the usher used consid-

erably more roughness than was necessary. This time, when the teen-ager sued the management for damages, the court pointed out that policing the customers was part

of the job of ushering. Even though the usher overdid it, the court said that the theater, as his employer, would have to pay Furthermore, certain employ-ers may be held liable because of

an extra duty they owe the public. For example, a railroad had to pay damages after an amorous conductor forced several kisses on a reluctant woman passenger. To be sure, kissing passengers

was not within the scope of a conductor's job. But the court said that the railroad, as a public carrier, owed an extra duty to protect its passengers from harm -a duty which in this case it had clearly not performed.

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

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

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

SURRENDER OF PANAMA CANAL? Current negotiations concerning the future of the Panama Canal could lead to another setback for the cause of freedom in this hemisphere.

Public attention has been focused on the Nixon administration's new Asian policy, which has resulted in expulsion of the free Chinese from the U. N. and American appeasement of Red China. But the U. S. is in danger of surrendering strategic advantage much closer to home. In Washington, many observers believe the Nixon administration is prepared to turn over much of the Panama Canal Zone to the Panamanians.

No need exists for such action. The United States purchased the Canal Zone and dug the canal. It has been generous, perhaps excessively generous, with Panama. The U.S. has a right to the Canal Zone in per-

Control of the Canal Zone is one of the few strategic and political advantages the U.S. possesses in Latin America after a decade of retreat from a position of unquestioned power in this hemisphere. Indeed the Panama Canal is essential for interfleet mobility for major U.S. naval vessels. Effective operation of the canal wouldn't be feasible if an unstable, left oriented Panamanian government controlled the Canal Zone. Panama, unfortunately, is a notoriously unstable country,

Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-SC) recently pinpointed the strategic importance of the Panama Canal, saying: "As an artery of marine transportation, the Panama Canal enterprise became, and still is, a part of the coastline belonging to the United States. As such its exclusive control by the United States is necessary for national defense just as the control of the Chesapeake Bay or New York Harbor is necessary for national defense."

The senator added: "It is discouraging to report that negotiations are once again underway with Panama, even though the present government is a revolutionary regime with with little prospe and with no porcedures for ratifying a new treaty.

It is shocking that U. S. officials would contemplate giving away a U.S. strategic advantage and throw away the vast sums American taxpayers have invested in the Canal Zone. Transfer of the Zone to Panama would deprive the United States of significant military and economic protection. It is doubtful that the U.S. could use the canal in a time of international crisis if an antagonistic regime were in charge of the Canal zone. Indeed whoever controls the Canal Zone is in a position to exert leverage on all countries using the canal, especially the South American countries whose

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

**Operation Build America** 

Federation of Independent Business, have strongly supported what is known as "Operation Build America."

This is centered on legislation pending in the Congress by Congressmen Joe Evins of Tennesee and Keith Sebelius of Kansas, Senators James Pearson of Kansas and Fred Harris of Oklahoma and many co-sponsors to give tax incentives to new employment generating enterprises that locate in rural areas.

Recently the Western Conference of Governors, in one of the strongest documents of the second half of this century, took up this matter. The resolution follows:

The United States needs to develop a national policy on voluntary population distribution. It is now projected that the population of the United States will rise from 200 million people at present to more than 300 million people by the

Our nation has practiced population distribution incentives in the past through such devices as the Homestead Act. A new and fresh approach to population distribution at the present time is needed.

The Social and economic problems of overpopulated areas include ghettos; poverty; mass transit demands; overloaded educational, health, and rural America.

For some time, the nation's independent business people, voting through the National crime; and a growing level of individual frustration and nervous tensions.

On the other hand, underpopulated areas are suffering high economic and social costs as well. These costs are brought on by an inadequate tax base and too few people to support necessary institutions on a community basis such as schools churches, hospitals, recreational

Environmental management and conservation become excessively costly because of the severe population imbalance between the overpopulated States and those which are underpopulated.

The Federal Government, through its inadvertent and un-coordinated planning and programs, is one of the major factors in creating population im-

There are remedies that should be attempted to alleviate population imbalance. Subsidized low interest rates could be offered on loans for industrial expansion in underpopulated areas. A revamping of the Interstate Commerce Commission freight rates, which now make economic expansion virtually impossible in some underpopulated areas, could be adjusted to permit expansion in underdeveloped areas.



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
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

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#### **Tips For Gardeners**

From The Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

"Autumn to winter, winter into spring, Spring into summer, summer into fall, So rolls the changing year, and so we change, Motion so swift, we know not that we move."

-Dinah Mulock Craik The gardener can now take things easier than during almost any month in the year. Once the outdoor garden is tucked away for winter, there is comparatively little to do, though planting should continue until very cold weather.

When fruit trees have dropped their leaves they may be given a first dormant spray, and pruning may be started. Dormant spraying to combat scale, insects and certain other pests and diseases may now be given attention for evergreens and other plants. Do not spray if there is danger of the temperature dropping below freezing. Some of the fruit trees that do well in this area are (check with nursery for others):

Plums - Santa Rosa, a large red plum that ripens in late June seems to be the best. Methley, a purple plum ripens in early June. Bruce is a large red plum that ripens in May, it needs a pollinator to produce

Figs - Texas Everbearing produces large yellow figs. Celeste has small purple fruit of high quality.

Pear - The Kieffer is dependalbe and productive. LeConte does especially well in our

Pecans - Check with county agent Jacoby for best variety to plant here.

Hardwood cuttings of deciduous shrubs may be made and planted in a sheltered border. or buried in sand, to be taken out and planted where you want them in the spring. Among






