Thinks That Between the Two the American People Would Prefer Wilson League.

Washington, Nov. 27.-The France and Great Britain to continuing "association of nations" which, according to reports, President Harding has foreseen as a possible outcome tions under another name," Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, declared in a statement issued Sunday night. Senator Borah's statement fol-

lows: "The proposed association of nations has not yet been reduced to form, nor yet defined. But

from what one can gather here and there, it is the old league of nations under another name. It will be engaged in precisely the same kind of work and doing the same kind of things that were proposed by the league. It is not what you call it, but what it is, that counts.

"Fundamentally and in the oractical workings of the association of nations, it will not differ from the league of nations. I see no reason, therefore, why the 43 nations which have signed the league should be asked to abandon it and transfer their names to an association of nations. If we want to go into this kind of a proposition there is no reason why we should not experiment with the one they have. "It is claimed by the advocates of the league that the present league has been of much service to Europe. If so, there is no reason for asking Europe to scrap the old league and try a new one. If we are going into Europe, we ought to go in. If we are not, we ought not to be founding a new league every 90 days. 

GET SHIP BUILDER BACK TO AMERICA

Officials Aroused Over Departure of Morse on Eve of **Government** Probe.

Washington, Dec. 1.--Aroused by the departure of Charles W. Morse, New York ship builder, from this country just as the government is about to place before a federal grand jury its investigations of his transactions with the shipping board, officials of various departments considered Thursday night what means may be taken to bring him back to the United States.

It is hoped, department of justice officials said, that word can be sent to the French government in time to permit Morse's detention at Havre Friday morning, when according to latest advices, the French steamer Paris, on which he sailed from New

Plan to Cancel Passport.

Early in the day the justice department called on the navy department to send a destroyer to meet the vessel outside Havre his release under commutation of and take Morse off the ship. Navy department officials declared, however, they were without authority to act in that manner.

Degenerative Changes.

"A careful review of reports makes it clear to my mind that he is suffering from a combination of diseases due to degenerative changes which are incurable and progressive. In my opinion the prisoner's duration of life will be, in all probability, less than one month if he is kept in confinement, and in the event of sentence, it is not probable that he will live as long as six months."

Mr. Morse, however, upset this prediction. He spent some time abroad recovering and in 1916 resumed business in New York by organizing a shipping combine

Morse sailed under the advice of his physician "That he would have to undergo an operation if he desired to save his life," the statement said, adding that he would return when his presence was desired, "and when he is in physical condition to do so."

Justice department officials declared nothing was known of Mr. Morse's departure until it was reported from New York Wednesday night. Morse was granted a passport several months ago, state department officials said, and this passport presumably was good at the time of his sailing.
