HOUSTON COUNTY DEMOCRACY

Turn Out And Express Their Preferences for County Officers.

THE ELECTION, THOUGH QUIET, IS EARNEST AND FULL OF INTEREST.

Democracy Militant and Triumphant—Third Party on the Run and in November will be in The Soup.

Bayne for Representative, Aldrich for County Judge, Stokes for Assessor, Sheridan for Collector, Duren for County Attorney, Ellis for Treasurer, Dunnam for County Clerk, Champion for District Clerk, Daniel for Sheriff, Broxson for County Surveyor, Smith for Public Weigher.

Last Monday was the day for the democrats to make their nominations for county officers. There had been so much talk about the third party strength and the inroads they were making on the following of democracy that democrats dreaded to hear the returns, fearing that the returns would show a serious defection from party lines. But, considering the fact that the campaign has been one exceptionally quiet and friendly, with no exciting issues, the vote is a large one and a pledge to the democracy that the party will be triumphant in November.

Third party enthusiasts have been dining into the ears of democrats that the third party would sweep the county in November. Taking the vote on Monday as a basis and the further fact that fully three hundred democrats remained away from the polls, it is not an extravagant estimate to fix the vote in November for the democratic ticket at not less than nineteen hundred. This would give the third party not exceeding three hundred white votes and we doubt very much if they get that number. Granting that every colored voter in the county joins with them, a concession not warranted by the probable facts, they would still fall far short of electing their ticket. At only one box does the primary vote show any serious falling off and we have every reason to believe that there are fully one hundred white voters at that box who did not participate in the primary and yet in November will vote the democratic ticket. There are fully fifty democratic votes in the Crockett precinct who didn't turn out to the election on Monday and some sixty to seventy-five in the Augusta precinct. The same is true of every box in the county. Every one of these democrats must be got to the polls in November. The full party strength to a man must be cast and every democrat is interested in seeing that every other democrat goes to the polls and casts his vote for the ticket straight from president to constable. This done there is not a doubt that the third party and its republican allies, if there be any, will be defeated all the way from five hundred to a thousand majority.

Houston County Resources.

Professor Kennedy of the Geological Survey who spent several weeks exploring Houston county last year has issued his report from which we take the following extracts on the lignite, iron and marble deposits of this county. LIGNITES. In Houston county the lignite deposits lying in the southeastern portion of the county as well as the deposit at Hytes Bluff on the Trinity river were also examined. From outcrops along the various streams, as well as the records of the different wells obtainable throughout the southeastern coal field covers an area of about fourteen square miles and the lignite deposit is from four to six feet thick. This field is extensively developed in Trinity county where it is reported to cover a much greater area and to reach a thickness of ten feet. At Hytes Bluff on the Trinity river, the section of the bluff shows two deposits of lignite, an upper and a lower. The upper deposit is about two feet thick and the lower nearly four feet. These deposits are exposed for nearly a quarter of a mile along the face of the bluff. Several deposits of lignites were also seen at other places throughout the area surveyed, but these were generally small and unimportant. IRON ORES. The main deposits of iron ore passed over, with the exception of those in Houston county, have already been described in the various reports of the Survey. The ore of Houston county belong to three classes, first, Conglomerate ore; second, laminated ore, and third, Carbonate or clay ironstone. The last of these three classes form the most important iron ores found in the county although the conglomerates are very extensively deposited throughout the central portion of the northern portion of the county. A comparatively small deposit of laminated ore occurs in the northeastern portion of the county in the neighborhood of Robbin's Ferry on the Neches river. Full details of these ore fields will be found in the report on Houston county. GREEN SAND MARLS. Extensive deposits of these marls occur in Cherokee county and throughout the northern portion of Houston county. They occur generally in the form of a bluish green shelly marl and brown marly sand, and are exposed in most of the deep cuttings from Crockett northwesterly to beyond Alto and northerly from this line into Anderson and Smith counties. Numerous sections of these beds have been obtained and will be given later. Such analyses as have been made of the Houston county beds show them to carry from 3 to 4.57 per cent of potash, over one per cent of soda, and a little over 0.1 per cent of phosphoric acid. These marls have been used by some of the farmers of the section with good results. The yellow indurated fossiliferous marls have been used in the manufacture of lime, but although suitable for agricultural purposes they were unsuitable for building operations.

GRAPELAND. July 25, 1892. CROCKETT COURIER: The weather is still dry and hot. The cotton crop is being badly damaged and unless it rains very soon will be cut off very considerably. Mr. Job Johnson, a young farmer living near here was accidentally killed last Friday. He was cleaning out an old well when it suddenly caved in upon him covering him up with about eight feet of dirt, which killed him instantly. He leaves a wife and several little children to mourn his untimely loss. Miss Carrie Meriwether, of Austin, arrived last Wednesday on a visit to relatives. Mr. Myer, of Arkansas, a Baptist preacher and school teacher, was in our town last week prospecting. He expressed himself as well pleased with this county. Mr. J. M. Selkirk gave the young folks a party at his residence last Saturday night. There was a nice social hop at Mr. Sam Davis' residence this last week. Mr. Geo. E. Darsey's new residence is rapidly nearing completion and will be an ornament to the town. Health here is still good. KEYSTONE.
