SONORA TO APPEAL FOR RECOGNITION

Leader in Revolt Against Carranza Government so Announces.

Agua Prieta, Sonora, April 16. —The state of Sonora will appeal to the United States for recognition as a belligerent. Announcement of the appeal was made here today by Francisco Elias, a leader in the Sonora revolt against the Carranza government in Mexico.

Sonora hopes to be recognized as a belligerent, according to Senor Elias, and thus forestall permission being granted Carranza troops to cross United States territory to attack the state from the border. The appeal, if granted, also would in the Houston county district throw open the ports of the gates. state on the international boundary to trade with the United delegates. States without restriction. Senor Elias said that recognition as a belligerent would in no way involve recognition by the delegates. United States of the government of Sonora, nor otherwise involve its relations with Mexico as a whole. He said that in previous Mexican revolutions the United States had recognized any facseventy-two hours. > The Sonora officials said they had received assurances that strong representations would be made at Washington against permission being granted. They expected border American states also to protest to Washington gates. against the Carranza request.

General Elias P. Calles, commander in chief of the Sonora forces, in a telegram received here today from Hermosillo, said Sonora soldiers were continuing their invasion of the state of Sinaloa.

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OFFICIALS JAILED ON FRAUD CHARGE

President Declares Proceeding Is "Spite Case" by Certain Stockholders.

Dallas, Texas, April 13.-William S. Livezey, president, and two other officers of the Little Motor Kar company of Grand Prairie, Texas, were remanded to jail here Tuesday to await preliminary hearing next Friday on charges of fraudulent use of the mails and conspiracy to defraud in connection with sales of the company's stock. They were sent to jail in default of \$25,000 bail demanded by each by United States Commissioner R. V. Davidson Jr. The company was placed in receivership last week.

Federal intervention in the affairs of the company came early Tuesday when formal charges were filed by post office inspectors and the five men were taken into custody. Besides President Livezey, the men under arrest are R. L. McCoy, vice president of the Little Motor Kar company; George W. Stricker, secretary-treasurer, and Herman Stricker and J. H. Crow, employes of the company.

In the recent receivership proceedings on the part of certain stockholders, mismanagement of the company's affairs was charged. Petitioners alleged that stock sales had netted the company about \$1,000,000, but that the concern's assets at present were only about \$300,000. Everett S. Owens was appointed receiver.

The company was organized about a year ago for the purpose of building motor cars and had constructed a small plant at Grand Prairie near Dallas. Its original capital stock of \$100,000 was later increased to \$1,000,000 and still more recently to \$3,000,000. Petitioners for a receiver declared there were about 30,000 stockholders in Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Illinois and Pennsylvania.

President Livezey Tuesday declared the company is solvent, has started construction on motor cars, and that the present proceedings "is all a spite case" on the part of certain stockholders.

MARSHAL RESIGNS AT PISTOL POINT

Mob Carries Men Out of County With Admonition Not

to Return.

Desdemona, Texas, April 13.-Robert Peacock, city marshal, and Frank Pearce, his assistant, were forced to resign office at the point of revolvers and carried out of the county by a crowd here Monday night, it became known Tuesday. It was reported both men were taken by automobile to an isolated section in Erath county and left with an admonition not to return to Desdemona. The reason for the crowd's action is unknown, Marshal Peacock was recently reported to have had trouble with members of the American Legion.

The mob assembled quietly Monday night and completed its plans with such caution that Peacock and Pearce received no warning of what was in the wind until they faced the revolvers of a score or more men. They were helpless when ordered to write out their resignations. Then they were placed in automobiles and hurried out of town in the direction of the Erath county line. Intense excitement prevails here following the swift action of the mob. Many men passing through the streets were armed. All sects of reports are being circulated concerning the identity of members of the mob. It is said that the leaders were men of prominence and men who are ordinarily to be found strongly on the side of law and order, but the men who took part in the step to drive the city marshal and his assistant from the camp are silent today about their movements and about the names of their associates.

Incorporation Defeated.

An election was held Tuesday to determine whether or not the town should be incorporated under the general laws of Texas, but the proposition was decidely voted down by a majority of 27. 67 votes were polled for incorporation and 94 against it. A lively interest was manifested by both sides and every inch of ground was contested.

J. C. Kennedy was elected mayor and Wm. H. Long, W. L. Mangum, W. A. Riall, C. C. Hill and Sam Kennedy were elected aldermen out of a list of eighteen. But the 'mayor' and 'aldermen' seem to be in a predicament, as they are duly and constitutionally elected to preside over a municipality that does not exist .-Grapeland Messenger.




