tion bales; in 1890 when the price was 9 cents per pound, the crop was eight million and seven hundred thousand bales. By a study of the statistics for a period of thirty years past it will be seen that the price of cotton per pound fluctuates inversely with the yield. A large yield is followed by a low price; a small yield by a high price. These are facts that will not be denied by any one except a populist agitator and office-seeker. Even those know them to be true. Just now, however, a lie serves them better than the truth and for that reason they will have none of it.

MORE ABOUT THE PRICE OF COTTON.

It is very common talk these days on the part of the populists and not a few democrats that the low price of agricultural staples is due to a contraction of currency and to the fact, as they allege, that the supply of money is limited and inadequate. Say the populists: "Put us in power and we will double or treble the volume of money and the prices of agricultural staples will advance."

DEMOCRATS INDORSED. Milan County Negro Republicans in Favor of Law and Order.

Cameron, Texas, Sept. 23.—The republican county convention was called to order yesterday by George Sledge, colored, George Sledge was elected permanent chairman, D. B. Whereas, the republican party in convention assembled in the city of Dallas declared in its wisdom that it would in no instance fuse with the so-called populist party; and Whereas, it is inexpedient and impracticable for the republicans of Milan county to place in the field a straight republican ticket; and Whereas, We are in favor of law and order and the maintenance of good government; therefore be it Resolved, That we, the republicans of Milan county in convention assembled, do indorse the democratic county ticket and pledge ourselves to its support. M. S. Prove, a prominent member of the opposition, moved to make the adoption of the resolution unanimous, which was done with a shout of wildest enthusiasm.
