PROPOSED AMERNDMENT

To the Oonstitution, to be Sub mitted to Vote of the Poople on Trusday, November 4, 1902.
joint resolution.
(S. J. R. No. 3.)

Amending Article 6, Section of the Constitution of the State of Texas requiring all persons sub ject to a poll tax to have paid poll tax and to hold a receipt fo same before they offer to vote any election in this State, and fix ing the time of payment of said $t a x$
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article 6, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or caunty in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed offers to vote, shalif be deemed and elector and person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who not less than six months before any election at which be offers to vote, shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States in accordance of the United States in accordance wita the and shall have resided in Laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall aiso be deemed a quained elachor, and ail electors shail vote in the election precinct of their resile o, provider, that electors ilviag an unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the coanty fhich such county as and purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he oflers to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing his poll tux paid before the first day of
February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shal have lostor ull placed said tax re ceipt, he shail be entitled to vote
upon making affidavit before any upon making affidavit before any
officer authorized to administer ofticer authorized to administer
oaths that such tax receipt has oaths that such tax receipt has
been lost. Such affidavit shall be been lost. Such affidavit shail be
made in writing and left with the judge of the election, and this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.
See, 3. The Governor of this state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation sub-
mitting this amendment to the mitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election.
