Rich, taking Mr. Rich's clothing and other things while he and his family were away from
home. The officers were notified and the men trailed Sunday afternoon to the bayou heard of as they walked the railroad track toward Grapeland, one of the men carrying a shot
gun which he had stolen from a farm house near the Trinity river. They were not seen any more
until intercepted by the officers near Grapeland.

## TOM DAVIS CAUGHT NEAR NECHES RIVER

Slayer of Jesse English Taker After an All-Day and AllNight Chase.

Tom Davis, slayer of Deputy Sheriff Jesse English and murderer of his fellowman in Newiff O. B. Hale and deputies, and Sheriff Reagan and deputies
from Cherokee county, in the Neches river bottom at a very early hour Tuesday morning.
The sheriffs and deputies also had the assistance of guards and dogs from the conviet farm. Davis was found partly concealed
behind a tree, with his back against the tree. Surprised by
the officers, he threw up his hands and surrendered without resistance.
Guards Ferguson and Eastham state farms reached Grapeland early Sheriff Hale and deputies in pursuit of the m/n who had slain: Deputy Jesse English. The chase
extended east from Grapeland and lasted all day Monday. When
nightfall came the dogs were nightfall came the dogs were
taken from the trail and daylight awaited for a resumption
of the man-hunt. The convict had been tracked through woods, fields and pastures to the
Neches river bottom. Reaching the bottom, he followed the saw-
mill tram down the river. His mill tram down the river. His.
pursuers camped at the tram road and got a day-break start
Tuesday morning. They found their man soon after resuming a small camp-fire and slept on a. bed of leaves and brush. Sur-
prised by the officers, he made no resistance.

NEFF MAY VETO APPROPRIATIONS

Who Scored Him for Being Absent.

Austin, Tex., May 26.-Governor Neff today told Lieutenant Governor Davidson and all other legislative callers that if the legislature did not show signs of "doing something" by
Monday he would veto all approMonday he would veto all appro-
priation bills Tuesday, and then it would be up to the lawmaking body to get busy. That he may say something in "talking back" far more caustic than he even attempted in his Dallas statement was also indicated plainly. Also, the governor is "righteously indignant" over the fact that leg-

BELIEF IS GROWING THAT FALL WILL USHER IN BETTER CONDITIONS.

Pace Too Rapid.
Business is coming around to recognize what has been patent

but is substantially higher than last year. last year.
