## STATE ELECTION RESULTS KNOWN

SOME WINNERS HAD SMALL LEAD OVER OPPONENTS, AND EXACT FIGURES ARE INCOMPLETE.

## COUNTY CONVENTIONS IN TEXAS

Saturday Were Progressive vs. Reactionary—Two Splits Are Important—Ramsey Men Awake and Active in North Texas.

Battling for the control of the party machinery, county conventions were held throughout the State Saturday and delegates elected to the State convention. It was progressive against reactionary.

In South Texas the counties, large and most of the small, elected solid Colquitt delegations, notably in Bexar, Jefferson, Harris and Travis. Hays county, long in the prohibition ranks, saw a split, the Colquitt and Ramsey delegates holding separate conventions. This was true in Hill county, in North Texas, also a prohibition county. Thus two contests are assured for the State convention.

In North Texas, the prohibition stronghold of the State, the Ramsey men were awake and active at most of the county conventions, with the result that delegations were selected to go to San Antonio who will fight for the things advocated by the progressives and the prohibition wing of the democratic party. This happened rather generally, and with strong prohibition leaders as delegates—there is sure to be a fight of some proportion at the State convention on the 13th instant. The convention basis not having been fixed as yet, it is impossible to say where the advantage rests. However, it is rather indicated that the division will be nearly equal and that neither side will have a large majority. That means a contest every inch of the way in the fight over the prospective declaration of principles.

There may be changes when the official tabulation of the vote of the primary of July 27 is made, but it is believed that the State ticket to be nominated at the San Antonio convention August 13 will be as follows: United States Senator—Morris Sheppard of Texarkana. Governor—O. B. Colquitt of Terrell (incumbent). Lieutenant Governor—Will H. Mayes of Brownwood. Comptroller—W. P. Lane of Fort Worth (incumbent). Attorney General—B. F. Looney of Greenville. Treasurer—J. M. Edwards of Runnels county (incumbent). Commissioner of General Land Office—J. T. Robison of Morris county (incumbent). Commissioner of Agriculture—Ed R. Kone of San Marcos (incumbent). Superintendent of Public Instruction—F. M. Bralley of Bonham (incumbent). Railroad Commissioner (full term)—W. D. Williams of Fort Worth (incumbent); short term, Earle B. Mayfield of Meridian.

Supreme Court—Chief Justice, T. J. Brown of Sherman (incumbent); associate justice, long term, Nelson Phillips of Dallas (incumbent); short term, W. E. Hawkins.

Judge Court of Criminal Appeals—A. C. Prendergast of Waco (incumbent).

Congressmen at Large—Hatton W. Sumners of Dallas and D. E. Garrett of Houston.

Tabulation of Official Returns.

As to the majorities of the various candidates, there can be no definite statement until the complete official returns are tabulated and declared by the State executive committee. The committee will meet in San Antonio August 11 and canvass the returns, which in the meantime will be prepared by Nat P. Jackson of Paris, secretary to the State committee; but not until the last moment (judging by the unfailing precedent of other primary elections) will all the returns be in, and it is probable that the committee will have to wire for returns from some counties when it meets on the 11th.

Majorities and Pluralities.

However, there is little doubt that the ticket as named above will be officially declared. Colquitt has won by approximately 45,000, and possibly more. Sheppard's plurality will be about 30,000, or just about the vote received by Randall.

Mayes made a runaway from Imboden and Barker was left far behind by Lane.

Looney wins by a scant 4,000, if that much.

Edwards had no trouble, and gets a good plurality over Aston of Sherman.

Robison simply wiped up Geers of Fort Worth.

Ed R. Kone will have 10,000 or 12,000 over Singleton, his nearest opponent, probably.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution so as to Authorize the Grant of Aid to Indigent and Disabled Soldiers and Sailors and Their Wives.**  
(S. J. R. No. 9.)

**Senate Joint Resolution.**  
Senate Joint Resolution to amend Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the grant of aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows, and to soldiers who served in the militia and in organizations for the protection of the frontier and their indigent widows, and to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for the indigent and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors, and such women as aided the Confederacy, and authorize a special ad valorem pension tax, and making appropriations for same.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporation whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1900, and their widows in indigent circumstances, and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since January 1, 1900, and who were married to such soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1, 1900; to indigent and disabled soldiers, who under special laws of the State of Texas, during the war between the States served for a period of at least six months in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican marauders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas, who were in active service for a period of at least six months during the war between the States, to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances, and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1900, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since 1861, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows, and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided for by law; provided, the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home.

The Legislature shall have the power to levy and collect, in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property not exceeding five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate Army and Navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations, or militia.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election of State officers, in November, 1913. At which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 51, Article 3 of the Constitution relating to increase of Confederate pensions;" and the voters, opposed to

ten words: "A. to Section 51: stitution, relating Confederate pensions."

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00 or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

**Proposed Amendment to the Constitution Authorizing Cities of More Than 5000 Inhabitants to Adopt Their Charters by Vote of the People.**

(H. J. R. No. 10.)  
House Joint Resolution.

House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 5, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for cities of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants to adopt their charter by a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That section 5 of Article 11 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund of at least two per cent thereon; and provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every two years.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be held in this State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State. At such election, those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "For the amendment to Section 5, Article 11, of the constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people;" those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 5, Article 11, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people." The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much as is necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas out of moneys not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of the publication of this amendment and the proclamation for the election.

**WARNING TO** Members of Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees and Managers of the Educational, Eleemosynary and Penal Institutions Shall be Elected or Appointed for the Term of Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 9.)  
House Joint Resolution.

An Act proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new section thereto, to be entitled "Section 30a"; providing that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University, and the boards of trustees or managers of educational, eleemosynary and penal institutions of the State and such other boards as have been, or may hereafter be established by law, may be elected or appointed for term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of said boards to be elected or appointed every two (2) years in the manner provided by law, fixing the time for holding the election, and making the appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known and designated as "30a," and to read as follows:

Section 30a. The Legislature may provide by the law that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees or Managers of the educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions of the State, and such boards as have been, or may hereafter be established by law, may hold their respective offices for the term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of such boards to be elected or appointed every two (2) years in such manner as the Legislature may determine; vacancies in such offices to be filled as may be provided by law, and the Legislature shall enact suitable laws to give effect to this section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for the members of the Legislature, at the next general election to be held in this State, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For the amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law." And all voters opposed to said amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have same published, as required by the law of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of said proclamation, publication, and election.

## WARNING TO NATIONS OF WORLD

MUST BE NO ENCROACHMENT UP ON NORTH AND SOUTH AMERICA

The Lodge Resolution Passes Senate. Monroe Doctrine Must Be Respected—Origin in Magdalena Affair.

Washington—The United States senate Saturday issued a warning to the nations of the world against encroachment upon the continents of North and South America. The United States will not see "without grave concern," said the senate, "any suitable naval or military site pass into control of a foreign corporation" when such possession "might threaten communications or safety of the United States."

So vital were the issues discussed in the Lodge resolution, which set forth the policy of the United States as to points surrounded like Magdalena bay, that the resolution was debated in secret session.

The resolution arose from a reported attempt of a Japanese syndicate to get land about Magdalena bay. In the form finally adopted by the senate it declares against the acquisition of any threatening location by a foreign corporation "which has such a relation to another government, not American, as to give this government practical power of control for naval or military purposes."

Those who opposed the resolution on its final passage were Senators Cummins, McCumber, Percy and Stone. Demand was made in the secret session for the designation of the country toward which the resolution was directed. Those who supported it declared it was not a warning to any nation in particular, but a definition of this country's position "before embarrassing situations might arise."

Senator Cummins opposed the resolution because he believed it was not direct and specific enough, he said. Senator Lodge insisted the opening of the Panama canal made it necessary for the United States to make clear at once its position in such matters.

The resolution declared the United States could not see "without grave concern" the title to any advantageous position on the American continent pass into the control of a foreign corporation that might be dominated by a foreign government.

"What is the real meaning of this resolution as it affects the Monroe doctrine?" asked Senator Cummins. "Is it an extension or further application of that principle?"

"The declaration rests on a much broader and older ground than the Monroe doctrine," replied Senator Lodge. "This resolution rests on the generally accepted principle that every nation has a right to protect its own safety; and if it feels that the possession of any given harbor or place is prejudicial to its safety, it is its duty and right to intervene."

### Harris County Officers.

Houston, Tex.—With the complete returns Monday night on the offices for Harris County many close races were shown. The winners in the county races were as follows: For county judge, W. H. Ward; county clerk, George Jones; treasurer, James Charlton; tax collector, Karl Druesdow; tax assessor, A. R. Miller; surveyor, J. A. Miller; sheriff, Frank Hammond; criminal district judge, C. W. Robinson; criminal district attorney, R. G. Maury; clerk criminal district court, Max Andrew; Eleventh district judge, Charles E. Ashe; Fifty-fifth district judge, W. M. Masterson; Sixty-first district judge, John A. Read; J. M. Geiselman for county chairman received a large majority.

### Over 70,000 Acres in Cotton.

Brownsville, Tex.—More than one million acres of land have been purchased on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande about thirty miles above Brownsville by a company of Spaniards. The investment was about \$18,500,000 Mexican. The company has begun the construction of about one hundred miles of canal for irrigation purposes; half the water needed will be supplied from a pumping station of 400-horse power. The company will plant 70,000 acres in cotton.

### Two Americans Hanged.

Mexico City.—Two Americans were hanged near Cananea, Sonora, Wednesday. Their bodies were found the same day and the incident reported to the president by the governor of Sonora. The governor stated that he had ordered an investigation. His opinion is that the execution of the two men was done by rebels in order to precipitate American intervention. The victims have not been identified.

### Leave Property to Rebels.

El Paso, Tex.—Work has been discontinued on the Pearson and Pacheco railway and the Booker Lumber Company's holdings in the Casas Grandes district, and employes are arriving at El Paso by train and overland. About \$25,000 worth of materials have been abandoned to the rebels.

## TEXAS FARMING MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATION

Organized at College Station to Promote Business Farming in Light of Scientific Knowledge.

College Station, Tex.—Following is the constitution of the Texas Farm Management Association, organized at College Station during the fifteenth annual session of the Texas Farmers' Congress just closed.

This organization shall be known as "The Texas Farm Management Association."

The object of this association shall be to promote business farming in the light of scientific knowledge (1) by fostering farm management, investigations and (2) by co-operating with the division of farm management of the Texas experiment stations in its efforts toward that end.

All persons engaged in any type of farming in Texas shall be entitled to membership in this association, and such other persons as may be engaged in investigating or fostering better farming in the state.

Honorary membership in this association may be conferred upon any one interested in better farm management, such membership to be conferred by a majority vote at an official meeting of the association.

A fee of 25c shall be collected from each member annually.

The officers of this association shall consist of a president, a vice president and a secretary-treasurer, whose terms of office shall be one year, or until such time as their successors are elected by the association. These officers shall be elected by ballot, and a majority of the members present at the meeting is required.

There shall be an executive committee, composed of three members, as follows: Director of experiment stations, chairman; United States farm management expert and one farmer.

There shall be appointed at each annual meeting of this association one member, who shall be known as "executive committee member of the farmers' congress," said member to represent this association in the farmers' congress.

This association shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order.

All persons joining this association at time of organization—farmers' congress, July 30-August 1, 1912—shall be designated as charter members.

There shall be a program committee, consisting of the officers of the association and the executive committee member of the farmers' congress, the duty of which it shall be to prepare the program of the succeeding annual meeting.

## LIGHTFOOT RESIGNS; WALTHALL NAMED

The Attorney Will Give Up Office, Effective August 30, to Practice Law.

Austin, Tex.—Jewell P. Lightfoot has sent to the governor his resignation from the office of attorney general, to become effective August 30. The executive accepted the resignation and appointed to the office James D. Walthall of San Antonio first assistant attorney general, to assume charge on that date.

The resignation, Mr. Lightfoot briefly notified the governor, was due to his determination to open his law office in Austin September 1, with John W. Brady and E. B. Robertson, two of his assistants, as partners. He wrote:

"My Dear Sir: Pursuant to the announcement made earlier in the year that I would engage in the practice of law at Austin, and having determined to open my office on the first day of September, I hereby tender my resignation as attorney general of the state of Texas, to take effect August 30, 1912."

Mr. Walthall, who will, in less than a month, take over the direction of the state's legal department, is the youngest man ever identified with that position. He is 35 years old, a native of Alabama, a graduate of the State university law school in 1893 and he began his practice with an eminent law firm in San Antonio. He was appointed fifth assistant by Attorney General Davidson in 1907 and has worked upward through the assistantships until appointed first assistant by Mr. Lightfoot at the beginning of the latter's elective term two years ago. He has frequently been acting attorney general and has led in many of the state's most important cases in the past three years, in both the federal and state supreme courts.

### Another Oil Well Brought In.

La Porte, Tex.—Another oil well was brought in at Goose Creek Friday on the Sweet tract, known as the Guffey Company well, which, when finally settled down to a steady flow, yields 650 barrels per day. It is located 250 yards from the bay shore, on the high bluff.

## Movement for Higher-Priced Cotton.

Mr. A. C. Tracy of Dallas, who has been in Crockett for the past week representing the Southern States Cotton Corporation, made the following statement to the Courier Wednesday morning in regard to the progress of the work: "In common with other counties in the cotton producing states, Houston county has fallen in line and organized. The committee for Houston county is as follows: R. H. Wootters, Crockett, secretary; W. M. Brock, Grapeland; Wm. Driskill, Lovelady; Will Brown, Kennard; M. Brailsford, Latexo and C. E. Updegraff, Latexo, vice chairmen. Farmers may now certificate their cotton and get a guarantee of 15 cents a pound basis middling. Eleven cents is paid in cash and the remaining four cents in 90 scrip bearing 6 per cent interest," continued Mr. Tracy.

## Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating the Office of Prison Commissioner and Making the Term of Office of the Board of Prison Commissioners Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 22.)

### House Joint Resolution.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Article XVI of the State Constitution by adding thereto Section 58, creating the office of Prison Commissioner, and making the term of office of the members of the Board of Prison Commissioners six years, and making an appropriation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Sec. 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section which shall be known as Section 58 and shall read as follows:

Section 58. (Article XVI.) The Board of Prison Commissioners charged by law with the control and management of the State prisons, shall be composed of three members appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office shall be six years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified; provided that the terms of office of the Board of Prison Commissioners first appointed after the adoption

of this amendment shall begin on January 20th of the year following the adoption of this amendment, and shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two years, one four years, and one six years. Their terms to be decided by lot after they shall have qualified, and one Prison Commissioner shall be appointed every two years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of this State shall fill said vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term thereof.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "For a six years term for Prison Commissioners" and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "Against a six years term for Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of the Governor's proclamation submitting this proposed amendment.
