Within an hour later after the recipt of the report from Denny, eneral Funston, with the approval of General Hugh L. Scott, issued orders for a new expedition to start from El Paso. The train got away at $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. It carried Troops A and $B$ of the Eighth cavalry, commanded by Maj. George T. Langhorne, Capt. George W. Kirkpatrick and apt. James C. Rhea.
This force will be joined en route by two troops of the Fourteenth avalry under Col. Frederick W. sibley and a machine gun platoon. Colonel Sibley will be in command when he joins.

Field Headquarters, Near Namiuipa, by Wireless to Columbus, N . M. May 6.-A full squadron of 230 nen of the Eleventh Cavalry surrised and routed a force of Vilt bandits at Ojo Azules, seventeen miles south of Cusihuiriachic, early vesterday. By actual count, forty wo Mexicans were killed and a number wounded, but there were no American casualties.
The American command, under Major Robert L. Howze, had been pursuing the Villa bandits under Generals Cruz Dominguez and Julio Acosta for several days, when they encountered them encamped in the huddled adobe houses of Ojo Azules. The Mexicans were completely sur prised, and sprang from their pallets half-clothed. After firing a few wild shots they fled, each man shifting for himself. Some of them were able to seize their horses, al ready jaded from a hard day's ride previously, but others made their way into the hills afooc.

## SPACE GRABBERS DEFEAT thien own ends.

Many persons who have sough publicity wighin recent years have found it increasingly difficult to secure the publication of their articles. This is due primarily to the fact that the volume of news matter gathered by the newspapers and of publicity matter tendered to them has increased enormously. With growth of population, new public interest, new public offices and new governmental activities, there is more news than ever before, and multiplied and improved The news papers receive about twice as much matter as they could publish within their available space.
Seekers of publicity also defeat their purpobe by attempting to "hog" pace. Much of the copy tendered for publication is unnecessarily long. bearing evidence of loose thinking 0 and loose diction. Not many persons would read sueh articles if even abstracts thereof are publish ed. This is an age of shert stories and moving pictures, and the public irks at long speeches. A newspaper must devote its columns to the publication of news within readable bounds.
Thus it is the attitude of the public which is the prime factor in de termining the size of a newspaper and its space available for publication of publicity matter, secondly there is the matter of expense. It costs money to increase the size of a single issue of a newspaper of considerable circulation by aper much as a single sheet, and no way has been found to add less than a sheet. If the newspapers of this country were to increase the size of sheet every day a majority of one would go broke or be compelled to hunt subsidies.

SALIENT POINTS OF GERMANY'S
REPLY TO THE UNITED STATES
The German government notifies the government of the United States that German naval forces have re ceived the following order:
"In accordance with the general principles of visit and search and in the destruction of merchant vessels, recognized by international law such vessels, both within and without the area declared a naval war zone shall not be sunk without zone, shall not be sunk without warning and without saving human escape or offer resistance escape or offer resistance
The unofficial copy was laid be fore the cabinet. One chief poin for consideration seemed to be Ger many's reference to the immunity of "merchant vessels reconnized by international law." This was re garded as having possibilities of re-
lating to the dispute over lating to the dispute over questions of argument and alleged instructions of the British admiralty to merchant captains to attack submarines.
"Accordingly, the German government is confident that in conse quence of the new orders issued to the naval forces, the government of the United States will also now consider all impediments removed which may have been in the way of mutual co-operation toward re storation of the freedom of the sea during the war, as suggested in the note of July 23. 1915, and it does not doubt that the government of the United States will now demand and insist that the British government shall forthwith observe the rules of international law univers ally recognized before the war, as are laid down in the notes presented by the government of the United States to the British government Dec. 28, 1914, and Nov. 5, 1915.
"Should steps taken by the gov ernment of the United States not ernment of the United States no attain the object it desires, to have
the, laws of humanity followed by the belligerent nations, the German government would then be facing a new situation in which it must reserve to itself complete liberty of decision.
"It will, therefore, be understood that the appeal made by the gov ernment of the United States to sentiments of humanity and principles of international law can not nder the circumstances meet the earty response from the German people which such an appeal always is certain to find here. If the German government nevertheless is re olved to go to the utmost limit of oncessions it has been guided not alone by the friendship connecting the two great nations for over a hundred years, but also by the thought of the great doom which
threatens the entire civilized world should the cruel and sanguinary war be extended and prolonged."
