worst that was ever known so late in worst that was ever known so late in
the spring. The firet week in April, 1886, the river reached 55 teet 9 tnches In this city and that was the highest
Water ever known so late in the Water ever known so late in the spring There have been no floods in the
Ohlo valley slice March, 189s, and Ohlo valley slnce March, 1898, and
these floods have rarely occurred as late as March, usually in February.
The flood will do much more damage The flood will do much more damage

rea;ied at all upper atations and that it frould be reached in Cinclanati today noon. The stage was 44 fet 7.16
at 6 o'clock last evening and the danger ilpe is 50 feet.
At Polnt Pleasage the stage is elght river ristag rapidily and a heavy raln. The mayor of Portemouth, Ohlo, telegraphed that the danger line had been reached there and a heavy snow was callyg. Similar reports have been reove Southern ohlo and as far north as Springfield. Owing to the general demoralization of telegraph and telephone wires it is dimicult to obtain any particulars.
