Elections Generate Area Interest

Council Members To Be Elected

Murray Opposed By Kenneth Henry

Two places on the Muleshoe City Council are open and the new council members will be chosen in an election on Saturday, April 3.

The terms of Alex Williams and Linda Murray expire this year, and both incumbents have filed for re-election. Murray is opposed in Place Two by Kenneth Henry, a local insurance agent.

Murray and his family have lived in Muleshoe for the past 17 years. Both his daughters, Patty, a senior in Muleshoe High School, and Susan, an eighth grader in Muleshoe Junior High School, were born in Muleshoe. He is the manager of the C.R. Anthony Company and his wife, Betty, is secretary at Muleshoe High School.

Murray has been a member of the Muleshoe City Council for the past three years. He is a member of the Muleshoe Lions Club.

He said of his term in office, "I just ask people to look at the record of how I have voted for the past three years while serving on the city council. I try to look at what's good for everybody and act accordingly."

"If I am re-elected, I will continue to represent the people of Muleshoe to the best of my ability."

His opponent, Kenneth Henry, has been a Bailey County resident since 1942. He and his wife, the former Darlene Black, have two daughters, Charla, nine and Sherri, seven. Cont'd on Page 9, Col. 1

★★ Hospital Facts ★★

The Bailey County Hospital District Board is not committed to purchase West Plains Memorial Hospital at 'nearly' \$400,000 or at any price.

Through a new program, Title XVII, with funds from the state, county and the federal government, indigent medical patients are treated for medical problems in approved hospitals. If a hospital does not meet federal specifications, then the county is responsible for the patient's treatment in the nearest designated hospital. The county would become responsible for medical care, transportation and expenses incurred in treating the indigent person. The county would be obligated to pay only a portion of an indigent's medical treatment in a federally approved hospital.

With construction of a new hospital in Muleshoe being held up due to a law suit, costs have increased. Apparently the law suit filed by the opposition has helped a harassment procedure, and has kept plans from being finalized and hospital construction funded.

John Horn, administrator of the Seymour Hospital, stated to The Journal Tuesday afternoon, "I would hate to have to start building a hospital now, because hospital construction costs are increasing each day." He was referring to a statement made by an opposition member that he (Horn) had said he could start today and build a hospital for the same money the Seymour hospital cost three years ago.

The Needmore Community originally was represented on the Hospital District Board by Eddie Beene, however due to harassment and economic pressure he was forced to resign.

In December, the Bailey County Hospital District Board received a letter from Joe Smith, First Southwest Bonding Company, which released the Hospital District Board from all obligations to him and the First Southwest Bonding Company. The letter was read during the December meeting and made a part of the minutes. Several members of the opposition to the Bailey County Hospital District Board were present at the meeting when the letter was read.

No concrete proposals have been made by any member of the opposition to the Bailey County Hospital District Board and no solutions to the hospital question have been suggested.

There are successful hospitals in towns and areas of comparable size to Muleshoe. Seymour opened a 51-bed hospital in August, 1969 and John Horn, hospital administrator said the occupancy rate is above 60 percent after a slow start and continues to rise. He said Tuesday there are four doctors presently on the staff and they are negotiating for another doctor at this time. The population in Seymour is approximately 4,000 and the county population is 5,000. Horn commented, "The hospital district is the sensible way to go if you have a choice." The hospital at Seymour is a Hospital Authority.

Elton A. Hill, administrator of Bowie Memorial Hospital at Bowie in Montague County said he has been administrator of that hospital since a few months after it opened in May, 1966. He said the Bowie hospital has 50 beds and bids will be opened in April for 16 additional beds. Bowie's population is 5,300 and 7,000 are estimated by Hill to be in the immediate area. The Bowie Hospital has seven doctors on the staff and an attempt is being made to secure an additional three doctors.

Jim Neal, administrator of the hospital at Vernon said he has a master's degree in hospital administration and said there are 10 doctors who utilize the hospital facilities at Vernon. He said the hospital has 100 beds and the occupancy is slowly building. He added that he has a number of years as a hospital administrator and said that anytime a new hospital is built, it does not fill and stay occupied overnight. That any hospital in the nation that is new starts slow, then builds the occupancy rate.

"No hospital in the country can operate the first year without using tax money when it is available," he commented, "and I hope by the third year to break even and not have to use tax money for operation."

The room rate in the hospital at Vernon is \$28 a day.

Since it has become definitely known that Ernest Locker, A. R. McGuire and C. G. (Grundy) Lewis are in favor of dissolving the Bailey County Hospital District and in view of the experience acquired by the incumbents, and the work they have put forth, The Journal endorses Mrs. J. G. Arn, Sam Damron, D. O. Burslesmith and Freddie Parkman for re-election.

The newest addition to the hospital will be open Monday through Friday, and Saturday morning. Weekday hours will be 9-12 and 1:30-5 p.m. and Saturday morning, 9-12.

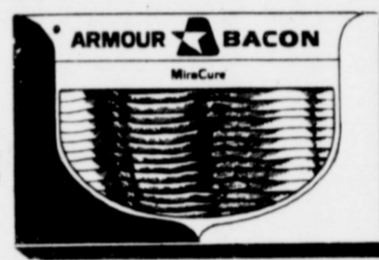

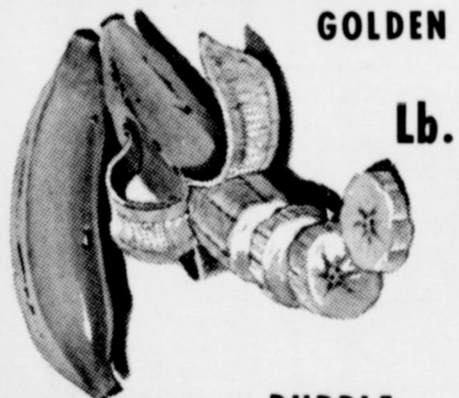

COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES

This past week I have introduced legislation in the Senate which would relieve the National Labor Relations Board of its current judicial functions and return that responsibility to the federal courts.

The National Labor Relations Board, commonly known as the NLRB, was established by an Act of Congress 36 years ago. It is comprised of five members and is currently charged with hearing cases of alleged unfair labor practices and with the administrative handling of union representation elections.

The National Labor Relations Act of 1935 was designed to guarantee to employees the right to organize without employer interference and to impose upon employers the duty to bargain in good faith with chosen representatives of their employees. It was a worthy effort.

In passing the Act, Congress delegated quasi-judicial powers to the NLRB to put into effect specific labor policy. It is the stated policy of Congress that employees have the right to organize and that individual employees at the same time have the right to choose not to join a labor organization.

In exercising its power the Board has ignored the latter part of this Congressional policy and proceeded on a self-directed course.

Congress has had 36 years in which to assess the degree of faith used by the NLRB in implementing Congressional policy. In my opinion we can only conclude that the Board has not fully carried out Congressional policy.

The Board has behaved as if it were an extension of organized labor. A set of hearings on this matter conducted by the Senate's Subcommittee on Separation of Powers has revealed a complete lack of public confidence in the Board. Witness after witness appeared before the subcommittee to protest the tenor of the actions of the Board. Endless cases were cited which would have convinced even the most die-hard of the Labor Board's champions that labor policies enunciated by Congress have been ditched in favor of divergent approaches formulated by members of the Board. There is no question in my mind about the objectivity of these witnesses. Those testifying presented cogent arguments to back up their contentions. The general opinion which emerged substantiated what had been an open secret among all who must deal with the Labor Board. That is that the principle of free employee choice has been subverted by the Board's obvious preference for a policy of enforced unionization.

All this reflects adversely on Congress since the Board was established by Congress. I believe it is now up to Congress to take the action necessary to insure that its own policy is properly implemented. The current structure of the NLRB directly involves the Separation of Powers concept set forth in our Constitution. One of the major political innovations of the Twentieth Century, and one which remains an experiment, is the delegation of Congressional power to so-called independent agencies such as the NLRB. These independent agencies derive their

power from Congress and their functions are often legislative, executive, and judicial in nature. We favor Separation of Powers in our government and yet we have found no way to impose this structure on our regulatory agencies. The success of the regulatory experiment generally is still an unanswered question. But our experience with the National Labor Relations Board has not been favorable.

My bill would separate the administrative and judicial functions of the NLRB by transferring the jurisdiction of the trial of unfair labor practice cases to the Federal District Courts. It would give complainants the alternative right to present their own cases before the courts or to have such cases presented for them by a U. S. Attorney.

The Federal Court had this jurisdiction before Congress established the National Labor Relations Board.

I expect that some will argue that labor relations is such a complex field that cases in this area must be considered by men of particular expertise. I do not believe, however, that labor relations is any more complex than a large number of other complex fields with which the judiciary is called upon to deal on a regular basis. Federal judges are called upon to decide extremely complex cases in the areas of finance, medicine, psychiatry and numerous other fields. Judges do possess expertise which is either necessary or even desirable. To make a valid judgement, it is only necessary to take due consideration of the facts, including the testimony of competent expert witnesses, and to apply the law to those facts.

My bill would place jurisdiction for deciding unfair labor practice cases where it actually belongs--in the courts.

ally stated definitely that they are in favor of dissolving the Bailey County Hospital District.

In a publication released the first of this week the following statement is printed: "The residents of Bailey County cannot rest easy until the Bailey County Hospital District has been dissolved by an election and to accomplish this, the county must elect the candidates sponsored by the Bailey County Taxpayers Association."

Advocating a second election and stating--"This election will probably be called for early June, . . ." the opposition to the hospital district has asked election for "our candidates" and comment: "The Bailey County Taxpayer's Association is sponsoring Mr. C.G. Several years ago, continued Mrs. Gulley, home demonstration agents worked individually with the homemakers on their projects. "We worked on pride, and learned to make home-making interesting, and make the best of what we had.

"No one had much back then, and we learned to use a lot of things in the best way possible. For instance, in World War II, when a lot of doctors and nurses were called away to war, we had an intensive, six weeks home nursing course which was taught by an instructor from a hospital in Denver. We learned about illnesses and how to care for old people. It helped, as many other things did back then," she continued.

"We worked to build up the image of the homemaker. At one time, only one member of our club had water piped into her home. We also learned to use and care for electrical appliances when electricity was put into rural homes. Many of us had never seen electrical appliances before, and didn't know anything about them," she added.

There are no dues involved in being a member of a home demonstration club, pointed out Mrs. Gulley, although voluntary contributions are accepted. And each year, she added, 50 cents of each member's contribution is used for district needs and to help with a scholarship.

One person in ten living in Bailey County is drawing free commodities now. The second thought concerns the cost of constructing a hospital. Hospital Corporation of America is constructing a 57

bed hospital in Levelland at a cost of \$880,000. Baylor County Hospital Authority constructed a 51 bed hospital at a cost of \$950,000. University Hospital in Lubbock, a new 110 bed hospital constructed to support two additional floors only cost \$2,500,000. Yet the Bailey County Hospital Board proposes to spend \$1,850,000 constructing a 50 bed hospital for Muleshoe. I was interested to see that there will be a surgeon moving to Muleshoe soon but I think that the residents of the area would be interested in knowing the country from which he is immigrating.

 IS YOUR SON NEXT?
 TO: ALL RESIDENTS OF THE MULESHOE AREA
 On Monday, March 29, 1971, a courtmartial jury in Fort Benning, Georgia found Lt. William Calley guilty of murder with malice in the My Lai massacre. He is said to have killed twenty "innocent" civilians in this incident and is also charged with one count of attempted murder. In 1945, with Presidential, Congressional, and populace

approval, the atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki and Hiroshima, Japan. Were there no innocent civilians within these cities? None of the people located there were doing any harm to the great American war machine. They weren't firing the guns, sailing the ships, or flying the planes that were killing Americans. Yet, not one of the men responsible for dropping these bombs was ever brought to trial. Why? Because it was a war declared by Congress? If it takes a Congressional act to make murder legal, then basically, every officer who has ever ordered a man into combat and seen him die in Vietnam is technically guilty of murder. The reason being that it is an illegal war. I do not advocate the killing of civilians any more than the next man but, the "innocent" civilians in Vietnam are the ones who drop mortar shells into your position at night. The saying "Farmer by day, Viet Cong by night" is not the figment of an over worked imagination. Having served as a squad leader with the 6th Battalion, 31st Infantry, 9th Infantry Division in Vietnam, I have seen first hand what "innocent" civilians can do. I was wounded in action three

times and two of these three times came from what is commonly called the "booby-trap." This is usually an explosive device set by the Viet Cong to inflict casualties on American troops when no V.C. are actually in the area. Obviously, the Viet Cong can't just set up these devices without informing the local populace of their location. Yet, not once did any of these "in-

nocent" civilians make any attempt to inform us of booby-traps in the area. This was mainly due to the fact that the "innocent" civilians were either the ones setting up these devices, or they were Viet Cong sympathizers. In October, 1970, the Muleshoe area buried its fifth victim of the Vietnam war. The nation has buried over 30,000. If we sit idly by while men like Lt. Calley are used as

scapegoats by our military leaders, we are desecrating the very thing which these 30,000 men have fought and died for. I urge you not to let these men die in vain. What is happening is making a mockery of our very existence as a democratic nation. Write your congressman and support our troops in Vietnam. After all, your son could be on trial next. Sincerely,

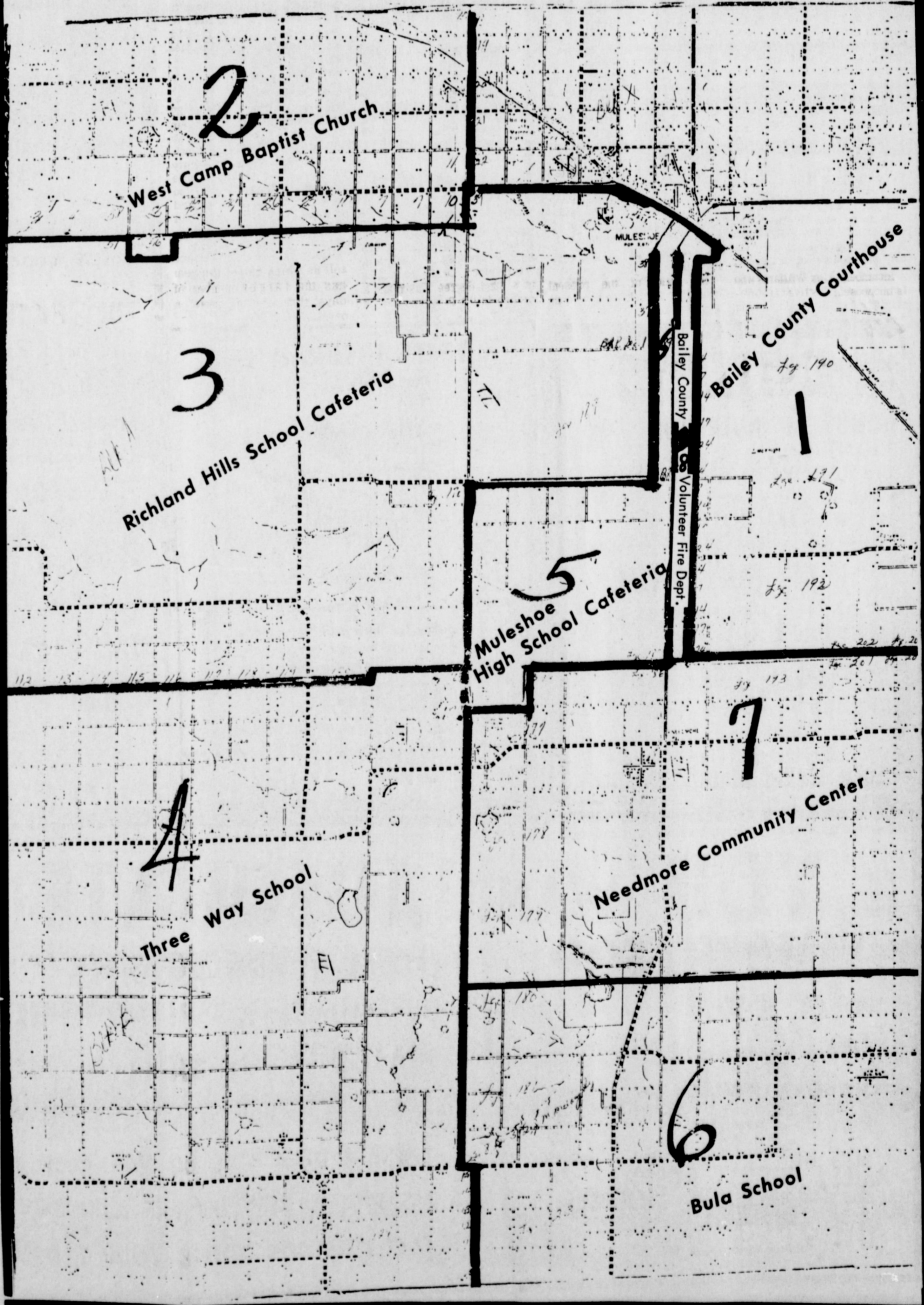

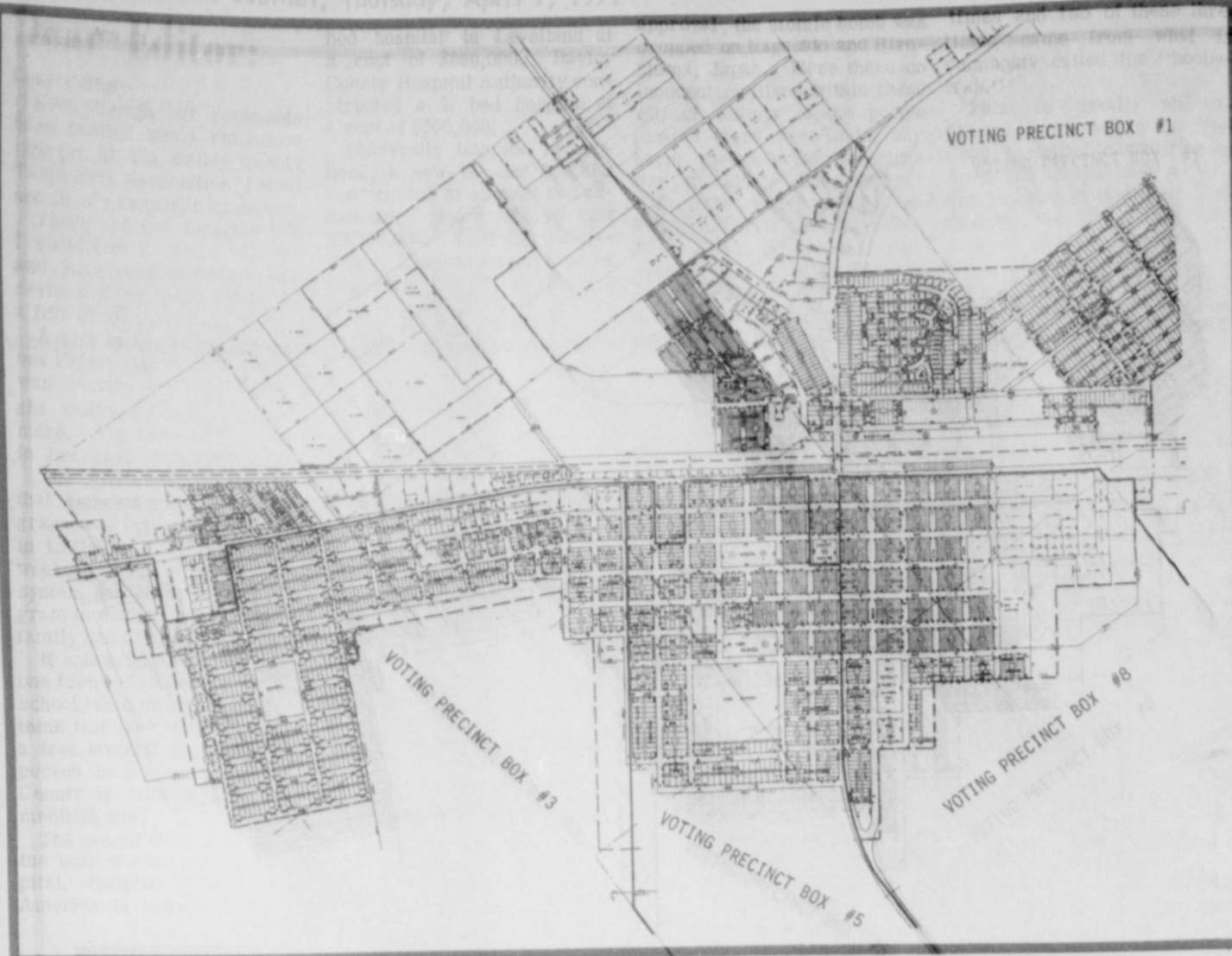

The U. S. Air Force is phasing out slot machines at its overseas bases and will banish them entirely after July 1, 1972, a senate inquiry into military corruption announced recently. The AF decision is the latest of a series of actions taken by the military against gambling devices, once defended by the Pentagon as money-making morale builders.

'Ole Flu Bug Bites Residents; Hits At School

The flu bug has bitten hundreds of area residents during the past two weeks, with a major flu epidemic beginning to subside somewhat in this county.

The four local schools were especially hard-hit last week with a high number of absences among both students and teachers. This week, the schools reported absences of approximately 12 percent of the students with 242 students being out on Monday.

Muleshoe Superintendent Neal Dillman said 88 high school; 65 junior high school; 40 from Mary DeShazo and 49 from Richland Hills did not report for classes Monday. There are 1,949 students enrolled in the four schools.

Last week, Muleshoe high school had 120 students and several teachers out in one day and 80 on another day.

The local doctors report they have treated large numbers of influenza patients during the

past two or three weeks, with one doctor's office being reported filled to overflowing with flu patients daily.

The flu has been no respecter of age either as no age limit has escaped the bug. From the very young to the very old have contracted the illness, which has been accompanied by aching muscles and bones, headaches, temperature and coughs.

Deadline Today For '71 Tags, Says Assessor

Today (Thursday) at midnight is the deadline to have your 1971 license plates displayed on your vehicle, reminds Bailey County Tax Assessor-Collector Jean Lovelady.

Mrs. Lovelady said that sales had been running slightly behind the 1970 figures since tags went on sale February 1 until the past week when she and her office deputies found a stepped-up pace in the sale of license tags.

Law enforcement officials will start issuing tickets as of midnight tonight for failure to display the 1971 tags.

Her first Extension Service assignment was as home demonstration agent of Cottle County in 1947. Two years later, she transferred to Hunt County as home demonstration agent.

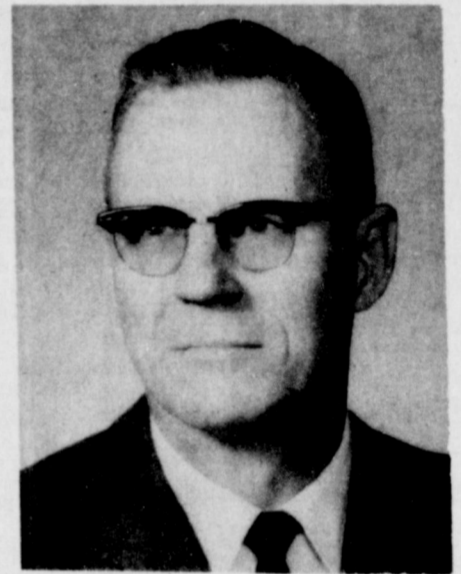

The Internal Revenue Service is noted for being an efficient collection organization, but they are also in the book and publication business on a big scale. The leading book they sell (as a service -- not for profit) is "Your Federal Income Tax." At 75¢ it continues to be an annual best seller. A companion publication is the "Tax Guide for Small Business," which also sells for 75¢.

When you know that the common 1040 income tax forms and the accompanying schedules are printed in the hundreds of millions, you have to realize that the IRS printing job is a big one. IRS has several hundred free publications that discuss various tax problems. They have an estimated 6500 different forms, instructions and publications to cover the complex tax laws. Every day they have to throw away several tax forms that have been made obsolete by a change in the law, regulations, or by court decision. Just be thankful you only have to fill out a few pages of forms for your individual income tax return. A lot of other folks have to fill out quite a few more.

Corn Blight Not Expected To Hit Here

The possibility of losing a corn crop in the corn belt states to Southern Leaf Blight in May or June is remote. This is the conclusion of Geigy scientists who recently completed a series of field experiments at the Geigy research farm in Florida. Their findings agree with earlier university research which also concluded that early season blight was unlikely. In the Geigy experiments, scientists infected healthy, susceptible T cytoplasm corn seedlings with Southern Corn Leaf Blight. Between January 19 and February 19, ten groups of seedlings were inoculated. Theoretically all that was required at this point to cause blight to spread was the environmental factors of temperature and humidity. Three or four days after each inoculation typical blight lesions developed on the seedlings. But the critical finding was that these lesions never produced spores nor did they cause lesions on untreated corn seedlings used as a check. Thus despite the favorable temperature and humidity factors for infection, which were comparable to late springtime conditions in the Midwest, the researchers found that the blight did not spread.

This is definite evidence, they feel, that the blight, if it occurs at all, will not strike early. ♦ ♦ ♦ The French manufacturer of a new twin-engine, short range air transport designed to carry 130 to 150 passengers over route lengths up to 950 miles has turned to the United States for engines to power the plane.
