Vargas Indicted For Murder, Two for Dope

Judge Charles Sherrill of Fort Stockton impaneled the 112th District Court grand jury for the September term here Friday morning.

The grand jury returned two indictments, one against an Ozona man on a charge of murder with malice and the other charging two men with possession of marijauna.

Felipe Vargas, III, was indicted on a charge of murder with malice in connection with Baggett. the shooting death of Lupe Fierro November 14, three miles east of here on Hwy 290. Vargas has been hospitalized with a heart condition since the night of the shooting and a date for the trial has not been

According to statements by Vargas and his 14-year-old son, Raul, the shooting took place as the two men were struggling at the roadside. Fierro was alive when the ambulance arrived at the scene, but was pronounced dead on arrival at Crockett County Hospital.


A favorite team would be hard to pick this year. Mason, winning the championship trophy last year in two overtimes against Brady, will be a top condender and will have the added boost of de-

Politics makes strange bedfellows, and remarkable switches do take place in these swirling times. Vice President Agnew has made a great name for himself, and has been the countervailing influence in a Republican Administration that has outdone the Democrats in money spending and concessions to the Communist powers. Mr. Agnew still seems a good bet in the Republican Convention next year.

THE CAUSE OF CRIME

One of the greatest causes of crime is salacious literature. The right to have pornography all over town is the right to destroy our country from within. Americans spend two billion dollars a year on pornographic literature. If the filth merchants traded only with adults, it would be bad enough. But three-fourths of the pornography in the United States falls into the hands of young boys and girls in their early teens.

To sit back "openmindedly" and conclude that smutty literature has its place is to condone national suicide. As James Kilpatrick pointed out in The Smut Peddlers: "The heart and soul of this racket is not the grown-up sucker. It is the curious child . . ." Police officials point to the results: rebellion against authority; social disease; homeless children; shattered lives of unwed parents; an expanding population of sick perverts; a self-indulgence that condones adultery; and the destruction of the home.

Psychiatrists point out that pornography is undermining the mental health of hundreds of thousands of teenagers. The chief psychiatrist of the Philadelphia county court recently declared that pornography is the greatest single cause of sexual immorality. Detective Austin Duke of St. Louis maintains: "I have never picked up a juvenile sex offender who did not have this stuff with him, in his car, or in his house."

No one is on the firing line more than the judges who man the juvenile courts. They pointed out at their national conference that salacious literature has had such a profound effect on our society that it is changing the very character of juvenile delinquency. J. Edgar Hoover put it very briefly: "Sex-mad magazines are creating criminals faster than jails can be built to house them."

Other nations have often wondered why America has the highest crime rate in the world, and why our youth play the leading role in this gruesome drama. How can we account for this precocious perversion and youthful addiction to crime? The greatest cause is indecent literature. But why has pornography been permitted to run so rampant? The answer is threefold; its profits are enormous; it has some of the sharpest legal talent in the country behind it; you and I have done little or nothing to prevent it.

The solution must be found on the local and national level. Local groups are being formed all over the country to hit the purveyors of smut in the pocketbook, the only place they understand. Cincinnati has formed a Citizens for Decent Literature organization. It publishes a Handbook of Procedures that is helpful for any city (3300 Carew Tower, Cincinnati, 25c a copy). Local postmasters can be helpful if they are kept informed.



Father to the Rescue

Suppose a man sees his son being beaten up by the neighbor-hood bully. Does he have a legal right to use force in his son's



He does indeed. Parallel to the right of self defense is the right to defend the members of one's family, with force if need be. This doctrine goes all the way back to the days of feudalism, when the master of the household was legally entitled to protect his family from attack.

But in such situations, there is always the chance of escalating lation of 204, 8 million -- a the violence. Therefore, the law places careful limits on this right of family defense.

1) The force used must not be excessive. For example:

A father found his son in- mas. WHITE'S AUTO STORE volved in a fracas with the man next door. Rushing to the rescue, he knocked the man unconscious with a mighty blow on the head. Then he followed up with a swift kick in the abdomen.

For the resulting internal injuries, the father was duly held liable in court. The right to defend his son, said the court, did not include the right to kick someone who was lying on the

ground unconscious. 2) The force must be used only to defend, not to "get even." In another case, a father found out that a certain teacher had slapped his son in class. Days later, meeting the teacher on the sidewalk, he punched him in the

Could the father be held liable? Again, yes. The court said that since the boy was in no danger at the time of the punch, the father's action could not fairly

be called defensive. 3) Many courts add that the father's right to use force is no greater than the child's. Thus:

A belligerent teen-ager deliberately picked a fight with another youth. But by the time his father came along, he was already getting the worst of it. The father promptly slugged the other

boy with a rock. Sued later for damages, the father claimed he had acted to protect his son. But the court held him liable anyhow. The court said that, in terms of the right to use force, he "stood in his son's shoes"—that is, in the shoes of the aggressor.

WASHINGTON **NEWS LETTER**

By a margin of nearly twoto-one the House last week season. Jan Pelto led the Ozona voted -- again -- to outlaw school busing when done solely for racial mixture purposes. This was an amendment to a higher education aid measure.

ore from Rhodesia. Chrome, of which we produce none, is a required ingredient in the manufacture of stainless steel. Most of the world's supply is found in Russia and Rhodesia.

Our embargo against trade with Rhodesia 5 years ago, from which we previously obtained most of our chrome, gave the Russians a real windfall. Since 1967 the price of this ore jumped from \$29 to \$72 per ton, and 60% of our imports had to come from the

The boycott was imposed by the UN, and this country followed suit. Other UN members, like Japan and Russia, used better sense and continued to import chrome from Rhodesia during this period.

Ever since 1967 a good many of us have insisted our government should not impose such a ridiculous restraint upon Rhodesia, a friendly democratic and anti-communist country. It took an Act of Congress to remove it.



For many of your friends and kin you might make Christ- height of about an inch, and mas a gardening affair. There are so many creative gifts you can make yourself, as well as the always welcome gifts of shrubs, trees, roses, bulbs, pooks and houseplants.

Also for the patio are tables, chairs, containers, attractive planters, hanging baskets, chimes, and many accessories for birds. Statuary and fountains always add interest in both small and large landscaped or December they will probably

In most magazines you can find pictures and directions for making very attractive wreaths for outdoors or indoors. Those using dried seed pods, pine cones, nuts, etc. can be made now. Also beautiful sprays or wreaths can be designed out of the many different varieties of evergreens available at Christmas time.

If you have never grown paper white narcissus, try it or an exciting winter project. Select a bowl about six to eight inches across and several nches deep. This size should hold seven bulbs and make a pretty group. Collect pretty pebbles in assorted sizes from one-fourth inch to one inch in diameter. Line the bottom of the bowl with $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches of pebbles. Place the bulbs pointed end up on this layer, spaced about an inch apart. Them add more pebbles around and beween the bulbs to anchor them n place. But do not cover the oulbs completely, let top half or two-thirds stick out. Put water in the bowl so that it comes just up to the base of the bulbs. Set the planted bowl n a dark cool place for about three weeks. Perhaps a closed closet, basement or attic, just


