Complete business recovery, the board continued, has been tar and feathers. He was taken took the Pennsylvania member slow and expectations that this spring would see economic and business readjustments fairly completed have not been realized. Nevertheless, it added, the month of April has given evidence of an improved feeling developing with regard to business and the outlook generally.

While there is still some uncertainty as to when an end of the readjustment period may be expected, and though business and industry in some sections of the country are still beset with difficulties, some of the factors of uncertainty are either being eliminated or are of diminishing importance.

Prices, the review continued, have been the pivotal point in the business situation since the recession movement began last autumn. The fall in wholesale, prices, which has been continuous and at times precipitate. it declared, appears to be in a process of arrest, they having shown a greater degree of stability during April.

Extreme unevenness in price reductions, however, the board said, is one of the striking features in the present industrial situation. PUBLISHERS WARNED AGAINST REDUCTION

Williams Advises Co-Operation With Government to Restore Normalcy.

New York, April 27.-Warning against a possible future demoralization in the newsprint market, T. R. Williams, president of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, in his address opening the thirtyfourth convention of that body Wednesday, told publishers newspaper rates should not be allowed to descend. He urged upon the newspaper publishers the need of co-operating with government forces in restoring world peace and bringing business conditions back to normalcy and especially in repealing unnecessary wartime legislation and obnoxious taxation laws.

"With these fundamentals established," he declared, "it will be with more telling effect that newspapers can continue preaching the gospel of optimism, the restoring of confidence, the bringing back to normalcy of our country's business.

"Obviously, the accomplishment of these things forms the solution of our present newspaper problem, which, boiled down to a phrase, is abnormally high cost of production."

Contract Price High.

He pointed out that the average contract price of newsprint for the first six months of this year was higher than the average contract price for all last year, and labor was at the highest point known.

The association's activities during the last year were centered in economic measures, he said. These included urging national legislation for the conservation of forests; stabilizing the newsprint market through greater economy in use of paper with standardization of weights and sizes, and surveys of ink and carbon black resources with a view toward protection against depletion of supplies.

He commented upon the growth of greater co-operation among newspapers through State and interestate organizations, especially in elimination of wasteful competition methods.

His suggestions for extending the usefulness of the association included the appointment of a newspaper mechanical engineer to increase mechanical efficiency, and a legislative expert to supervise legislation affecting newspapers.




