Alfalfa Growers Should Watch **Parasitic Weed**

Dodder, a parasitic weed, can cause serious troble for alfalfa unless it is controlled. The weeds shows up as a straw colzger, said Extension Service shoe. area agronomist.

J.K. Adams, Bailey County agent, said he had noticed some dodder along road rightsrancher had contacted him for identification of the weed.

"Dodder is a parasite, and must live on a host plant to Ross Feagley, fullback, and long. The seedlings rotate slowasite twines around the host and sends suckers into it.

"The seedling in direct conexpense of the host plant," the reach a host plant, the seedling will die.

After becoming attached to the alfalfa or other host, the dodder produces many stems in a tangled mass and grows as much as three inches per day. A single plant may spread ten feet or more in a year.

"This bargain seed can be extremely costly in terms of penses," he emphasizes.

much he charged. Hutton said filing a claim is easy. Tear out the blank Form 1490 from your Medicare Handbook. On the form show your name and claim number just as it is on your Medicare card. When you write in what your condition is, don't try to say it like the doctor. If you have heart trouble and that's what the doctor treated you for, simply show 'heart trouble'. If you were treated for arthritis, show that. Don't forget to sign the form before you drop it in the mail. If you don't have a Medicare Handbook or a blank, your social security and help you file your claim. Your question can probably be handled by phone, so if you need help phone first. It might save you a trip and a lot of time. The number of your social sec-

urity office is 747-3711. After the blank is filled in, where do you send it? This is also in the Medicare Handbook. As a rule, you send claims for payment to the state in which you were treated. If all your treatment was in Texas, for example, you would send your doctor bills to: Medicare- Part B, P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Texas 75222.



Plan Submitted To Gov. Smith

AUSTIN -- An updated fiveyear plan for improving criminal justice in the 15-county area served by South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock, has been received by Governor Prestion Smith's Criminal Justice Council.

The regional plan, covering 1972 to 1976, and similar documents from the state's other 23 planning regions will provide input for an updated statewide criminal justice plan to be issued later this year.

Included in the prospectus is a survey of the resources and needs of the entire region, which is made up of the counties of Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.

For 1972 the plan projects a need for \$1,655,000 in CJC funding. Largest amount, \$200, 000, will be needed for continuing operation of the comprehen-
