President Will Urge Earliest Possible Passage, It Is Predicted.

Washington, Dec. 1.-President Harding's message to the new congress will deal principally with two subjects: The tarif and the merchant marine. to say that its revision and pas sage at the earliest possible date is urgently necessary, and that provisions as would endanger or unduly delay it.

The following extension of remarks by Hon. Isaac Siegal in the House of Representatives on Thursday, Nov. 10th, 1921, is taken from the Congressional
