In severe cases small hemorrhages take place into the skin and mu

dark and in appearance like coftee grounca, when it is known as 'black dark and in appearance like cotfee grounca, when it is known as
vomit." There is bleeding at the nose, mouth and gums. Delirium usually follows, then unconsclousness and death. Aertality varies. In some epidemics it has been as high as 85 per cent. In others as low as 10 per cen
Heat, moisture, bad drainage, uncleanliness and unhygienic ce tons favor the disease, but the mosquito is most of all responsible.
Experts seem to agree that the first step to combat the spread of the ever is to attack the mosquito.
