

#### Independence Day + 199

As we celebrated the Fourth of July, we were reminded of what happened 199 years ago on that day, in the City of Philadelphia. Fifty-six Americans from 13 British colonies gathered together and signed a Declaration of Independence. These 56 Americans were fully aware that by doing so they were risking their lives. For, if captured by the British, all would have been hanged for treason. Yet, none hesitated to sign that bold and defiant document. To this day, a firm and heavy signature is known as a "John Hancock," after the President of that First Independent Congress assembly.

Today, also a time of deep and pervading troubles for us Americans, we might pause and reflect on the manner of men who gave birth to our country on that July 4, 1776.

We know that their average age was 44, that 19 were lawyers, nine planters, nine merchants, four physicians, and two each were farmers, public servants, and landowners. Two signers were part-time lawyers and planters, one was a lawyer-farmer, another a lawyer-ironmaster, another a public servant-merchant, and still another combined the clergy with his post as a college president. There was also a surveyor, and one, Samuel Adams, described himself simply as "a politician."

Of the 56 signers, all but seven were born in the colonies. Although they came from widely diverse backgrounds, these

56 men had one important quality in common: All believed strongly enough in freedom and independence to be willing to die for it. And in the bitter and often desperate five years of war that followed before America's independence was finally won, many of the 56 signers of the Declaration served actively in that struggle. To bring the victory, these 56 Americans mutually pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor. Such, then, were the men who, 199 years ago, in a place. known now as Independence Hall, struck the first blow for freedom and independence in these now United States. On the eve of America's Bicentennial, it is a heritage worth remembering and preserving at all costs.

**STUFFED "CALICO" CHICKEN THIGHS** 

2 eggs slightly beaten

1 tsp. MSG

1/3 cup corn oil

5 Tbsp. lemon juice, divided

1 cup fine dry bread crumbs

2 tsp. lemon-pepper seasoning

12 broiler-fryer chicken thighs, boned, skinned and flattened 1 2½-ounce jar dried beef, finely chopped 12 Tbsp. shredded cheddar cheese 1 tsp. salt 6 strips pimiento, halved 12 strips bacon

Place chicken on surface smooth side down. Place 1 Tbsp. dried beef, 1 Tbsp. cheese and 1 piece pimiento on each thigh. Fold sides and secure with wooden picks. Wrap bacon around open end and secure with picks. In one bowl mix egg and 2 Tbsp. lemon juice. In second bowl mix bread crumbs, lemon-pepper seasoning, salt and MSG. Dip chicken in egg mixture, then in bread crumb mixture. Heat corn oil in fry pan over medium heat. Add chicken and brown on all sides. Place in single layer in large shallow baking pan; sprinkle with remaining lemon juice. Bake, uncovered, in 350 oven about 45 minutes or until fork can be inserted with ease. Yield: 6 servings.



A select House committee already has directed its staff to draft several articles of impeachment against 229th District Judge O.P. Carrillo of Duval County.

Committee members rounded out their examination of the record in their inquiry into allegations against Carillo last week in closed-door session.

They will vote in open session on the proposed articles.

If a majority of the 11-member panel vote to press any of the articles, the House must be called into session to consider them on the third Monday following the committee report.

#### National Mismanagement

Recently the Chairman of the Board of the U.S. Steel Corporation, Mr. E. B. Speer, told newsmen that "I think we have reached a point in our national development when our American idealism has to be tempered with more economic realism. Some of our national objectives may be very desirable, but our approach to them isn't very practical."

We don't know Mr. Speer personally, but if we are to judge by his words, he must be one of the most mild-mannered men in America. What he could have said was that if his or any other industry were run the same way as the government in Washington, that firm would be bankrupt within 30 days, if it managed to survive that long.

Washington newsman Henry J. Taylor reports that government correspondence now amounts to more than one billion letters a year. That, he points out, comes to 2,793,726 letters a day, 365

days a year - including Sundays and holidays. The cost to you, fellow taxpayer, is \$3.00 a letter.

But that doesn't take into account what to do about all of owners pay up, Bullock those carbon copies. That's where the real rub comes. said. He scheduled an auction

"About 250,000 (yes, 250,000) government employees," explains Taylor, "are chiefly involved with filing the paper into cabinets. These cabinets cover 25 million square feet of floor space. That's more than 12 times the entire rentable floor space in New York's vast 102-story Empire State Building."

The non-elected bureaucrats are not the only mismanagers in Washington. Consider the United States Congress. Earlier this year the President, in a move designed to stimulate the sagging economy, initiated a "tax rebate" of up to \$200 per taxpayer. But within weeks the Congress increased the national debt by \$46,000,000,000. That figures out to \$511 for each and every one of the 90 million wage-earners in the United States.

Add to this the fact that when it comes to the one most important and legitimate end of government - that of our national defense - some members of Congress are miraculously transformed from wild-eyed spenders into penny-pinching misers.

Clearly, the people of the United States need to carefully consider those they will elect to public office in 1976. It's not too early to start thinking about it.

But let me point out that the legislation is very specific in stating that the new exemptions applies only to a league organization itself and does not apply to individuals who play in that league.

This means that league officers can go to the sporting goods store and buy uniforms and equipment for everyone playing in the league and that purchase won't be subject to the sales tax. But Johnny or Johnny's dad will still have to pay the sales tax when they make purchases individually.

Another very important part of the new law specifies that this exemption applies only to organizations in which all participants are less than 19 years old.

Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that we are in midsummer in our area, there may be both a plus and minus side to having a successful and enjoyable time of the year.

On the plus side, many flowers are at their peak of bloom, it is a great time for outdoor living in the early morning and late evening, and the fun of harvesting all kinds of garden vegetables. And there are so many beautiful and well-groomed gardens in our city, you will have a delightful treat to drive around and see all of them.

There is always a minus side too it seems. The first problem is that weeds grow so prolifically to make our streets, vacant lots, business fronts and alleys untidy. Will you help prevent this by doing your share to beautify and keep Ozona clean? The control of insects and diseases seems to be a must also. And the constant chore of watering becomes dull, but does refresh and give beauty and new life to your plants and trees. Three tips to help you get

the most from your geraniums: The foremost requirement for profusely flowering geraniums is plenty of sunshine, but they do very well without the hot afternoon sun. Second, they bloom better if kept semewhat on the dry side, as over watering causes dark spots on the foliage. Potted plants may need to be watered more often than if in a flower bed. Third, geraniums grow reasonably well in almost any good soil that is low in nitrogen. An excess of nitrogen in the soil causes rank foliage growth rather than developing flowers.

There are several varieties of artemisia (Dusty Miller) that gives a quick edging to flower beds and borders and is an ideal contrast plant where brilliantly colored flowers bloom. The plants should not be watered too liberally, and given a spot in the sun. It dried beautifully for winter arrangements.







Consumers can look forward to more explicit warranties from fiber manufacturers who offer warranty programs on their products, Claudia Mitzel, consumer information-clothing and textiles specialist, reported this week.

The new law--effective July 4, 1975--does not make warranties mandatory. It

does set standards that manufacturers must follow if they offer warranties, the specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said. "For the consumer, clothing

warranties are an excellent way of insuring a high stand-ard of materials and workmanship. Warranties are found on many types of clothing and some household furnish-

"If durability is important to the consumer, he should look for those items which carry warranties. "

The specialist noted that one major provision of the new law is to distinguish between "limited" and "full" warranties. A full warranty will cover all aspects of fiber, fabric and apparel performance-whereas a limited warranty and Manuel Hartnett, manager. 
