## PROCEEDINGS OF TEXAS LEGISLATUR

MEMBERS OF BOTH THE SENATE AND HOUSE ARE WRESTLING WITH STATE PROBLEMS.

## **BILLS DISCUSSED GENERALLY**

Many Measures Have Been Acted Upon Favorably in Both the Senate and House-New Bills Introduced.

Texas House Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.-The special order for Saturday in the house, a committee substitute for various bills that had been introduced in the effort to re form the state penitentiary system, occupied less than one hour's time, proponents of the substitute measure having made their plans so well that all proposed amendments were quickly voted down and the committee substitute bill engrossed by a viva voce vote. Mr. Ellis had adopted an amendment increasing from \$40 to \$50 monthly the maximum salary to be paid to convict guards.

The following house joint resolutions, providing for constitutional amendments, were passed finally with the necessary-two-thirds majorities:

By Messrs. McFarland and Lewelling: Permitting qualified voters to vote for state officers or on state questions in any precinct in the state outside his own county.

By Mr. Butler: Increasing the maximum special road tax from 15c to 50c. and permitting county subdivisions to vote such taxes.

Mr. Metcalf's resolutions providing for a constitutional amendment to permit counties to vote special levies up to 20c ad valorem to provide student's loan funds, both to enable them to finish at their high schools and to attend the higher institutions of learning, met with opposition by Mr. Sullivan and was supported by Messrs. Metcalf, Tinner, Griggs and McAskill, but was passed finally by a vote of only 62 to 40, less than the necessary two-thirds. Mr. Maddox moved to reconsider the vote and spread it on the journal. A motion to table this was lost and the motion to reconsider is spread on the journal and may be clause. called up later.

#### Texas Senate Proceedings.

Austin, Tex .- The members of the senate Saturday entered into a "gentlemen's agreement" to suspend the regular order of business and call up only such bills as were not calculated which more bills were passed finally than on any other day of the session. Only three bills were killed.

It was agreed that if there was any opposition to any measure it would not be called up, but the senator would have the right to call up another bill.

Under this arrangement Senator Wiley had passed finally his bill providing for the enumeration of scholastics between the ages of 21 and 17. This is a corrective measure, correcting an oversight in the law which increased the scholastic age to 21.

Senator Astin had passed finally the bill providing for the issuing of certain Agricultural and Mechanical College bonds maturing in 1946 and 1950. The present bonds bear 3 per cent and the reissue will bear 5 per cent to

conform to prevailing laws. Senator Bee's bill providing that railroads may be compelled to build spur tracks for patrons on the orders of the railroad commission was passed finally.

Senator Morrow's bill giving the supreme court absolute discretion in the matter of transferring cases from one court of civil appeals to another was passed finally.

Senator Morrow's bill empowering the supreme court to equalize civil appeal court dockets at its discretion was passed.

The Lattimore bill providing that Confederate veterans may own homesteads valued at \$2,500 and personal property at \$1,000 before being exempted from drawing a pension was passed finally.

House Passed Education Bill.

Austin, Tex.-The compulsory education bill, engrossed earlier in the week, was Friday passed finally in the house after a vain effort by Mr. Grindstaff to attach an amendment exempting from its provisions any child whose labor goes to the support of its family or for payments on the homestead. The amendment was defeated, 37 to 57. Mr. Baker of Scurry, one of the authors of the bill, had several corrective amendments adopted and Mr. Stephens had reduced from \$100 to \$10 the fine for any person, firm or corporation guilty of employ ing any child subject to the provisions of the act. On final passage the bill received a vote of 94 ayes to 11 noes. The bill creating a state naval militis

The following bills were passed

By Messrs. Beason and Campbell: Creating state naval militia.

By Messrs. Jones and Bolin: Establishing the Stephen F. Austin State Normal College in Northeast Texas, after the adoption of an amendment by Mr. Dayton cutting the appropriation for buildings and equipment from \$100,000 to \$50,000. The exact loca-tion is yet to be determined.

Debate on Cotton Seed Bill.

Austin, Tex.—There was another warm debate over the McGregor cotton seed products investigation bill in the senate Friday, but further action was postponed after nearly two hours' discussion of a proposition for an amendment that McGregor signified his willingness to accept. The amendment will provide that the lawyer to be employed as special counsel in the investigation shall be associated with the attorney general, but will be selected by the governor, as will the commission provided for in the bill.

Senator Bailey of De Witt introduced a bill requiring the governor to appoint hide and animal inspectors for the counties of Bee, Live Oak, Maverick and Val Verde; a bill was presented by Senator Johnson which exempts native buffalo and crossbreeds from taxation where not raised for commercial purposes.

The senate passed finally house bill by McDowell providing for the creation of a county court for Jefferson county.

Senator Bee's bill, which provides for the election of county school superintendents by the county school trustees instead of by the people. This bill provides that the county superintendent must have a permanent state certificate and his salary is limited to \$2500 a year.

House Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.—By a vote of 79 to 41 the house Thursday advanced to third reading the bill by Senator Bailey of Harris, known as the Texas Company bill, permitting companies organized for the purpose of storing, transporting, buying or selling oil and gas, salt and brine and other mineral solutions to organize auxiliary corporations outside the state, not exceeding one such auxiliary corporation in any one state. Just previously the house, by a vote of 41 to 83, had refused to adopt an amendment striking out the enacting

The following senate bills were passed Thursday:

Senator Balley's (Harris) bill, defining loan brokers and requiring them to give bond.

Senator Westbrook's bill, reorganising the sixty-second judicial district.

Senator Clark's bill to increase the pay of district attorneys serving two or more counties so they might be paid for 150 days instead of 133 days, on third reading, was opposed by Messrs. Williford, Grindstaff, Tinner, Watson and Maddox, and advocated by Messrs. Burmelster and Jones, and finally killed, 58 to 66.

#### Senate Proceedings.

Austin, Tex.-After a checkered career in the house, where it originated, the Cope bill, providing for the divorcement of gins and cotton off mills, was killed in the senate Thursday by a vote of 17 to 9.

The McGregor bill, providing for a cotton seed products investigating committee, was next taken up. The debate on the latter measure was heated at times. Adojurnment left the bill still pending.

Another house bill, the Tilson lack rabbit scalp bill, carrying a bounty appropriation of \$100,000, did not find the senatorial sea smooth sailing, but it was passed finally after having had several amendments added.

A house bill by Messrs. Stephens and Taylor, exempting Brown and Upshur counties from the provisions of the fish and game law, precipitated a long and unexpected debate, and was finally killed.

Several of the senators spoke for and against the measure, the contention of those against it being that fish are migratory and to permit seining in Brown and Upshur counties would injure the other counties along the streams near those countles. After more than an hour of argument the bill was killed by a vote of 16 to 8.

Texas House Doings.

Austin, Tex.-Being senate bill day in the house Wednesday, a large number of measures were disposed of. The chief event of the day was the killing of the amended senate bill by Senator Bailey of Harris, which would have moved the appellate court from Galveston to Beaumont, the house refusing to engross the measure by a vote of 52 to 63.

Senate bills were passed Wednesday finally as follows:

By Mr. Bailey of Harris: Authorising drainage districts to issue 6 per cent bonds and sell them at 90c.

By Mr. Morrow: Repealing the vertfled pleadings act of the last legisla-ture and re-enacting the old law of general denial.

## HEALTH OFFICER OFFERS PREVENTIVES OF CHARBO

Disease Affects Cattle, Horses, Mules, Sheep, Hogs and Other Range Stock and is Considered Deadly.

Austin, Tex.-Charbon, or anthrax. has caused the death of 500 goats in Val Verde county within the last two weeks, according to official reports received at the state health department. State Health Officer W. B. Collins fears an epidemic of this disease. He has issued a warning to stockmen, giving the best known and most effective means of preventing charbon.

This disease affects cattle, horses, mules, sheep, hogs and other range stock, being especially prevalent during the warmer months. Epidemics usually break out in the late spring and last until fall. The state health officer's warning follows:

The most effective methods of preventing charbon disease are as follows:

1. The complete burning of all carcasses of animals dead of this disease as soon after death as possible. It is highly desirable to burn the carcass where the animal died. If it is necessary to move the carcass, the skin should not be cut, torn nor broken, as each drop of the animal's blood contains many charbon germs. Prevent the blood and other discharges from the natural body openings from spilling on the ground.

2. Manure, litter, hay and everything that has been in contact with the disease or dead animal should be completely destroyed by burning. The inside of barns, stalls, stables or milk sheds should be whitewashed after the animal dies or recovers.

3. Prevent the overflow of lands used for pasture or for growing hay or other feedstuff. All surface pools of stagnant water should be either drained off or fenced up so that animals will not have access to these.

4. Reduce the number of various kinds of horse flies by applying kerosene or crude oil to the surface pools of water and to the humid spots in the woods which these insects frequent.

5. Complete isolation of the sick and mals from the healthy ones, and at such distance that the flies will not travel from the sick animals to the healthy ones.

6. Preventive vaccination. In sections where charbon has been prevalent in previous years, and especially the year before, the owners should vaccinate their animals early in the spring (March or April), and not wait appears. Just as soon as a case of charbon appears in a herd or in a pasture, no matter what month of the year, the owner should vaccinate all the animals in this herd or pasture. and especially those that have been in contact with the sick. When vaccinating large bunches of animals, it is wise to separate the sick and the apparently sick from the healthy ones and vaccinate the sick and the healthy with separate materials and separate instruments. Vaccination should be practiced by only reliable and trustworthy persons, preferably by qualifled veterinarians, as careless handling of the vaccine material might result in serious consequences. Vaccine material for this work should be fresh and obtained from reliable manufac-

SWEEPING CATTLE QUARANTINE

Texas Decree Effective Against All Sections of Continent.

Austin, Tex.-Acting upon the rep-

resentations of the live stock sanitary commission, Governor Ferguson Friday issued a proclamation, sweeping in its nature, quarantining against the entire United States, Dominion of Canada and the republic of Mexico, and prohibits shipment of cattle into Texas on account of the prevalence of the so-called foot and mouth disease. The proclamation embraces not only cattle but horses, mules, jacks, jennets, sheep, goats and other ruminants and swine, also against other domestic animals and fowls. It also prohibits the importation into Texas of any hoofs, hides or skins of any live stock, or any hay, straw, fodder, cotton seed or other products or material calculated to carry the infection of foot and mouth disease. Hay and straw used for packing as well as all live stock cars must be disinfected.

RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE OPERATIONS EXTEND ALONG WHOLE FRONT IN EASTERN WAR ZONE

## DARDANELLE FORTS CRUMBLE

The Powerful Allied Fleet of Dreadnoughts Have Passed Outer Forts and Are Trying to Work Way to Constantinople.

Latest War News From the Front. The allies have disembarked de tachments of artillery near the destroyed Dardanelles forts and British and French flags are now flying over

The fleet continued a bombardment of the inner forts Sunday. A powder magazine was blown up. There were numerous victims. The fleet had reached as far as the lighthouse near Fort Killd Bahr.

The forts on the European side have been reduced to silence.

Mine sweeping operations continue. There are 50,000 Turks on the European side and 15,000 on the Asiatic

The Russian offensive operations appear at the present time to extend along the whole front-an indication that they have been able to bring very strong reinforcements into the field. They have successfully checked the German advance in North Poland, where the Germans are reported to be in retreat and the recapture of Prsasnysz after severe fighting has given them an excellent pivotal point from which to carry on their further operations.

All the Petrograd correspondents re fer to the capture of a large number of Germans as a new phase of the war and credit it to a lack of officers among the German armies and the large number of young untrained men who have been drafted into them.

The Russian offensive extends to what is now known as the Bzura-Rawya front, where they successfully opposed Field Marshal von Hindenburg's attempt to advance on Warsaw in December and January.

There also has been heavy fighting in Western Galicia and in the Carpathlans, but without bringing any notable change in the situation. In Eastern Galicia the Russians report another repulse for the Austrians who have again lost a number of prisoners.

With Russia it would seem to be a case of keeping up the supply of ammunition which the opening of the Dardanelles would greatly assist.

The attempt to force the straits by the allied fleet would release the Russian grain which the allies want and would give to Russia war material which she herself can not produce, while it would be certain to have a marked effect on the future policy of the Balkan states.

Almost simultaneously with the declaration in the house of commons of the foreign secretary Thursday in London, that Great Britain is in entire accord with Russia's desire for access to the open sea comes the announcement by the British admiralty that all the forts at the entrance to the Dardanelles have been reduced.

The straits are guarded also by lines of mines, believed to number at least seven. It was under some of these lines that the British submarine B-11, in command of Lieutenant Commander Holbrook, dived last December and torpedoed the Turkish battleship H. Messudieh.

Recently the Turks, fearing the entrance of the allied fleet into the Sea of Marmora, sent troops and heavy artillery to all the islands in that water.

If once they force the straits the British and French warships, which are thought to number between thirty and forty, would likely attempt a landing with a subsequent march on Constantinople,

The Bosphorus, the narrow strait about eighteen miles in length, which connects the Black Sea with the Sea of Marmora, is also strongly fortified and it is through this strait that the Black Sea fleet of Russia would have to come in order to reach the open.

Within the boundaries of the Black Sea a powerful Russian fleet has been bottled up, together with hundreds of steamers which might be used for transport purposes if Russia deemed that desimble.

Furthermore, should the allied fleet be successful in the present undertaking Russia would be enabled to re-lease millions of bushels of wheat.

The London official information bureau announced Wednesday that the Clan MacNaughton, an armed merchant cruiser, is missing. The vessel was last heard from Feb. 3, and it is feared that she has been lost.

## GENERAL INDIAN UPRISING IS THREATENED IN UTAH

It is Feared Renegade Utes From Reservation in Colorado Will Join Old Polk.

Salt Lake City, Utah.—News from the Indian uprising reports the situstion as growing more serious. It was feared that renegade Utes from the reservation in Colorado will join Old Polk's band. Reports from the Colorado reservation say the Indians think the white men have killed twenty-five squaws and papooses, and they are much incensed.

Marshal Nebeker has wired the United States district attorney at Salt Lake City and also the department of justice at Washington that he must have at once twenty Navajo Indian police to assist in tracking the hostiles. "My men will take care of all the fighting," he said.

A posse has left Bluff to look for posed to be in the hills somewhere west of Butler, Wash. Great anxiety has been felt for his safety. A scouting party Wednesday found that Posey and a band of several Indians had crossed the San Juan river at the mouth of Comb Wash to the Navajo reservation on the south side. The white men found several places where the Indians had built signal fires.

Another scouting party followed the trail of Old Polk and about ten mounted warriors to recapture the wash, eight or ten miles east of Bluff, but was unable to determine whether his movement indicated a withdrawal and attempt to escape or an effort to obtain reinforcements. The fact that so few of the Indians were with the parties led by the two old chiefs suggests that their trips are merely preliminary to further resistance.

Durango, Colo.-Five Indians and one white man have been killed, one white man wounded and six Indians taken prisoners in the battle between a band of Piute Indians and a posse seeking the arrest of Tse-Ne-Gat, leader of the Indians.



# **WEST CONFERS WITH**

PRESIDENT WILSON'S PERSONAL REPRESENTATIVE MEETS GEN-ERAL FELIPE ANGELES.

## THE SITUATION IN MEXICO

Carranza Authorities in Colima, Mexico, Reported to Have Sequestered Goods of Other Nationals-Reports From Other Districts.

Washington.-Duval West, personal representative of President Wilson, conferred at Monterey Saturday with General Felipe Angeles, one of the chief lieutenants of General Villa. It was the first conference of a series n which Mr. West has undertaken to obtain for the president more definite information about conditions in Mexico than has been available recently through consular sources.

Mr. West was accompanied to Monterey by George C. Carothers, who has now gone with him to Aguascalientes to visit General Villa. Enrique C. Llorente, the latter's Washington representative, said Sunday the conference between Augeles and Messrs. West and Carothers had been most satisfactory and that conditions in Monterey were quiet.

Mr. Llorente said the next big battle between the rival forces in Mexico would be fought in the vicinity of Monterey very shortly. He added that General Angeles had from eight to ten thousand men and would be reinforced soon by many columns commanded by General Villa himself. General Carranza has mobilized upward of ten to twelve thousand men in the same section and expects his lientenants to attack Monterey soon.

On Board U. S. S. San Diego, San Diego, Cal.-According to reports received Sunday by Rear Admiral Howard, the Carranza authorities of the town of Colima, Mexico, acting on a proclamation by the governor of the State of Colima, that he refused to guarantee protection to foreign-owned property, have demanded possession of such property in the town limits.

A ranch owned by an American, whose name was not given, was reported to have been looted.

The military authorities of Manzanillo. Mexico, are said to have guaranteed the safety of Spanish subjects recently kidnaped from Acapulco.

Another engagement between Car-Sinaloa, is reported. The result has not been learned.

Austin, Tex.-Governor Ferguson wrote to President Wilson Thursday calling his attention to the continued depredations along the border and asking that the federal government provide \$30,000 for the purpose of increasing the border patrol from 30 rangers to 60. He described conditions along the border, pointing out that the food supply of the people on the Mexican side for seventy-five miles into the interior has been exhausted, and they are making raids and appropriating the live stock of citizens of the United States. The local authorities are unable to cope with the situation and the ranger force has been increased to the limit. Hs asks that the United States government aid to the extent requested.

On Board U. S. S. San Diego, San Diego, Cal.—Reports Thursday from Manzanillo, Mexico, indicate that the Carranzista forces are in retreat from Guadalajara to Colima, and that a Villaista force is occupying Gauadalajara. Carranza officials of the States of Jalisco and Colima have arrived in Manzanillo.

Three Spanish subjects have been arrested by the Carranza military authorities and placed on board the gunboat Guerrero and taken to Manzanillo. It is reported that this was done upon orders issued by General Carranza. The reason given for the arrests is the alleged furnishing of arms to bandits for the purpose of killing cattle for their hides, a state offense. The commander of the cruiser Cleveland is investigating.

Washington.-Imposition of special taxes amounting to millions of dollars upon business houses and property owners of the City of Mexico by General Obregon, the Carranza commander, was reported to the state department Wednesday.

Ambassador Dagama of Brazil, whose government is caring for American diplomatic interests in the City of Mexico, conferred Wednesday with Secretary Bryan. It was reiterated that the United States contemplated no immediate move in the general dexican situation.

Work is progressing rapidly on the Mexia-Waco gas pipe line and it is expected gas will be turned on by March 15.

Abilene is engaged in installing electric light for the lighting of the city. Approximately 105 arc lights will be installed. All gas lights to be removed.

A movement has been started at Jefferson for the erection of an addiclonal school building there to cost not less than \$25,000.

The residence of Wm. Buchanan at Texarkana to cost over \$100,000 is nearing completion. Mr. Buchanan is a large lumber dealer and president of the Louisiana and Arkansas rail-

An annual report compiled by the Denison chamber of commerce showed that \$417,022 was spent for building and civic improvements during the past year. This did not include \$75,-000 spent in an interurban and wagon bridge across Red river.

It is expected this year that 60,000 acres of grain will be sown in Runnels county. One-tenth of this has already been sown. As a comparison of the acreage of 1914 and 1907, statistics show only 245 acres in the latter year against 60,000 in 1914.

The shipments, in the aggregate, amounted to 30,595 bales of cotton 365,000 bushels of wheat, 15,560 sacks of cotton seed meal, 3,600 sacks of flour and a quantity of timber and staves.

Lubbock farmers are still threshing their grain from their 1914 crops. One farmer thrashed out over 76 bushels of kafir corn per acre on eight acres and sold it for an average of \$47.73 per acre. #### The Sex of the Insune.

Of approximately every five hundred persons in the United States in 1910, there was one an inmate of an insane asylum. The exact figures, expressed in a recent report of the Census Bureau, state that in a typical community of 200,000 persons, equally divided as to sex, 208 of the males and 200 of the females would be found in the insane asylums. In the course of a year, 72 males and 60 females would be admitted to the asylums. In 1880 the total number of inmates in insane asylums in the United States included 20,635 males and 20,307 females. Thirty years later the number of male inmates had increased to 98,695, and the number of female inmates to 80,096. The excess of men among admissions in 1910 indicated a still further in-Ranch. crease in the proportion, namely, 128 males to 100 females. An analysis of these admissions as to the specific forms of insanity involved brings to light the interesting fact that if alcoholic psychosis and general paralysis are deducted the proportion of the sexes is practically the same. The diseases mentioned, says The Journal of the American Medical Association, would seem to be those which, generally, are the result of dissipation. Alcohol and syphilis again established their superiority as man's most dangerous allied foes.

#### Passed Bill for Printing Legal Notices.

With Senators Lattimore and Page the only senators voting in the negative, the senate passed finally Johnson's bill requiring the publication of legal notices in newspapers and to stop the practice of posting such notices on trees, fences and the courthouse doors. The final vote was 24 to 2, but the bill had been stripped by amendments before it reached passage. They will rough it better than any other fowl I ever raised, making their own living in both winter and summer, and they

They begin to lay early in spring and lay until frost. Their eggs will keep perfectly fresh for a much longer time than hen eggs.

Guineas are just as palatable fried when frying size as a chicken and they make good roast. They range all over the fields and gather more insects than any other fowl. Guineas do not require housing even in the worst weather, preferring to roost in

I never lost a guinea from hawks or varmints; they are so active that they are not easily caught like chickens. I have never raised them in pens, so don't know how they would stand confinement—but for rustlers they can't be beaten. They are never standing around the door waiting to be fed.

I prefer to let the guinea hens set, then they will range off with the little ones. The little birds are ready to run when but a few hours old. I have never had any experience in hatching them in incubators.—Mrs. Guy Bow in Farm and
