

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




NOT SO BAD AS WAS AT FIRST THOUGHT TO BE.

Great Damage, However, Has Been Done to Property at Various Points--Snow and Rain Falling Will Add to the Volume of Water Yet to Come.

Cincinnati, Ohio, April 22.-There has been more alarm throughout the Ohio valley today on account of the floods than at any period since February, 1884; when the Ohio river reached its highest stage of 71 feet and 9 inches in this city. Most of the inhabitants of the valley spent the night in anticivalley, as they will not know until tomorrow that the water has been falling at Pittsburg. Until this news reached the river men here, it was feared that the record of 1884 might lieved that the river will not exceed the floods of February, 1897, and of March, 1898, when it reached 61 feet at Cincinnati. #### suit of Great Importance. Austin, Ap.11 22 .- In the supreme court Saturday Amasa B. Chappell of Travis county, through his attorneys, L. D. Brooks of Austin and Watts & Aldridge of Dallas, filed a petition for a writ of mandamus to compel Commissioner of the General Land Office Rogan to recognize his right to acquire and purchase section 282 in Jefferson county, located and surveyed by virtue of certificate No. 325, issued to the Texas and New Orleans railroad com-

pany. Said section was examined and classified and placed on the market at \$1 per acre as grazing land before January 1, 1895. It was applied for by J. E. Sparks as an actual settler on October 19, 1895, and awarded to him on October 23, 1895. #### Another Big Well Deal.

Beaumont, Texas, April 22 .-- To cap the climax of the busiest week that has ever been experienced in a Texas city or town, one of the biggest transactions that has yet been made in the Beaumont oil field was closed at 6 o'clock Saturday evening. Dewey Heywood and W. C. Tyrrall, two of the owners of the Heywood well, which came in Thursday afternoon, bought a well that is being put down by Kiser & Kelly, two operators from Parkersburg, W. Va., paying cash \$125,000 for the property. The purchase embraces 810 feet of a very promising well, and the thirty-acre tract of land upon as struck by the drillers and by Saturday night a spurting and spouting mud gusher developed, so strong was the gas pressure. As soon as the first pocket of gas was reached Friday morning, Dewey Heywood became apprised of it and he determined upon the purchase of the well for himself and associates. With that object in view he approached the owners, and the price was agreed upon, the purchasers to put up \$5000 earnest money to hold the deal forty-eight hours, at the expiration of which time the \$125,-000 was to be paid over or the \$5000 forfeited. # SPINDLE TOP IS IN.

WELL NO. 7 WILL BE PERMITTED TO SPOUT NEXT SUNDAY.

It Is a Six-Inch Hole into the Underground Lake Of Oil, But Was Promptly Capped--Located Near the Lucas Wonder at Beaumout.

Beaumont, Texas, April 23 .- The well of the Spindle Top Oil company was finished yesterday about 2 o'clock. Although it was the most perfectly finpipe was removed, and save for a few barrels of oil lost, there was no spouting and wasting of oil. The pipes were removed carefully and though the oil followed in goodly quantities, the valve was closed promptly and the flow shut off before it began. The wellis a splendid piece of work, and was drilled by J. B. Diffey. It is located on lots 30, 31 and 32 of Spindle Top Heights subdivision of John A. Veatch league, 250 feet distance in a northeasterly direction from the Lucas gusher and between the Lucas and the Heywood wells. The depth is given at 950 feet. The six-inch pipe extends clear through to the oil-bearing sand,

a magnificent stream six inches in the Lucas and other wells, it was not of any importance that the oil should be found here. Indeed, the hole would have been far more significant had it been dry than as it is.

The land upon which the well is located belongs to the Ward-Keith Oil and, Fuel company and is leased by the Spindle Top Oil company. The Spindle Top Oil company is another concern organized by D. R. Beatty. The firm is composed largely of Fort Worth capitalists, who were induced by Mr. Beatty come into the organization. The capital stock of this company is \$600,-000, and there is none of it for sale, which it is located. Friday morning though \$3 has been bid for it. J. B. Collins of Fort Worth is president, J. C. Phelan of Corsicana secretary and treasurer, D. R. Beatty is manager and the directors, besides those named above, are D. B. Henderson of Galveston, A. Templeton of Corsicana, and Colonel Hunter, Fort Worth. The Spindle Top company owns leases on ninety acres in the J. W. Bullock league near where the gas well was struck last Friday night and the lease on the tract where this well is covers fifteen acres, and other wells will be put down. Mr. Beatty said today that the spouting ability of this well would be tested some time during the present week, and it would be turned loose next Sunday for the benefit of the excursionists, which are due to come here from all over the country. Mr. Beatty believes in spouting the wells, and the crowd can depend on him showing the gushers to advantage.

I am undecided as to my future plans. I believe the federals will be strong agents in the pacification of the archipelago."



Early last evening the weather bureau announced heavy snows and rains along the Ohio valley, especially in Southern Ohio.
