## NICARAGUA CANAL

Likely to Occupy Much Time in the Near Future in CongressPresent Status.

Washington, D. C., December -Nicaraguan canal legislation is likely to occupy the attention of both houses of congress to a large degree before the bolidays, commencung next week in the senate and as soon as the committees ar appointed in the house. It woul seem hasithe ion and tion, herilation, dekate and discu sion of this subject are about $t$ crystall The action. The present status of the Ishing an project may be briefly stated thus:
The Isthmian canal committee has recommended the constructio of an inter-oceanic canal via the Nicaraguan route, the cost of which is estimated, in round numbers, at $\$ 190,000,000$. Valid and sufficient reasons are set forth why the Nicaraguan route is preferable to the acquisition of the unfinished Panama canal. In anticipation of such a report, the exteative branch of the government has negotiated a treaty with Great Bri tain, in which some alleged bars in the way of this government undertaking the work alone are removed and certain requirements fixed by the senate last year are met. This treety. was laid before the senate in executive session yesterday, and was made publicto-day. It supersedes the much discoused ClaytonBulwer treaty. It obviates the sequiescence of any foreign power in the sole ownership of the canal by the United States. It does not probibit the canal being fortitied; provides for the policing of the canal by this government, and provides that the creaty can not be affected by possible change of sorereignty of the country through ereignty of the country through legislative step will be the ratification of the tresty by the senate. In, the meantime the state de partment is dealing with the Central American States of Nicaragua and Costa Rica for the lease to the Urited States of the territory through which the canal is to pass. The isthmian canm conamittee ree ommended the "uquisition of a
strip of land to miles wide the
whole length of the route of th canal. The two Central Ameri can States have already signed
protocols agreeing to make the protocols agreeing to make the necessary treaty, and it is expected it will be submitted to the senate before the close of this session While the treaty making power are at work upon this branch of the subject another legislative step will be taken. A bill will pass the house and come to the senate authorizing the president to direct the secretary of war to commence the canal and making the neces sary appropriation therefor. Mr Hepburn of Iowa, prospective chairman of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee, wil offer the bill, which will in the main follow the terms of the bill that passed the house last session A bill of similar import will be of fered in the senate and considered in committee.
Meanwhile the friends of the sthmian canal project are now watching for the next move of the nemies of the canal, who are the transcontinental railroads that are alhed with the Panama railroad company. It is expected that the avorite device of playing the Panama route against the Nicaragua route will again be rèsorted to, notwithstanding the majority eport of the Isthmian Canal Com ission.
The friends of the Isthmian caaal project say, however, that never before have the prospects for the construction of a canal All conditions have worked this end withn the past year With every obstacle heretofore dvanced removed, the finetoion the government are found in condition to warrant the expendito for the work, and there is genera satisfaction over the outlook.
