life. I was with the Houston County boys for a little while, but was transferred to another company. For the time being we are quartered in the same barracks. We are in the same regiment.

The greatest difficulty we have is getting our mail and reading material. The confusion for the past few days has prevented us from getting our mail promptly, and good magazines are about as scarce as the proverbial "hen's teeth." However, everything is becoming rapidly organized and it

Short of a Storm.

Now come some of the Courier's good friends and charge that nothing has been said of the thirty or more lunches sent by the people of Ratcliff for the boys of Company L on their departure for the training

camp. It is set forth that Ratcliff hired an automobile at large expense, although the rain poured, and sent enough lunches for half of the company. These same friends point-out that Kennard sent thirty lunches in a volunteer automobile, of which the Courier gave no publicity and of which they complain. The Courier observed at the time the receipt of those lunches, but was not specific as to whether they came, all of which has cast on the Courier's editorial conduct a cloud that is breaking short of a storm.

COUNTY EXEMPTION BOARD MAKES SECOND CALL

Three Hundred Registrants Called for Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of Next Week.

The county exemption board has supplied the Courier with the call that follows. There are three hundred in the call, 106 of whom are negroes:

The following registrants are hereby called to assemble at Crockett, Texas, on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th respectively of September, 1917, for examination. The whites will appear on the 24th, 25th and the 26th, those numbered from 381 to 420 in the forenoon, those numbered from 420 to 481 in the afternoon of Monday; those numbered from 482 to 522 in the forenoon, those numbered from 522 to 582 in the afternoon of Tuesday; those numbered from 582 to 622 in the forenoon, those numbered from 622 to 680 in the afternoon of Wednesday.

The colored registrants will appear on Thursday—in the forenoon those numbered from 397 to 513, in the afternoon—those numbered from 513 to 678.

The colored registrants will note the day and act accordingly.

We wish to impress on all that we are compelled to observe the system and the order marked out, and that only in exceptional cases can we depart therefrom.

The press is requested to publish this call. Constructive notice of the call, however, is given each one when the list of names and their post office address are posted in the office of the board.

You are hereby commanded to summon James W. Webber, by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 3rd Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said judicial district, then in a newspaper published in the nearest district to said 3rd Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District court of Houston county, to be holden at the court house thereof in Crockett, on the 2nd Monday in October, 1917, the same being the 8th day of October, 1917, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 4th day of September, 1917, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 5711, wherein J. B. Fox is plaintiff and James W. 

CATTLE TICKS AND

THE GERMAN SUBMARINE

The cattle tick is a friend of the German kaiser, doing its bit to decrease our meat and milk supply.

These cattle ticks reduce milk yields from 18 per cent to 42 per cent and decrease beef production by causing death or stunted growth of its victims.

The German submarine is performing a like service for the kaiser, sinking supply ships that are carrying food to armies of the United States and her allies, thereby reducing the food supply.

The United States Congress now in session has recently passed a law entitled "An Act to Provide Further for the National Security and Defense by Encouraging the Production, Conserving the Supply and Controlling the Distribution of Food Products and Fuel."

This law appropriates a sum of money for tick eradication in the interest of food conservation, thus making the getting rid of ticks a war measure.

Every stockraiser, large and small, should assist in the work of eradicating this cattle pest, so that ourselves and the armies of our allies may be supplied with more milk and meat.

Therefore, you may render your country a valuable service without fighting in the trenches by going to the polls Saturday and voting for the eradication of the cattle tick. By rendering your country a service you also render your neighbor and yourself a service that cannot be measured in words or dollars.

You can serve your country at home and without going to war by going to your voting box Saturday and voting for county-wide tick eradication. It is not necessary to go to war to serve your country well. Houston county has invested \$10,000 in dipping vats without effect unless all cattle are dipped. In 1920 the state compulsory dipping law goes into effect, and unless Houston county adopts the law now by popular vote, her dipping vats will crumble from idleness by that time, will have to be rebuilt and the present investment will be a big loss. Vote to put Houston county under the dipping law now and save the investment.

Quarantine for Farms.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 16—A quarantine around every farm in Dallas county where cattle have not been dipped is proposed by the government.

Rev. Chas. U. McLarty left Monday morning for Robstown, where he goes to assist Rev. J. E. Morgan in a revival. He will be gone about ten days. Services are provided for during his temporary absence from the city. Mr. John A. McConnell, next Sunday morning, will deliver a lay sermon. At night Rev. J. 

Great Military Demonstration.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 13.—Colonel Williams announced Thursday that the major general would hold a review of his entire division some time in October on the Arlington Heights boulevard. It will be the first and more than likely the only assemblage of the camp forces before they are sent to France, but it will not be held until every man is equipped with uniform and ordnance.

It perhaps will be the greatest military demonstration the State has ever seen, and there will undoubtedly be visitors from all over this part of the country to witness it. Although more soldiers participate in the inaugural parade at Washington every four years, it will be the first time that an entire division of the army will have passed in review since the war between the States. While no announcement has yet been made of the fact, it is not improbable that besides General Greble and his staff, some of the high army officials from Washington will come here to participate in the review.

Orders to Reorganize.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 12.—Headquarters of the Thirty-sixth division at Camp Bowie received orders to begin immediately the reorganization of this division. According to Lieutenant Colonel Williams, chief of staff, it will probably be a week, however, before the change is actually effected, for it will entail the working out of a great mass of details.

One of the most characteristic features of the change will be the enlargement of infantry companies to 250 men with six commissioned officers, consisting of a captain, two first lieutenants and three second lieutenants. Experience of the present war has been that a unit of this size is more

effective in trench warfare.

Besides this, the division will, in its broad outlines, consist of one infantry division, comprising one division headquarters, one machine gun battalion of four companies; two infantry brigades, consisting of one brigade headquarters, two infantry regiments, and one machine gun battalion of three companies; one artillery brigade, consisting of one brigade headquarters, two field artillery regiments with light three inch guns, one field artillery regiment with heavy six inch howitzers, one trench mortar battery; one engineer regiment; one field signal battalion; one division train, consisting of one headquarters with military police, one ammunition train, one supply train, one engineer train, one sanitary train, one mobile ordnance repair shop and one depot brigade.

Advantages of the Farm Loan.

To show the advantages of the farm loan movement put in motion by the government, we will state that five or six renters who, without this help might never get in a condition to own a farm, have found landlords who are willing to sell them farms on the following terms: half cash and the balance in five or more annual payments at 8 per cent interest and take a second

mortgage as security. The Federal Land Bank will loan half the value, but must have a first mortgage as security, but the payments to the land bank are so small that the second mortgage can readily be paid in a few years, making it a perfectly safe transaction for the party who makes the sale under this plan. Here is an example of the manner it works out:

An industrious farmer with a large and growing family who has been a renter all his life and finds it impossible to save enough to make an acceptable first payment, but has a team and the necessary implements, finds a party who is willing to sell him a hundred acre farm with improvements that enable him to move in and begin cultivating the sixty or seventy acres of tillable land awaiting his attention. He is to get this land at \$15.00 per acre, half cash and the balance in yearly payments for five years at 8 per cent interest. He comes to the Loan Association and borrows half the amount, \$750, and turns it over to the party he buys from, and executes five notes of \$150 each. He borrows from the Land Bank on forty years time, to make his payments light to begin with. He pays annually one fortieth of the principal and 5 per cent interest, making \$56.25. Add to this what he pays to the landlord, one fifth of \$750, and interest, \$210, making a total of \$266.25, or less than the receipts from two bales of cotton this season.

Under these conditions no renter who has a reputation for integrity and is known to be a good worker need be another month without a farm of his own. One suggestion in this connection to the renter who proposes to take this step, insist on a complete abstract with the transfer. We cordially ask any and all farmers who are interested to call at the club rooms for further particulars.
