"With the close of this month-Auguet-the cotlon year of 1901 1902 will pass into bistory with th shortest supplv of spot cotion in
many years., In fact, we are almost facing a cotton famine. The speculators are industriously making the most of the early cotton that is coming into the market and leading the spinner to believe tha be can obtain sufficient from thi new cotton to bring him over until a crop is on the market. This is cotton farmer will follow the eame policy of rushing all his cotton on the market and auctioning it off And this is what is holding prices down and why September and Oc toher futures are a cent below the spot cotton to day
"I would urge every cotton farmer to abandon the auction system, which you well know forcee the sale of any commodity below its real value, and adopt an ub-todate bueiness method of marketing the erop, i. e., slowly as the nedede demand and not glut the market and force the price down. No only would this maintain the pres ent values, but would tend to se curing to the cotton grower a fair price for his cotton. We urge ev

Several months ago the Pacifio commercial cable company sought permission from the executive banch of the government to lay a Prancisco, via Honolulu and Guam, to China, there to connect with the British cable to the Philippines. For the concessions of landings San Francisco, Honolulu and Guam the company proposed to grant to the United States government special rates, and in certain condition of war practically absolute control of the cable. At that time the creeks were all high and swimming and be thought the impression would be that Kennedy in trying to cross the creek had drowned. Kennedy's loose horse gave the alarm and those searching for the body first thought he had drowned. After the water ran down the body was found and showed conclusive evidence that he had been murdered. Further investigation directed suspicion to the house of a bloody ax and also blood on the bed on which Kennedy slept. Steve was arrested and on being charged with the deed confessed all of the above horrifying details of the tragedy. John was also arrested and both are io jail. When asked why they did it Steve's re ply was that Kennedy had raped their sister about a week previous when he spent the night with .

For the same reason the poll tax arnendment to the Louisiana constitution is conceded to be a failure in the objects for which it was adopted and there is a general agitation in that state for a repeal of the same. The chances are that the proposed
amendment to the state constitution will be defeated by a large majority as it was in the early nineties. Meanwhile the people
should be giving the matter some attention, especially the newspape part of the public.
