School Enrollment Up On Second Day

Superintendent Neal B. Dillman, of the Muleshoe Independent School System, said enrollment figures denote a gain of 74 students on the second day of the 1971-72 school year over figures on the second day of last year.

In Muleshoe High School, a total of 561 students have registered, for a gain of 15 students. This is broken down to seniors, 114; juniors, 143; sophomores, 134 and freshmen, 170.

Muleshoe Junior High School lost 15 students and presently have an enrollment of 456. There are 146 in the eighth grade; 154 in the seventh and 156 in the sixth.

Mary DeShazo Elementary School shows a gain of 39 students and has an enrollment of 456. The breakdown shows, fifth, 164; fourth, 173 and third, 147.

At Richland Hills Primary School, 432 students are enrolled for a gain of 39 students. There are 171 in second grade; 193 in first grade and

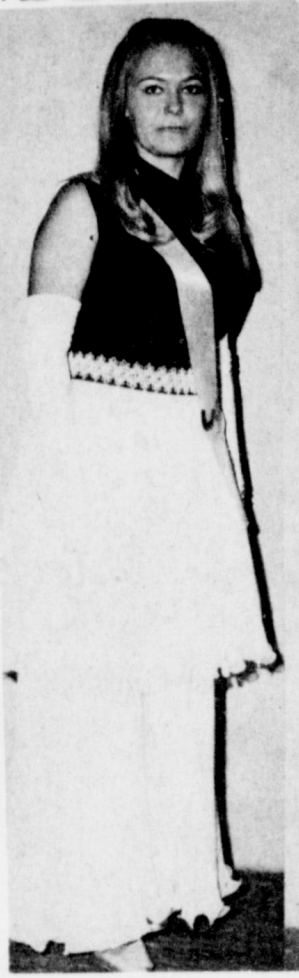

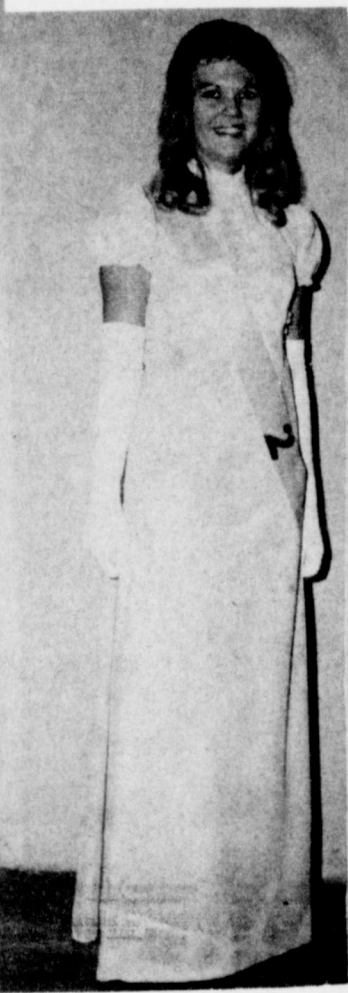

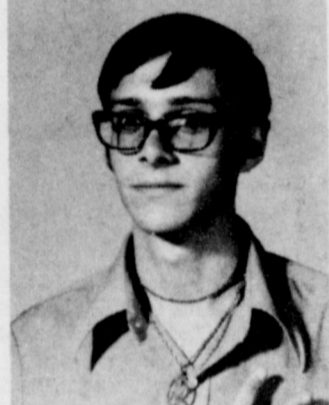
Elementary P-TA Meets Tuesday

Wedding Policy

The Muleshoe and Bailey County Journals will hereafter print wedding stories and pictures under the following guidelines:

1. Newspaper reproduction is best with black and white photographs which have good contrast. Color prints often do not have enough contrast to reproduce well and are slower to have developed and must be done by professional studios. Those taking pictures at the wedding should have at least one black and white picture taken of the bride before the altar, to be ready immediately following the ceremony, to be submitted with the wedding story.

2. Photos and stories must be in the office by noon Monday for the Thursday Muleshoe Journal and noon Thursday for the Sunday Bailey County Journal.

3. Story with picture must be presented by deadline for publication in issue no later than two weeks following the ceremony.

4. Stories without photos will be printed if received in time for publication within the same two weeks deadline.

5. All information will be printed as desired and as space allows with the exception of out-of-town guests. The immediate family of the bride couple will be printed as out-of-town guests, as space allows. If serving in some capacity at the wedding, names will not be repeated in the guest list.

6. Information preferably should be typed, either on a form provided by the paper, or in story form, in which case it should be double spaced, on one side of the paper only. The paper will not be responsible for misspelled names taken from handwritten stories or forms.

7. Photos are returnable following publication and appropriate arrangements should be made with the Society Reporter.

8. When announcing engagements, the Journal's wedding form may be obtained from the Society Reporter. The staff is available to assist brides-to-be and her family.

9. As with all copy, the Journal reserved the right to edit all stories to fit newspaper standards and policies.

10. Any society story received after deadlines will be subject to further editing or publication in later issues.

Defoliation Is Advised In Wet Areas

COLLEGE STATION--Cotton producers in many areas of the state may want to consider the use of a defoliant on their crop this year due to recent wet weather and prospects for more of the same.

"A true defoliant may be the answer this year for a more efficient cotton harvest," points out Fred Elliott, cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "This material will cause the plants to shed their leaves, thus exposing the green bolls to light and air so that they will mature and open at a faster rate."

Defoliants are used with picker harvesting while desiccants are used with cotton strippers.

Defoliants are chlorate and organo-phosphorus types. One such product is DEF. These materials should be applied when about 60 percent of the bolls are open, advises Elliott. If any green leaves are left on the cotton after the green bolls open, a light application of arsenic acid can be made to kill the remaining leaves. Desiccants should be applied when 75 percent of the bolls are open.

Use of a defoliant will increase harvest efficiency, adds the specialist. At present, Texas is one of the leading states in harvest efficiency with a loss of only 9 percent. However, producers should continue to strive to cut losses because this means more cotton going to the gin and more profit.

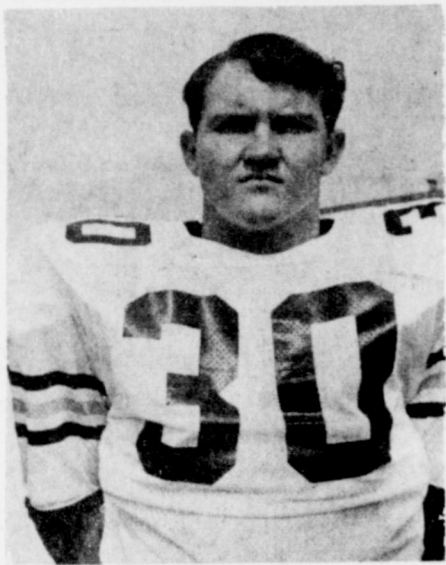
Elliott also encourages producers to add an insecticide to the defoliant where boll weevil infestations are present in fields. This will keep weevils from entering the diapause stage in which they overwinter and will thereby reduce the boll weevil problem next year. One pint of Guthion per acre added to the defoliant is effective. The specialist urges that this practice be a cooperative effort among producers in a community or area to increase its overall effectiveness.

Good News Out For Hunters Of Doves; DDT

The Fish and Wildlife Service is finding low levels of DDT and other organochlorine chemicals such as dieldrin, heptachlor epoxide, mirex, and Research Center near Laodoves. Samples of doves shot last year in Eastern States have been analyzed by the Service's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center near Laurel, Md.

DDT residues were only 1.4 percent of the amounts permitted in raw edible portions by Federal regulations. Legal limits of DDT in beef, established on a fat basis, are set at 7 ppm; concentrations of DDT in the fat of dove muscle

averaged 6.2 ppm. Because of the small amount of fat in dove muscle, 28 pounds of dove meat would have to be eaten to obtain an amount of DDT equal to the quantity permitted in one pound of hamburger.
