LETTER FROM AUSTIN. What the Legislature is doing—Events of the Past Week at the Capital.

Austin, April 30.—We are still here, don't know when we will get away. The following are a few of the bills which passed both Houses and have been signed by the Governor.

House Bill authorizing counties to levy tax to pay for any land devoted to the state. This bill covers the case of the deed to the state for the land upon which the South Western Lunatic Asylum is situated.

Senate Bill providing for the prorata payment of new counties' share of debts of old counties from which they are created.

Senate Bill prohibiting hunting in pastures without owners' or agents' consent and fixing penalties.

Senate Bill amending the general corporation law so as to conform to the Governor's objections to the original bill.

House Bill appropriating \$20,000 each for two years for five stock sanitary commissions. This bill provides for the appointment of four commissioners to be appointed by the governor.

Senate Bill increasing the amount of stock certain corporations may be allowed to issue.

House Bill providing for special judges in criminal and civil cases when the county judge is disqualified.

Senate Bill determining the rights of non-residents or unknown persons to property in Texas.

Senate Bill authorizing the penitentiary board to purchase agricultural lands for working convicts on state farms.

House Bill authorizing the state treasurer to pay to the county treasurer of any county any excess of subsidy taxes paid by such counties.

Senate Bill authorizing the governor to have the assistance of two citizens for 100 days during the year in the matter of pardons. There is now in the Governor's office many applications for pardon.

Senate bill to promote the mining interest in Texas.

Bill authorizing the court of civil appeals to certify certain legal questions to the supreme court for decision.

The House defeated the senate bill creating a normal school at Denton, Texas, as we have room for 300 students at Huntsville Normal School.

The appropriation bill has passed the House, and will go to the Senate. Likely a conference committee will be called for so that the difference may be adjusted between the two houses.

Fought Between Revolutionists and the Government, With 800 Killed.

**MINNESOTA WATERPOUT BURSTS IN OHIO.**  
Chicagoans Want to Buy the Jeff Davis Mansion, But It is Not for Sale at Any Price—A Number of Slaves Drowned.

**VALPARAISO, Chile, May 2.**—News of the bloodiest battle fought since the revolution began in Rio Grande do Sul has reached here. The engagement was fought near San Luis. Gen. Tallos led the government forces; Gen. Taveres commanded the revolutionists. It is reported that nearly 800 were killed, including nearly equally between the two armies. A victory is claimed for each side.

S. Banks and wife, Mr. Peayhouse and little daughter, 5-year-old child of J. W. Stover, 5-weeks old child of John O'Connor, Jr., E. W. Shroder and a little girl of the Chickasaw nation. Injured: Mrs. Maddix, Albert Symcox, C. S. Haswell, Mrs. John Snyder and two children, Albert Holmark, W. C. Butt and family, County Commissioner Daniel, Wm. Sanders and family, F. J. Hugh's little child, Mrs. John O'Connor, Jr., John Stover and family, Mrs. Children, R. H. Jennings and wife, Mr. Calvert, Mr. Campbell, Pat O'Malley, Henry Maroney, George O'Connor, Larson Banks, Elmer Banks, Oscar Blake, and Harry, fatally Mrs. Maggie Gilmore, near Gilmore. The bodies of twelve of the victims, including the O'Connor family, were taken to Perceol yesterday for interment in the Catholic cemetery.

At a meeting of the citizens Wednesday night \$2500 was raised. Clothing and provisions are being sent out and the wounded cared for.

**Report Detailed.**

**Killed and Injured.**

CHICAGO, Ill., May 1.—Christopher Columbus' ashes were stolen Friday night about 10 o'clock from the sacred convent of La Rabida at Jackson park, where they were deposited in a glass urn, strongly bound with gold. The thief was discovered, however, by the janitor as he was inspecting the ashes to make sure that he had made no mistake. He was at once seized and in the struggle dropped the urn and breaking loose made his escape.

**Dead Buried.**  
GUTHRIE, Ok., April 29.—The facts as to the cyclone's awful havoc received about as given yesterday night, although the details grow hourly more heart-rending. About forty of the victims were buried yesterday and the best care and attention is being given the injured. The people of the territory have already raised a fund of nearly \$2000 for the sufferers and more will follow.

**Famine in Colombia.**  
PANAMA, May 1.—The government continues with unabated effort to combat the terrible famine that has for some time past been raging throughout the Cauca valley, the horrors of which were recently augmented by an eruption of the Sotara volcano and the consequent damming up of the three principal rivers of the district.

**Water Spout.**  
SPRINGFIELD, O., May 2.—At noon yesterday an immense water spout burst over Tremont City, near here. Within eighteen minutes water flooded the town, carrying away outbuildings and stables and flooding the first story of residences. No person is reported killed or drowned, but there is heavy loss of stock.

**The Jeff Davis Home.**  
RICHMOND, Va., May 2.—Mrs. Ellison, chairman of the relic committee of the Confederate Memorial association, received a letter from Chicago offering to purchase the Jefferson Davis mansion for removal to that city; said that no price could be offered that would induce consideration of any such proposition.

**Pat Error.**  
GUTHRIE, Ok., May 2.—Isaham Goody, a farmer living fifteen miles west of here, tools what he supposed was a dose of quinine for the chills, on Saturday, but died in great agony a few hours afterward. A post-mortem has revealed the fact that he took arsenic by mistake for quinine.

**For Free Colours.**  
ODEN, Utah, April 28.—In the trans-Mississippi congress yesterday afternoon a vote was taken on the free coinage of silver; resolution. The resolution was passed unanimously.

**Slaves Drowned.**  
LONDON, May 2.—A dispatch from Zanzibar brings news of the drowning of 125 slaves by the capsizing of an Arab dhow in which the captives were being conveyed south of Madagascar.

## MISS GOVE'S BUTTERFLY.

It came to Whittier's Summer House the day After His Death.  
"Did you ever hear of a pet butterfly?" asked a woman the other day.  
"No; why did you?"  
"Yes, and I will tell you about it. You know for several summers past, previous to his death, John G. Whittier passed the season at Hampton Falls, N. H., at the old Gove homestead. The only member of the old name left there is Miss Abby Gove, to whom Whittier was greatly attached. But on the next day, when the window was open, the little guest came back. Twice afterward it was put out of doors but it invariably returned. Miss Gove then took a plate and one of the old fashioned wire screens, such as are associated with the mind of a Quakeress, and on the farmer's dinner table, and taking the butterfly, she put it on the plate, covering it with the screen. It seemed contented and happy. For some reason, it is its own bought a boy cup in which she mixed honey and water, and the tiny insect evidently approved. A new cage, like that used to house canary birds, was bought and around it a piece of fine netting placed. This is the butterfly's permanent home now. It has learned to know and to fond of Miss Gove. When she opens the door of the cage the insect flies away, seemingly much perturbed, but when the stranger withdraws it returns to her hand, resuming its happy purr. Its misdeeds are always foodstuffs. Its method of absorbing its food is this: The cup of honey and water, being held in the hand of Miss Gove, the butterfly lights on her finger and runs out a needle-like proboscis an inch and a half long, the tip of which it curls, curling it around on the surface of the substance; then it thrusts, with quick strokes, the end of this natural tube into its mouth. When it has eaten its fill, the proboscis is drawn in, and it is then the purring is loudest. I saw it eating a meal the other day and it was a curious sight, but to hear the sound of comfort it purred forth afterward was to me more wonderful. **To Suppress Fortune Telling.**  
The "mediums," astrologers, fortune tellers, mind readers and people of that class in Illinois are in a state of mind about the Meyers bill now pending before the Illinois legislature. It has been favorably reported by the judiciary committee, and seems likely to become a law. It declares that every person who shall for hire or reward "engage in the practice of fortune telling, the foretelling of future events, the discovery of lost property, or of lost or unknown titles to property, or of evidence of any facts or circumstances intended to be used in the determination of any suits at law or equity, or of any question of pending or contemplated by any person, or who shall assume for like consideration to inform another of their future affairs in this life in respect of birth, death, marriage, divorce or other thing, by means of astrology, clairvoyance, divination, spiritualism, palmistry, trance-mediumship, the black art, magic or by means of any other alleged or pretended supernatural, or whether by soul or power, etc., shall be deemed a common swindler," and be punished by a fine of from \$25 to \$100 for each offense. 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
