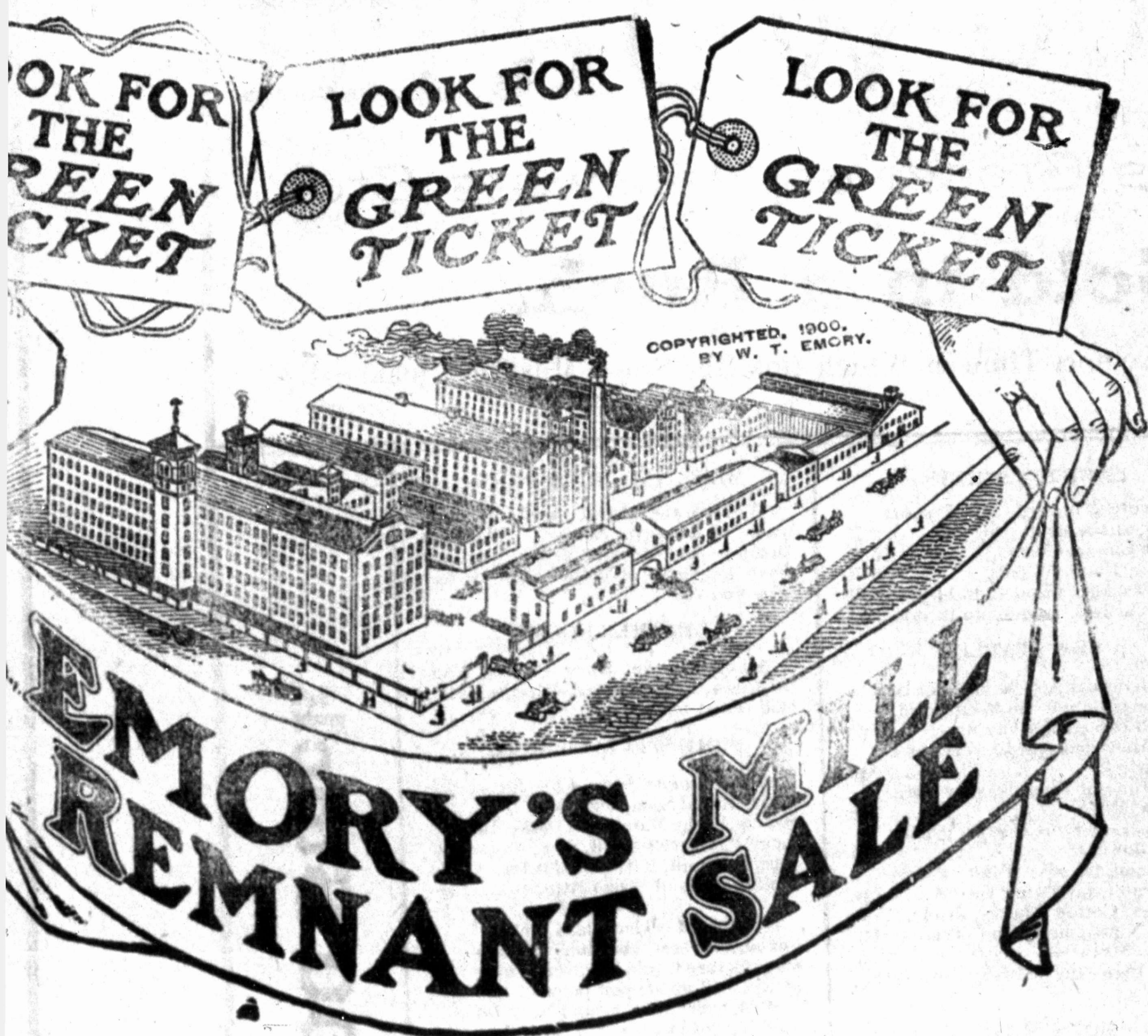

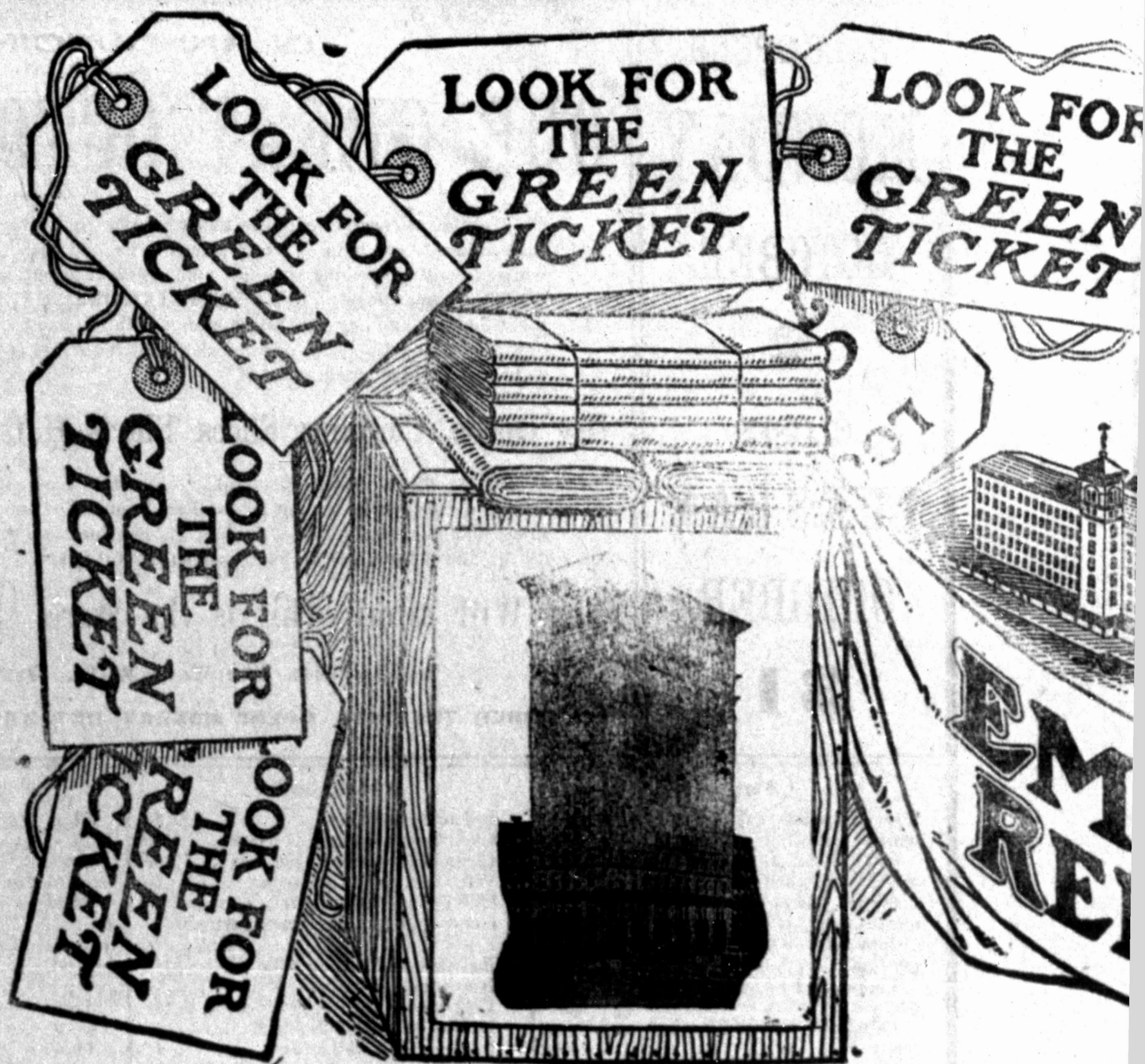

### Early Fall Destruction of the Cotton Stalks and Burning the Trash.

Owing to the comparatively small damage done by the boll weevil this season, farmers are liable to neglect the fall work necessary to their control—to-wit: Cutting and burning the cotton stalks, burning all trash in the fields and immediately plowing them.

Undoubtedly, if every farmer had attended to this work last fall, very few boll weevils would have been found in Texas this spring.

Eternal vigilance is the price of success. With vigilant work this fall, we may reasonably expect a cotton crop in 1906, regardless of the boll weevil. With general neglect, we are morally sure of disaster to the next crop from the boll weevil. Therefore, take immediate steps to destroy the cotton stalks, clean up the trash and plow the field. Even if there are a few unopened bolls in the field, it is better to destroy the stalks in South Texas and Louisiana, by October 20th, and in the northern portion of these states before frost, if possible. Let the effort to minimize the evils of the boll weevil be general.

Farmers of Texas and Louisiana Act promptly and insist upon your tenants doing the same. Let the work be thorough, and let it be universal.

#### FALL FLOWING OR BREAKING.

No single farm operation is more important than fall breaking, and the land should be broken each fall about two inches deeper than the previous season, until a depth of ten inches is reached. Flat breaking is the best, except in heavy soils where the surface is level and there is considerable rain-fall and on post-oak lands where the soil is liable to run together after a hard rain. In such cases, either back-furrow, so as to leave the land in ridges, or flat-break, barrow and then throw into ridges later in the fall, the right distance for planting. Very rolling lands, liable to wash, require special instructions. While the above general suggestions are made in regard to fall breaking, we recognize that there are many special conditions of soil and climate requiring more or less modification of our method. The farmer must, therefore, use his judgment.

In general, the following points may be placed to the credit of fall breaking:

- 1st. It aerates the land and prepares plant food.
- 2nd. The germination of the seed at the next planting is better, plants are more vigorous and the crop greatly benefitted.
- 3rd. It destroys weeds and insects. Both will be injurious to the future crop.
- 4th. It advances the work of the farm, lengthens the working season and enables the farmer to plant promptly at the right time. We respectfully ask the co-operation of the press in bringing the above facts to the attention of the farmers. Respectfully,

## ALL OVER THE HOUSE.

Some Useful Hints on the Care of New Furniture.

New furniture should be kept as long as possible without the use of restoratives. Furniture which has been finished with shellac or varnish, whether in glossy or dull finish, should never be cleaned with soap and water, says the Philadelphia Bulletin. Soap is made to cut oily substances and thus eats out the oil from the waxed, oiled or shellacked surface and works destruction. If an oil restorer seems a necessity raw linseed oil and raw turpentine in equal parts applied on a piece of cheesecloth will be found most often of service.

Where white spots appear on surfaces from the dropping of liquids or from heat the immediate application of raw linseed oil generally restores the color. The oil should be left on the affected spot for several hours or overnight. Alcohol performs the service if applied at once to rosewood or highly finished mahogany. In each instance when the color has returned the spot should be repolished with a piece of cheesecloth moistened with turpentine.

### Boiled Starch.

To make boiled starch allow one tablespoonful of starch to two tablespoonfuls of cold water, add half a teaspoonful of borax and a small piece of wax candle. This keeps the iron from sticking. Mix these ingredients until they are quite smooth and creamy looking and then pour on boiling water, stirring carefully all the time until the starch is cooked and becomes transparent looking. It should then be strained through a piece of muslin and the basin covered with a plate to prevent a skin forming.

### To Tell Fresh Fish.

The eyes should be round, full and bright in a fish that has just been caught, and they should look this way for twenty-four hours if packed in ice. After that time they sink into the head and get dull, and a gray kind of film forms over them. With the eyes in this condition fish is not necessarily stale, though it is not strictly fresh, but until the flesh is soft and flabby the meat is good to eat.

### Cleaning Unpapered Walls.

Clean spots on calcimine with white chalk, blending the edges with the surrounding surface by rubbing gently with a clean, dry sponge. Painted walls may be washed with lukewarm suds or cleaned with a cloth wrung out in kerosene. For hard finished walls use dry bread as you would upon a papered surface, rubbing always in one direction and changing the bread frequently.

### Apple Taffy.

Cook a pound of sugar and a small teacupful of water until the sirup "threads." Run a skewer through small apples that have been wiped dry and clean. As soon as a little of the sirup becomes brittle take from the fire, stir in a teacupful of lemon juice, set in an outer vessel of boiling water and dip in the apples rapidly, laying on waxed paper to dry.

### Rinsing Clothes.

Rinsing is one of the most important operations in laundry work. The reason of clothes having a bad color is often that the soap has not been rinsed out of them. Use plenty of water for rinsing, first tepid, then cold. Remove the soap with tepid water and then use a plentiful supply of cold until every trace of it is removed.

### Bean Croquettes.

Take cold baked beans, mash with a fork. To about a pint of the beans allow a tablespoonful of flour and a little milk if they are very dry. Sometimes there will be gravy enough in the beans. Put this mixture by spoonfuls into the frying pan after having fried out a slice of pork.
