## FOR BETIER ROADS

The greatest burden on the people of Houston county is poor coads. It costs the farmers of the county more to haul their stuff to market than the cost of good roonds would amount to. Good roads pring the farm many hours near(r) to market, to church and to Chools, and the nearer to market, heloois, and the nearer to market,
the farmer in close connection with
the latter. Two farmers may live the same number of miles from town, but the one having the best road will consume less time in coming and going and his property is therefore more valuable. He will haul greater loads and thus practically eliminate distance. He virtually moves his farm nearer town. The farmer is near any place which he can reach cheaply and quiekly, while he is far from any place to which transportation
is slow and costly. In this is slow and costly. In this
day of rapid transportation, nearness is a matter of hours and ninutes and not of miles. The quickest is the nearest. No coun ry can better display a healthy one in the matter of rural prog eess than in the improvement of its public highways.

Then the attorney general of the State will be informed and bis approval secured for the issue of the bonds if he decides that the law has been fally complied with; then the steps to have the bonds printed and negotiated, and then the conract will he let for the construetion of the waterworks system. With reasonable expedition it is hought that we will have the vaterworks in operation by next April or May.
