Kindergarten, First Grade Round-up Due

Neal Dillman announces that Friday, April 30, from 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. is Spring Round-up for first grade children for the 1971-72 school year.

Children who will be six years old on or before September 1, 1971, will register at both of the Muleshoe Elementary Schools - Mary DeShazo and Richland Hills.

Parents should bring the child's birth certificate and a record of the child's immunization (shots), if available. The school nurses will be on duty and give immunizations, DPT, polio, smallpox and measles, if the child has not had these shots. A follow-up clinic to give booster shots will be held later in the summer or in early fall.

Fine Arts Boosters Set New Uniform Fund Drive

More Than \$10,000 Needed For Purchase 100-110 Uniforms To Be Bought; Campaign To Conclude In May

Plans were finalized Monday for the new uniform fund drive which began yesterday (Wednesday) under auspices of the Muleshoe Fine Arts Boosters. During the Monday night meeting in the choir room at Muleshoe High School, workers and chairmen were designated for the drive in which \$10,000-\$14,000 will be sought to purchase new uniforms for the Muleshoe Mighty 'M' Marching and Concert Bands.

Publicity Chairman for the drive, Mrs. Herbert Griffiths commented, "The Fine Arts Boosters of the Muleshoe Schools are conducting the fund drive in order to secure funds to purchase a complete set of new band uniforms."

"This is necessary as the present band uniform style was selected and purchased 10 years ago. A total of \$10,000-\$14,000 will be needed in order to purchase 100-110 complete uniforms and caps. Any funds left over at the end of the drive and when the new uniforms are purchased will be left in a permanent uniform fund."

Mrs. Griffiths added that the Fine Arts Boosters have accumulated \$2,500 through a dinner and other fund raising methods, but added the additional funds will be sought through a concentrated drive which will conclude at the end of May.

"A complete band uniform will cost an average of \$125

to \$175. The money collected in this drive will not be spent until there are sufficient funds to purchase a complete set of band uniforms," added Mrs. Griffiths, "and all uniforms will be for the Muleshoe bands."

Honeymoons Interrupted By Accident

Two young couples from Plainview were more than dismayed Saturday morning when they found the honeymoons they had planned for more than a year delayed once again. A trip to Vietnam for Johnny Fitch interrupted the planned honeymoon the first time, and a grinding two-car collision near Muleshoe interrupted the honeymoon the second time.

The accident occurred approximately 11 miles northeast of Muleshoe on Highway 70, involving the new auto driven by Johnny Fitch and an auto driven by a Muleshoe woman who was not injured.

Officers reported that the accident occurred around 10 a.m. Saturday near Nickles Gin on Highway 70 when the two cars involved attempted to avoid a crash with a pickup stopped to make a left turn onto a farm-to-market road, and collided with each other.

The pickup, from Muleshoe, was not directly involved in the accident.

Ambulances from Earth and Muleshoe were called to the accident site, and brought Mrs. Johnny Fitch and Mr. and Mrs. Roger Dale Rogers to West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe for treatment of their injuries.

Mrs. Fitch and Mrs. Rogers were in the back seat of the car and their husbands were in the front. Mrs. Fitch said they all had their seat belts fastened and none of the four people in the car were seriously injured, although the auto was heavily

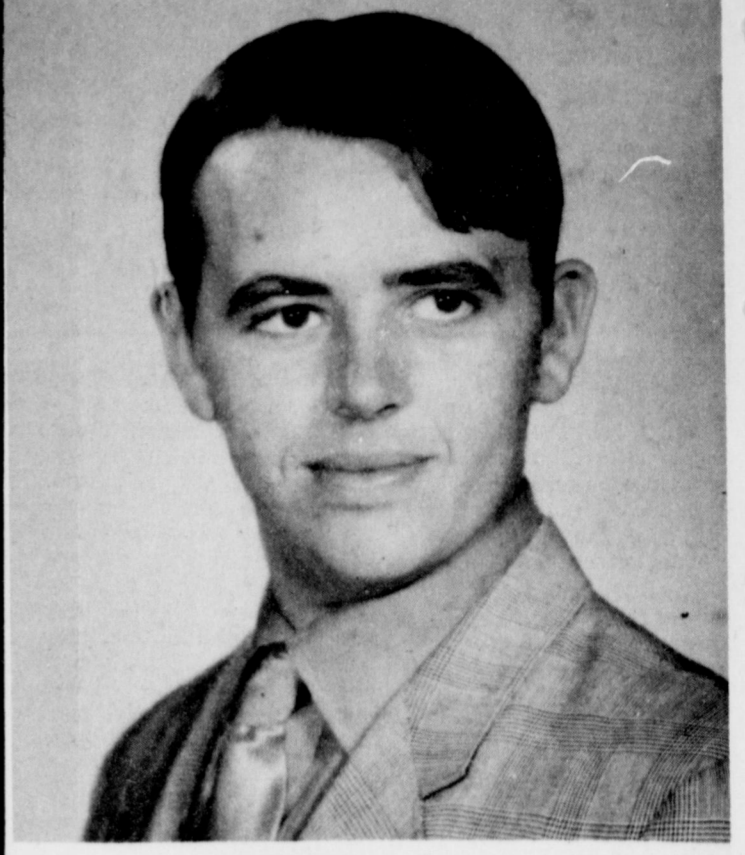

ing education, and spiritual well-being." These problems were reported for consideration at the Texas White House Conference on Aging to be held this spring.

From the state conference, recommendations will be made for the White House Conference to take place in November.

A more realistic and more comprehensive national policy for older Americans is the goal of the national conference, Miss Bell says.

A new national awareness of older people and their needs is important, according to Miss Bell, as the population of those 65 and over is increasing.

"The number of American senior citizens is growing at the rate of approximately 330,000 per year. And more than 70 percent of the 65-plus age group has joined the group within the previous ten years."

The same problems that threaten the twenty million Americans past 65 also loom for some 42,000,000 middle-aged Americans, Miss Bell says.

"These men and women, most at the peak of their family responsibility, careers, and earning power, must begin to think and plan for their later years in order to have happy, successful retirements."

The Muleshoe chapter of Beta Sigma Phi will celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the organization's founding in 1939. A banquet in which the one local chapter, founded in 1969, will join for the occasion will be held at the XIT Steakhouse Friday, April 30.

Forty years ago, the first chapter of the sorority was formed in Abilene, Kansas. There are now approximately 9,600 chapters and over 200,000 members in the United States, Canada and 24 foreign countries.

In addition to the banquet, traditional ceremonies will be

observed. The history of the local chapter will be reviewed and the new members will receive their first welcome to membership.

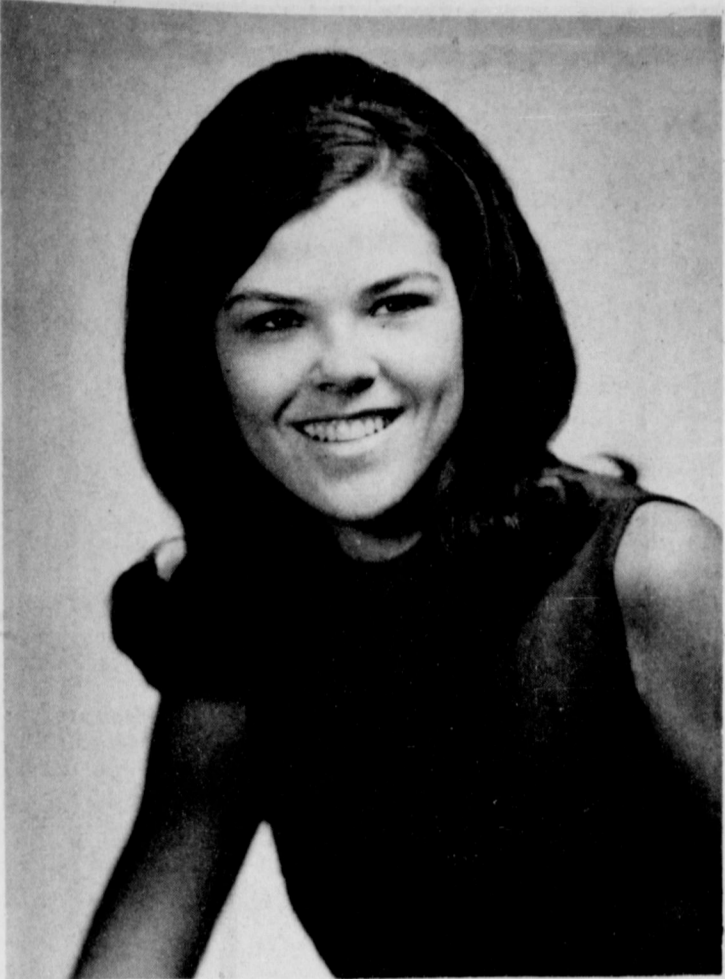

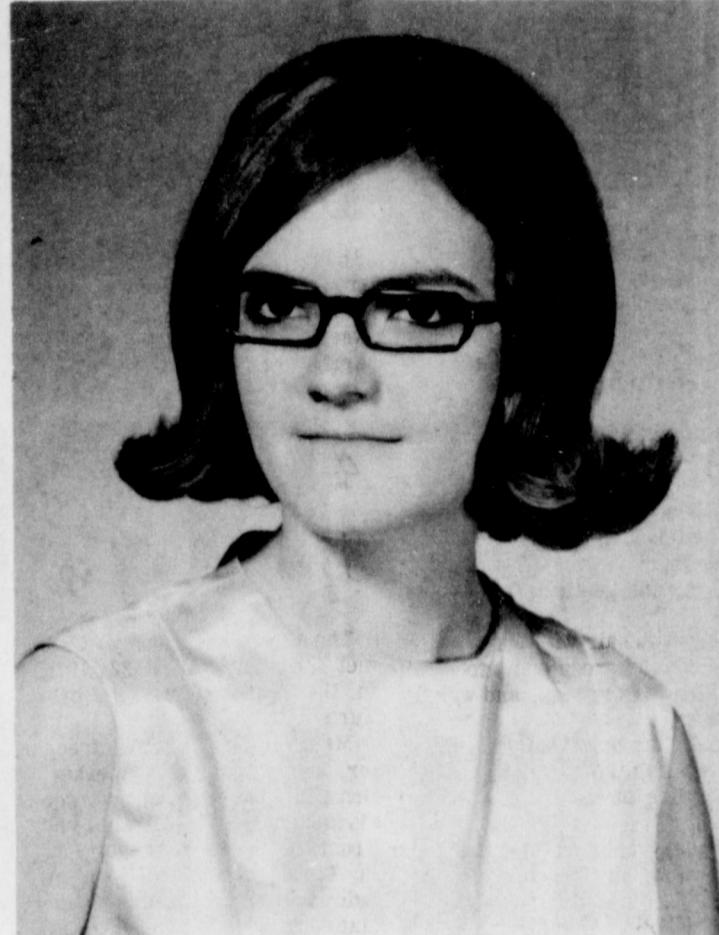

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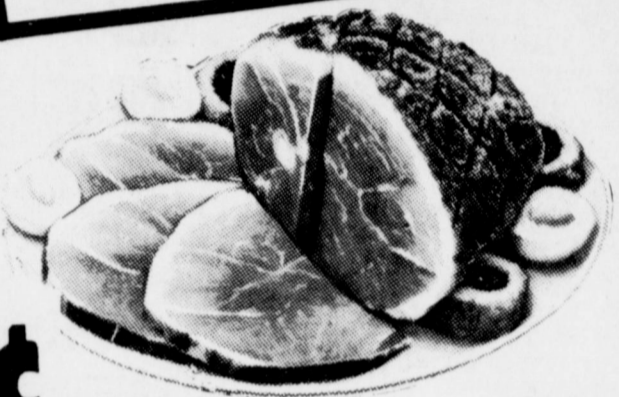
