





## Insect Activity Remaining Static

Greenbug infestations are generally light in South Plains grain sorghum compared to previous years. Surveys conducted during the past two months indicate that the insect situation in Bailey County is similar to surrounding counties, says Don Rummel, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Many producers have already treated their grain sorghum for corn leaf aphid control and have destroyed greenbugs at the same time. However, greenbug populations have remained low in most untreated fields, reports the entomologist.

Parasitic wasp activity has increased greatly during the past week. During the past three years these tiny beneficial insects have usually destroyed the greenbug population by mid-August. In fields where greenbugs have not reached damaging levels, parasitic wasps may reduce the population soon enough so that no chemical control will be necessary.

Therefore, producers should check their fields carefully before spraying to insure that control is really necessary, Rummel advises. Control will not be necessary in many fields if parasite activity continues to increase.

Light infestations of Bank's grass mites have also been detected in some fields of grain sorghum in Bailey and surrounding counties. In all fields surveyed, mite infestations have been light and did not warrant control. Due to the difficulty usually encountered in controlling these mites, producers are cautioned to avoid treating light mite infestations. Populations often build rapidly after insecticides have been used and beneficial insects have been destroyed.

Periods of hot, dry weather commonly favor rapid development of mite populations while population growth usually stops during periods of cool, rainy weather, explains the entomologist. In the past mite infestations have usually increased most rapidly during last August. Heaviest populations have been observed on more mature sorghum.

Research data indicates that grain sorghum in the hard dough stage suffers little yield reduction from mite infestations. However, heavy infestations during the soft dough stage or on younger grain sorghum may cause serious yield reductions. Observations indicate that infestations sufficient to cause the death of more than two normal sized leaves should be controlled if the sorghum has not reached the hard dough stage.

Rummel believes that the widespread and often excessive use of insecticides for greenbug control is largely responsible

for increases in mite problems. In addition to controlling greenbugs, such practices have destroyed beneficial insects which normally hold mites in check. Also, mite populations in several localized areas in 1970 showed evidence of developing resistance to most of the insecticides now used on grain sorghum.

### Policy Changes For Vaccination At Texas Tech

LUBBOCK--Texas Tech University officials announced Friday (July 23) that new legislation requiring specific immunizations for students will mean a change in policy at the University.

It has been the policy at Texas Tech to require immunization against polio, tetanus, and smallpox. The new legislation adds diphtheria to the list for students enrolling in institutions of higher learning.

Students enrolling for the fall semester will be allowed to enter with the provision that immunizations are begun before Jan. 1, 1972, and all are completed as soon after that date as medically feasible.

Effective with the spring 1972 semester, and continuing thereafter, new enrollees (those not previously enrolled in the summer or fall 1971 semesters) who have not completed the required immunizations at time of enrollment must complete them as soon as is medically feasible.

Students in institutions of high education must have had a minimum of three injections of diphtheria and tetanus with the last dose within 10 years and one smallpox vaccination within the past 10 years. At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required for students who have not reached their nineteenth birthday.

Recommended implementation procedures and an outline of current regulations were recently provided to the State's colleges and universities by the Texas State Department of Health and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

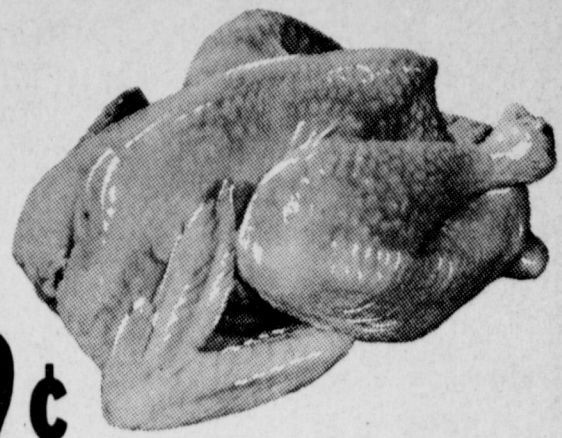
