Stock Law Election.

The following is the vote on the stock law election of the 21st, inst., as near as we are able to get it; Crockett box, for the law, 59, against, 206; Daniel box, for 4, against 16; Pleasant Grove box, for 16, against 22; Freeman box, for 9, against 15; Grapeland box, for 51, against 102.

As will be seen the law was defeated in every box. The vote is nothing like full; only five hundred votes being cast in all which stands, total for the law 139, against the law 361. The boxes not heard from stand about as the above.

In Memoriam

Of Mattie E. Meriwether, consort of Dr. L. Meriwether, of Grapeland, Houston County, Texas, and daughter of Dist. Clerk, W. A. Champion, resident of Crockett, Tex., and Mrs. Eliza Champion deceased.

Mrs Meriwether was born in Monroe county, Ga., February 7, 1862, hence was at death 30 years and one month old.

Her illness, which caused her to take her bed Feb. 22nd, was not thought to be serious, but gradually and steadily grew more intense, and in a few days developed a clear case of that dread and fatal disease, pneumonia, which gained the ascendancy of the best medical skill, and caused her death on the 1st day of March, 7:30 o'clock a. m. 1892.

When quite a child she came from her native state to Texas with her parents, and soon her parents became residents of Grapeland and vicinity, where she dwelt with them, a beautiful, sprightly, happy child, and fast developed into blushing womanhood, with many friends and admirers, and her fair hand was early sought by several who would woo to wed, but the fair hand was gained by Dr. F. Meriwether, and on the 15th day of January 1880, he led her to the sacred matrimonial altar and in the presence of many attending friends and relatives, they were by the writer, made happily one in wedlock.

Twelve years had elapsed of joyous wedlock, but death came suddenly and unexpectedly, and claimed the faithful dotting wife and mother. She had borne to her husband one child, a daughter who had grown to an age and size sufficient to be her constant comfort and care, little Ethel aged Eleven, who survives her a bright dotting child, the pride of her father. Early in childhood she was attached to the M. E. Church South, according to the vitals of that body of worshipers, but after marriage, in August 1883, publicly acknowledged the name and authority of Jesus, and was baptized into his body, and became identified with the body of disciples in Grapeland, of which congregation she was at death a faithful member.

Death! Cruel Monster! Thou hast triumphed over her mortal frame, and cruelly torn her loose from earth ties, but thou hast changed the pearl laced golden hinged gates of the brightest heaven to swing ajar, and swift winged angels have borne aloft another redeemed spirit, into the everlasting city of our God! Amen.

To the Farmers and Producers of the State of Texas:

GENTLEMEN: In my letter of January 15, 1892, to C. G. Caldwell, Esq., Secretary of the Farmers' Alliance of the Tenth Congressional District, in relation to agricultural exhibits for this Department, how to ship them, and the cost of transportation, etc., I stated that I had addressed a letter to the railway and express companies of the State, to ascertain if they would bring such exhibits free of charge to this office, as no appropriation had been made to pay for their transportation.

The following companies have agreed to bring your exhibits free of charge to this Department, viz: The International and Great Northern, the St. Louis Southwestern, and the Houston, East and West Texas.

I am very much disappointed in the refusal of the other companies addressed to comply with my request to bring the exhibits free of charge. Had all consented, the cases and glass jars for the purpose would soon be filled with specimens of the products of the State.

I confidently believe that the Twenty-Third Legislature, which will be held in January 1893, will make an appropriation to pay for the transportation of such exhibits. And I hope that each farmer and producer, who has an exhibit, will find some way to send it here, so that a collection of the wonderful productions of the State may be placed for permanent exhibition.

The farmers and producers, who live within reach of the International and Great Northern Railroad, will please notify me when and where they will deposit their exhibit, so that all may be ready for shipment on a given date; as this is the condition upon which they will be delivered to this Department free of charge.

But, until the next regular session of the Legislature, I most earnestly invite the co-operation and aid of all the citizens of the State, who take pride in showing what imperial Texas can do in the production of food and supplies for all who dwell within her borders and breathe her health-giving breezes.

Please send agricultural exhibits of the products of the State, such as cotton, corn, wheat, oats, etc., and also sweet potatoes, sugar cane, sugar, syrup, fruits and vegetables.
